Burton Bowling Club - End of season report

By the time you read this the 2021 competitive season will be at an end, but this will not mean all activity will cease as the autumn is a busy time for work on the green to try to ensure an excellent playing surface next year. This work falls to be done by a willing few of our members, with the occasional assistance of outside help for specific tasks. The competitive season can be regarded as reasonably successful in what was an unusual year owing to the pandemic. The Kendal League took the decision to continue as before with fully competitive divisions and with promotion and relegation, but the Morecambe League and the Veterans League took a different approach and made their competitions non-competitive in the sense that no promotion or relegation hung on the outcomes.

We were challenged in putting two teams out on the same night in the Kendal League in Divs 1 & 2 in the early part of the season owing to a shortage of members, as we had lost a few from 2019 when last league action took place, but some excellent new recruits arrived and gradually some who had been reluctant to restart returned and, apart from shortages caused by holidays and illness, the difficulties were alleviated. Both teams held their own in the respective divisions. We were only able to run one team (of 10 players) in the Morecambe League, as against two teams in 2019. Our one team played in Division 2 and won all but one match.

Our Veterans League team (for players over 60) was somewhat of a challenge, as we were short of personnel in the over 60 age group and on occasion had to play matches with one player short. We also entered a team in the end of season Lune Valley Floodlit League and had a reasonably successful outcome with some notable wins. We finished fourth in the table. On the individual front, club members enjoyed some notable successes. Russ Coates won the competition for the outstanding players from clubs in Division 2 of the Kendal League, whilst Carl Dobson reached the semi-final of the Division 1 competition on the same day.

Apart from our own activities we also hosted a competition in July with an invited entry of all the leading local players.Unfortunately after a prolonged spell of dry warm weather leading up to the day, the heavens opened on the morning, and many of the matches took place in pouring rain and on a surface of standing water, a real test of fortitude, skill and adaptability.We were blessed with much better for a Club event organised at the end of August to commemorate the late John Looker and to compete for a trophy named after him. Thanks to all who attended and helped to make the day enjoyable.

The Club owes a huge debt of gratitude this year to the hardworking officers Nick Watts (Chair), Alex Jamieson (Secretary) and Eunice Jamieson (Treasurer), and to the captains of the various teams who have all had struggles from time to time in raising teams. Also thanks are due to the noble few who drove the mower regularly including particularly Alex Jamieson, John Taylor, Nick Watts.



Anita's Recipes

Mexican Style Cheesecake Dessert

Ingredients

2 x 8oz Packs of Pilsbury Crescent Rolls
2 x 8oz Packs of Cream Cheese, at room temperature
1 cup Sugar
1 tsp Vanilla
¼ cup Butter, melted
1 tbsp Cinnamon
4 tbsp Sugar

To Serve: Honey (if liked)

Method

1. Preheat oven to 350F, 180C

2. Spray 9 x 13 baking dish with cooking spray

3. Press a can of the crescent rolls to the bottom of the dish, making sure to reach the edges and keep it together

4. Bake the first layer of crescent dough till just done – maybe 5-8 minutes. (This stage is optional but ensures that the dough is cooked)

5. Combine softened cream cheese, sugar and vanilla

6. Spread the mixture over the dough

7. Roll the remaining crescent rolls over the top, stretch to the edges and seal

8. Brush across the entire top of the crescent roll with the melted butter

9. Sprinkle the top with the

cinnamon and sugar

10. Bake for about 30 minutes, or until golden brown

This can be eaten warm, or allowed to cool and chill for several hours before serving.

Slice into triangles or squares, drizzle with a little honey if liked, and serve.

November Council News

Sadly, and seriously, COVID still undercuts Council considerations. Rates in South Lakeland are below the national average, but we must remain wary because neighbouring Lancashire still has the nation's highest rates. Locally, the 12-18 age group accounted for the greatest increase, probably because of the return of pupils to school. The 80+ age range – although over 90% of people have had two vaccinations - also experienced a proportional increase. But the number of new COVID patients admitted to the Morecambe Bay NHS Trust hospitals has not risen.

Social and health considerations have also been stressed on the County Council which has received extra government funding of £50k for food through the winter months, £20k to support hardship groups and £124k to support voluntary and community groups. At the County Local Committee, we heard a presentation about autism. School aged children comprise the largest group but the number of diagnosed autistic adults is increasing.

Our longest discussion concerned the provision of EVCP generators for electrically powered cars. From 2030, no more petrol or diesel fuelled vehicles will be manufactured and, from 2040, such vehicles will be banned. With less than ten years to go, the first council installed chargers will be installed in Kendal, Ulverston, Windermere and Bowness. I have immediately raised the cry 'what about the villages?' but have not yet received any specific information. Many local villages have houses without parking places. Charging electric cars on the road from these houses would involve potentially hazardous power cables crossing the pavements. Consequently, in the next few

years rural communities will have to find charging spaces even though parking space is at a premium in most of our villages. Please let me know your views and any suggestions to implement this important way of combating global warming.

Another delay is possible in our task of organising Local Government Reform by replacing the County Council and the six District Councils with Unitary Authorities. As reported previously, the Minister for local government decreed that Cumbria should have two authorities: North and South (though Whitehall called them East and West!). This view was challenged by the County Council's ruling Labour and Liberal Democrat Coalition (the Council membership is currently 37 Conservatives, 26 Labour, 16 Liberal Democrats and 5 Independents). Although at a special council meeting, held in public, a motion to rescind the application for a judicial review was passed - the review is still going ahead. This means that candidates for the new council or councils cannot be selected. We do know, however, that the current division boundaries will remain the same. Election for the new council is fixed for May 2022. The current authorities will continue until 'vesting date' on the 1st April 2023. The newly elected members will serve as a Shadow Council until that date. Sorry, I know it's complicated!

PC Observations...

OCTOBER 2021 MEETING

First meeting, first impressions: our parish councillors are human(!); public support is minimal (thank you Kath and Sue); after waiting years for a police representative to attend, two come along at once! And many thanks to Kathryn, our retiring columnist, for all her help and support.

Councillors are required to send any apologies for absence in writing – email is acceptable especially for last minute issues that crop up. Kath used the Open Forum to suggest that blue plaques be installed in the Village as part of the royal Jubilee celebrations in 2022. Village events for prior celebrations can be reviewed from the archives. The meeting will investigate the cost and requirements for blue plaque status and consider this alongside other celebration suggestions.

The two PCSOs (Kathryn and Hayley) provided information on local crime and anti-social behaviours, stressing the importance of contacting the police (dial 101 or email 101emails@cumbria-police.uk) as soon as anything is noticed, and of taking all practical precautions against burglary – e.g. leaving lights on, not advertising a trip away, considering the installation of an alarm.

As usual, county councillor Roger Bingham provided a written report and also gave a verbal report, including Covid statistics, ECVP generators for electrically powered cars, and his involvement in the blue plaques installed in Milnthorpe. Surprisingly, it would appear that finally progress will be made in Church Bank Gardens! The banks and Receiver now have confirmed legal possession of all properties not already in private ownership, and they will be addressing the planning breaches. The first priorities will be cladding of properties, and bringing the road up to adoptable standard. A site meeting is due to take place shortly and residents should be included in communications thereafter.

Funding of the Village Book Drop/Library had been requested, and will be an agenda item at the next meeting. Read next month's Observations for their decision!

Next year's budget will be prepared by Christine Davidson (Clerk), Alan Wren and Lesley Bailey (Councillors). The review of outstanding items, as usual, noted most items as ongoing.

The new PSiCA conservation contact lives in Staffordshire; however, a contact within SLDC will be providing updates to the clerk. No date has yet been put forward for work to continue. Councillors' reports included that some bright spark had set fire to the playground rubbish bin, leaving a molten mess of melted plastic! Provision of metal bins both here and at plain quarry will be sought from SLDC. But a new Grit Bin has been provided in Station Lane – thank you Christine.

The next meeting is on Thursday 18th November, and it would be great to see you there!

NATURE NOTES by Bryan Yorke

Writing this, we are slap bang in the middle of the Autumn bird migration and I love getting up in a morning for some special treats. So what treats will be on offer tomorrow morning?

Well, I am pretty confident that I am going to see over 100 or up to 500 Chaffinches with the odd Brambling or two mixed in. And, I am pretty sure their flight corridor will have seen them coming down from the North West and crossing Vicarage Lane and Mike Taylor's fields heading out to the South East. You can never be sure, but some days you will get single parties which may contain between ten and twenty birds in some cases going straight over my head. I wish I knew their secrets; where had they come from and where are they going?

Some of these birds will by now be continental Chaffinches, which do start moving a little later than most of the British stock, I usually get some idea that the continentals are with us when I start to hear the overhead calls from the Bramblings. It is a strange drawn out squealy call. In beech mast years some of these birds would have stayed with us right through the Winter and if that had been the case you would get even more special treats each morning by seeing over 3000 birds making their way into Dalton Crags, having spent their evening roosting in the plantations which you can see to the back of the Hutton Roof Timber Yard.

On these special years I will try to witness the fabulous spectacle as many mornings as possible. They start from very first light and the passage of small teen plus parties will continue for up to one hour at least. Among the groups you may also see Chaffinches and Siskin. The spectacle was last with us back in 2019, so I guess any year now we should see a repeat performance. NOT this year, however, the Beech Mast does not seem to be so abundant!

Another treat I will hopefully see tomorrow morning will be the long line of Starlings which will stretch in full linear fashion from as far as you can see in both directions from my left to my right. The line will be deep, containing on occasions up to ten thousand birds all in one go. I love the late afternoon murmurations, but I also get a thrill just seeing them go high above Vicarage Lane on their way out in a morning to feed up in the fields of Kirkby Lonsdale and nearby areas. Some days I will time my afternoon walk to catch the birds on their return fly-over heading to their roost in Silverdale.

A few days ago (14th and 15th October), the Redwing started moving through the Country and I managed to record over a thousand birds from my regular watch point just in one morning. They seemed to come in from the South directly in line with Lancaster, then passing me overhead whilst making their way over by Hutton Roof and onward in a Northerly direction. I really don't think that's it; there should be lots more to come through in the coming days. There are one or two nights per year when if you stand at your front or back door you may hear (if not see) Redwing going overhead in their large parties. Their contact call is a very drawn out high pitched call which sounds something like "TSee-ip". It's no wonder we get such good numbers over Burton, when you think there are 8.6 million come into the UK and winter with us.

I love the large parties of Redwing, but I also like the sights of massive flocks of Fieldfare peppering our skies. I have seen some flocks which are 500 or more. I have in past years counted over 20,000 birds passing through Burton. Some of them seem to make their way into the Lakes and probably further enjoying all the ripened berries, old fruit like damsons and apples they will find.

People are always asking, "how on earth do you count so many birds?" The answer is with difficulty! But seriously when it's busy and it really does get busy with flocks every few minutes coming through it takes you all your time just to write the numbers down. So you need to estimate and usually dependent on the individual parties I will count in blocks of 20, or with the larger parties over 200 I will count in sections of what I estimate to be 50 at a time. So we are only dealing with approximates but that should be OK. This was on October 17th 2009 another good day with over 20,000 thrushes.



I think it will be really good birding during November with lots of our little feathered friends entering the Burton airspace, I for one wish to be there to greet them in, and wish them well on their onward journeys.

Remember that parcels sent outside the U.K. need to have a customs form attached, these are available at the Post Office Counter. Also remember to put your name and address on the top left hand corner of the front of your package; this will enable Royal Mail to return your item should overseas customs authorities refuse it entry into their country.

The usual reminder about size and weight for parcels sent abroad using Royal Mail. The maximum total of (length + width + height) is 90 cm (approx 3ft) with the maximum single dimension of 60cm (approx 2 ft). Also, the maximum weight is 2 kg. It is really easy to exceed these and then the parcel would cost a great deal more to send via Parcel Force. It is sometimes cheaper to split a heavy parcel and send two packets.

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
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


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Vicar's Letter...

Rafters and Rainwater

Dear Friends

Thank you to everyone who came to our Autumn Fair. I think we've really missed such events of late! Thank you too for your generosity, £1003.95 was raised from takings and donations and will go towards the repairs needed to keep St James Church open for the public worship of the Lord Jesus Christ. Here's an update on the work that is in progress or planned: in April 2021, as we were investigating rainwater leaks into the Atkinson Room (south-east corner of the church), we discovered significant problems with the 16th Century oak beam roof structure which required urgent attention. The Atkinson Room is used for children's work, group meetings and for serving refreshments. We quickly installed scaffolding to support the roof and to give access for investigation and expert advice. Seven months later we are drawing to the close of a project to replace rotten oak purlins and rafters before replastering sections of the ceiling with traditional lath and plaster. This work has cost thousands and leaves the church with very little money in the bank for future building works.



You may have seen that we have been digging shallow trenches in the churchyard. We have been finding out where the blocked storm-water drains go to – the answer … nowhere! Over time this will undermine the foundations of the church so as soon as we can raise sufficient funds we plan to lay new pipes from all the gullies to proper soakaways within the churchyard.

We have been working towards the next major project - to repair the vestry, which was built in 1872 on the north side of the church. This small but important room is used to prepare for services, to store church records and to house our lovely 1850 pipe organ. Falling internal plaster has been a sure sign of rain-water ingress which has now been thoroughly investigated. The repair and restoration work – outside and inside – has been costed at £55.000. Thank you very much to all those who have already given money towards this project – as I write £25,837 has already been given, nearly half of the total. Thank you very much! HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

BURTON'S 'MOUNTAIN'

Sometimes Local History gets bound up with Natural History and Geology. This mixture applies to Burton's most prominent landscape feature, Farleton Knott. Being just under 1000 feet high 'Burton's mountain' is technically not guite a mountain and is spread over several other parishes. Thomas Machell, the Antiquary on Horseback, in c.1694 almost ignored the Knott's prominence though he noted that the lower land was 'overtopped with a craggy fell'. Regarding geology he observed that Burton parish had 'blackish clay and sand but for the most part limestone ..but no wood worth speaking of'. He added that the parishioners 'claim the beacon on Farleton Knot nearest to Holme Park'. In contrast Thomas West's Guide to the Lakes a hundred years later in 1789 was 'much struck by the little steep, white mountain, Farleton - knot. It is composed of solid limestone and is two or three hundred yards high. Those who have seen both say, that on the west side (i.e. facing Burton), it is very like the Rock at Gibraltar'.


In the 20th century Norman Nicholson extolled the Knott's geology in purple prose 'all the hills hereabouts have their own acres of wilderness unlike anything else in the district. Here, the rock is on the surface and the water has moulded it and carved it till it looks like cooled larva. There are waves and crests of rock, edges like piecrusts, crevasses more than a legdeep, cracks and splittings, and tiny white patches of scree. These upland commons are thatched with hazel and thorns where there is not even a dusting of soil on the stone'. Earlier, the Rev Machell had partly alleviated his antiquarian accounts with brief comments about natural phenomena. Around the Knott there is 'some wood most of which is ash. There are foul and clean martes (pole-cats) and also wild cats and foxes: too many all over'. More pleasing there were 'plenty of fallow deer'.

Two hundred years later William Palmer highlighted the wildlife. In his bestselling The Verge of Lakeland (Robert Hale 1937) he described how the lower Knott '...gives good access to rabbits, and the higher slopes are strongholds of foxes and there may be the earth of a family of badgers. Limestone clints (cracks) are strongholds for badgers where the creature is safe from the interference by labourers with pick and spade. A huntsman's terrier may go to ground after a fox or badger and lose its way in the crevices so that rescue is often a protracted job. Often there is no certainty which game is the snarling dog is marking. I have watched the digging out of terriers and badgers at the back of Farleton Knott and there are records of three and four badgers being drawn in a single expedition. I admit that I would much rather watch a badger whining and snuffling in the dark'. He concluded by pronouncing that 'the badger is a cleanly (sic) beast'. Even so, then as now, not quite everyone would have agreed with this view though most people nowadays are pleased that the flora, fauna and landscape of Burton's Mountain are protected by all manner of preservation orders.
