

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

February Council News

For councillors, the mid—winter season has been relatively quiet. Live meetings are fewer due to Covid and the SLDC's January Council was cut to 50% attendance so, because I had attended the two most recent reduced councils, my place was taken by Tom Harvey. Tom is still pursuing the Church Bank planning problems. The planned socially distanced County Council meeting was cancelled.

For personal health reasons I have cut my attendance at Parish Councils unless my actual presence is required. But I have continued to send monthly reports. I have also missed some other public events including, for the first time in over 2O years, the Cumbria Southern Area Young Farmers' AGM. My other meetings like Development Control, Archives, Transport, and the Children's committee have been on zoom.

Regarding COVID, cases in the county peaked in mid-January. Officially two thirds of Cumbrian people over the age of twelve have had their third vaccination, well above the national figure.

Fortunately, after the disruption caused by the November Storms, there have been fewer days affected by "weather events". Flood problems have, so far, been less severe than in recent years; perhaps partly because of the flood alleviation schemes. I continue to keep watch on the vulnerable patches but please keep me informed.

Briefly, some Burton residents suffered breaks in refuse collection because temporary staff have been filling in for regular workers isolating for COVID. However, I have been assured that most missed-out bins were emptied within 24 hours.

A combination of Covid, and loss of staff moving on in response to anticipated changes caused by Local Government Reform, is causing problems. Some vacancies have been filled by non-local people working at home which is especially difficult for the Highways and Planning departments.

On the County John Readman has been appointed CEO until Cumbria is replaced by the planned new Cumberland and Westmorland/ Furness authorities in April 2023. The judicial enquiry following objections raised by the current Leader of the County Council to the two counties decision is continuing. *

On a personal note, I am still pressing for the installation of charging points for electric vehicles to be installed in the rural villages.



Anita's Recipes

Valentine Biscuits to make for someone you love – yourself, your family, or friends or colleagues!

Using the following, or your favourite, biscuit recipe, prepare and roll out your biscuit dough.

Cut out rounds or heart shapes – you can use a biscuit/cookie cutter, a template, or any suitable tool that you have available (I used a paper-cutting die!).

Bake according to the recipe. Once cooled, decorate using shop bought icing or glace icing (recipe below), sweets, candied peel or chocolate chips, and icing 'pens'.

To create an outline use a thick consistency of icing then, once set, fill in with a runnier consistence. Make sure the icing is fully set before using icing pens, but set sweets, etc., into the icing before it sets.

Recipes:

Biscuits

Mix 250g of softened butter with 140g of caster sugar. Add one egg yolk and your choice of flavouring (e.g vanilla extract, finely grated lemon rind) and beat the mixture before adding 300g sifted plain flour and combining it all in well.

Bring the dough together with your hands, then roll out.

Bake at 180C/160C fan/gas 4 for 10-15 minutes until pale gold.

Glace Icing

Mix icing sugar and water together well, adding a drop of colouring or flavouring if you wish, using the proportion of about 250g of icing sugar to one tablespoon of water.

More icing sugar to water will create a firmer consistency; use more water to icing sugar for a flowing consistency.

B4RN Fibre Broadband installation in 2022

Starting before the end of January 2022, B4RN will begin extending its highspeed fibre broadband network in Burton-in-Kendal. This phase is specifically to cover areas which require streetworks construction, using pavements or carriageway as needed. The construction is expected to take several weeks in total, moving through different streets and areas as the work progresses. Some streets have very specific date restrictions which we must work around.

The installation consists of progressively trenching along pavements to install ducting and "toby boxes", one at the boundary of each property. Where there is no pavement, the carriageway is used instead, and the exact route is carefully considered. The toby box is buried at ground level, and it forms the connection point between each property and the main fibre broadband network. During construction there will be footways closed or diverted in accordance with regulations and the trenching will also cross the road in some places to a preplanned route.

All works will be carried out within approved planning and Streetworks Regulations and under appropriate permits from Cumbria County Council. During construction, the contractors will always consider pedestrian & property access, ensuring that access is available. If you need to take your vehicle in or out when the works are close by, please do talk to the contractors directly and they will create access for you, either immediately or as soon as it is safe to do so.

We understand that parking for cars may be difficult whilst our works are being carried out and contractors may need to ask you to temporarily move parked cars so that they can progress the installation as quickly and efficiently as possible down the pavement. We thank you in advance for your patience and understanding while the network is installed.


Sections of Main Street/Boon Walks (between Memorial Hall and Tanpits Lane)

The exact order of construction is determined nearer the time and often dictated by logistics on the ground. It is therefore possible that sections will be built in a discrete way and only joined together once all sections are complete.

The Word From BURTON MEMORIAL HALL



Sadly some of our news this month isn't so good as, due to ongoing concerns about the risk of catching Covid, some groups decided to cancel events: in December both the Bingo night for the tennis club and Singers Afternoon Tea fell victim to this, and in January the Hall's Burns' Night Supper and Ceilidh also.

Another area of concern is the ongoing abuse of the Hall's car park, as many groups are now reporting that there are no spaces left for hirers to use - especially in the evenings - as they are occupied by vehicles belonging to villagers using our land as a general car park. It has now become such a problem that the management committee is looking into options for the control of parking on the Hall's land. This is a route we have been reluctant to go down but, as our repeated appeals for consideration for our hirers are falling on deaf ears, we will have no other choice. So may I remind everyone that, although we are currently happy for those who just need to pop into the village shop or school to use the car park subject to a maximum stay of 20 minutes during the day, longer term parking before 10 pm is not permitted, with vehicles being expected to be removed at the start of the working day (i.e. by 9 am).

On a cheerier note, we are looking forward to the return of Tim Chu and lan Bailey to the Hall on Saturday 26th February, with their show A Celebration of Simon and Garfunkel, for which tickets are on sale in the Village Store. Doors will open at 7pm, and the show starts at 7.30 pm. It's a bring your own drinks event as there will be no bar.

Another "old favourite" will return in March when, on Saturday 12th March, we will be hosting a Spring Fashion Show by Kitty Brown Boutique of Carnforth, and tickets will be on sale for this from 1st March. On Saturday 23rd April we will be holding an Easter Market, with tables selling a wide range of local products. If you would like to book a table please contact me on 01524 781306 or email me at bmh@burtonweb.org.uk. Tables will be £10 each.

Finally, as the Hall has a large number of used books still for sale, we are planning to hold a periodic pop-up book-sale in the Club Room - the first of these will be on Saturday 12th February from 10 am until 2 pm in the Club Room - so do come along and find yourself some great reads to take home with you.

The best news we have had this month is that the team from B4RN are getting close to being able to provide a service to the Hall, and we would like feedback from users as to how having this superfast internet connection will benefit you in your use of the Hall, or if it will enable other uses of the Hall that our existing broadband doesn't support. Please do let me know by phone or by email as above, as this will help with planning as the project moves forward.

Finally, you will no doubt have spotted in the media that this is another Royal Jubilee year, a Platinum one this time, celebrating 70 years of the reign of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II. We have some ideas for the village and the Hall but would welcome input from anyone who is interested in organising, or getting involved in, events as part of the national celebration - focusing on the long weekend on 3rd - 6th June especially - whether it's a village picnic or an exhibition, a competition or a pageant, or any other suggestion, we'd love to hear from you.

NATURE NOTES by Bryan Yorke

Another year and what will it bring? It's been a strange start with some things. On January 2nd, Swallows were recorded at Filey, Bempton and Withernsea on the East Coast which made them the earliest January records in Yorkshire for 191 years. Speckled Wood butterflies were recorded in Cardiff on 14th January, Lots of geese have been seen heading North (or returning), but that is early! I wonder at times if this all has something to do with it being so mild.

Getting back to the regular, our local Dalton Hall Great Spotted Woodpeckers have been heard "drumming" (14th Jan), Dunnocks and Song Thrushes are singing their repertoires. Even the local starlings are mimicking the Curlew, absolutely fabulous to hear them.

I was walking up Vicarage Lane and I could hear this beautiful bird call from over in the fields, coming from a tall rushy area in Mike Taylor's field. At first I just could not find the bird but it made a nasal sort of "cloy-ying" call and reminded me of a bunting type of call. I knew it wasn't a Reed Bunting and wondered if it was some rare bird. But lending some patience eventually the bird came into view and guess what? I was caught out, it was the Great Tit doing a call I had never heard before. Some say Great Tits can do up to 50 different calls, and I once read in a RSPB document that they can do up to 200 varied calls. Whatever the true answer they are always there waiting to surprise you with yet another new varied call.

I have found it most pleasurable looking through all the lichens which you find on twigs and small branches that have fallen from the trees. There are so many types and they are beautiful in their varying shades of blues, greys, greens and orange. I see them as something really special and plentiful in this area especially in Dalton Crags and also on Hutton Roof. I actually bought a book called Lichens (An Illustrated Guide to the British and Irish Species by Frank S. Dobson). I believe it's an authoritive work and it's a superb book which shows photos of most of them. Unfortunately photos do not take you all the way to identification; it takes a lot more than that. I may have bitten off more than I can chew with this one, but I shall persevere and also keep asking questions of my many friends who can usually provide some answers.

It's good to see the croziers of the Harts Tongue Fern, and even more interesting to see the croziers of the Holly Fern in readiness for their 2022 appearances. I am still finding some of last year's ferns in good order. (Editors' note: a crozier is the curled top of a young fern frond)

I will need to get out soon and check out our local Skylarks which will soon be back on territory. I usually get my first in late January or early February calling from Dalton Crags.

Maybe you would like to check my other wildlife sites.

You may fancy checking out my "I Love Arnside and Silverdale" Nature Blog, again this shows lots of photos from local Burton areas and my nature studies in more depth. Memories of Queen's Silver Jubilee 1977

As we look forward to the Platinum Jubilee celebrations this summer, here are some memories of the Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977, provided by Kath Hayhurst.

There was a Royal visit to Cumbria by Prince Charles in May, and by the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh to Lancaster in June. A headline in the Lancaster Guardian the same month was 'Burton's week of Fun'. Fund raising began in February, and included Jumble sales, house to house collections, and donations from marmalade and toffee sales, dominoes drives, Mothers Union, and Ladies football.

In April, the youth club had a sponsored dance, and there was a darts match at the Kings Arms. The Parish Council ordered a seat to be put near the M6 bridge on Station Lane, and said the Market Cross was to be cleaned, and the lost block of stone on the top of the column to be replaced. In May donations came from Dalton Parish meeting, a tug-of-War, the Conservative coffee morning, a Bowling club raffle, a 200-club disco, a W.I. fashion show and 'It's a Knock-out'.

The village events began on Sunday June 5th with a Family service in the church. On Monday, there was a Family Treasure Hunt, and badminton games in the hall, as well as a teenagers 5-a- side football competition on what became known as the Jubilee field, with an entrance from Boon Town Lane; then called Post Office Lane. In the evening at the Hall, a Ball with a carving buffet was held.

On Tuesday, the parade of Kings, Queens and many adults and children walked down the Main Street in fancy dress. Then on the field the Jubilee Queen was crowned. There was the playgroup band and the Brownies danced round the Maypole. The best decorated Crown, Hat, Doll, Action Man, Pushchair, Pram, Trike and Bike were judged. This was followed by a Rounders knock-out for the girls and 7- a- side football match for the boys. After tea in the Memorial Hall 240 Jubilee mugs were given to the children under 12, In the evening Jubilee coins were given to the 13–16-year-olds, followed by a social, and lighting the beacon.



On Wednesday there was a Table Tennis tournament in the Hall, and a fun swim at Capernwray. On Thursday a fun pet show was held on the hall car park. On Friday an Exhibition of Local History, Art and Craft and Floral displays was held in the Hall, followed by a Jubilee Concert in the evening, given by the Brownies, the Drama Society, the W.I., and the Pensioners Group.

On Saturday in the grounds of Curwen Woods there were more events; a grass track for cyclists, Go-cart timed runs, and a Soap Box Derby. At the Canal there was a fishing match. About 30 medals with given to the various sport winners. In the Autumn the W.I. planted the four trees in the Memorial Hall car park.



Vicar's Letter...

Sick with worry

Dear friends,

While the world has been fretting about you-know-what, another disease has been sweeping our nation, an even more damaging epidemic of depression, loneliness and worry.

One type of therapy used to help those with mental health struggles focuses on identifying and changing unhelpful patterns of thinking and behaviour that are out of step with reality. It involves learning to speak truth to yourself, reminding yourself what is really real.

If I were to develop, for example, a fear of going out then a therapist might explore what lies behind this. My fears would need to be questioned. What am I afraid of? How likely is this to happen and how serious would it be? How do I know? What are the thoughts or actions that trigger my fear? How can I avoid them? Can I begin by going somewhere local and non-threatening and move slowly towards the full citycentre experience? This seems to me a sensible approach – we all have irrational thoughts and beliefs and sometimes they need challenging.

Is this what Jesus was doing when he told the crowd not to worry (recorded in Matthew 6)? Jesus challenges them, "Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life?" I don't suppose any hands went up. Jesus reminds them that their worry does them no good, as, deep down, they already know.

"Do not worry about tomorrow," says Jesus, "for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own." Again, he is reminding them of reality. Thinking too far ahead just piles up all the problems onto today.

But Jesus' central message is that they shouldn't worry because they have a heavenly father who provides for his children, just as he faithfully feeds the birds and beautifully clothes the flowers.

If that is not true then Jesus is asking them to focus on myths which will only lead to disillusionment and deeper worry. But if there is a powerful and wise God who is a father to those who put all their trust in his Son then this is the ultimate therapy. Such a truth would be the deepest of all truths, the really real thing in our universe.

Learning to speak this truth to ourselves each day would not only challenge our everyday worries but would show us the answer to our deepest fears.

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

A Dalton Book

I have just come across a book, originally in the library of Dalton Hall, which was probably dispersed in the 1960's when the Hall was rebuilt. It is now in the archives at County Hall, Kendal, and seems at first glance to concern only Burton.

It is an 'illuminated' book presented to the chatelaine of the Hall to commemorate her major contribution to the Victorian restoration of the church building. Bound in beautiful embossed blue leather it is illustrated with a colourful and highly decorated inscription; which also bears a photograph of the benefactress and the frontispiece is a large photograph of the restored church.

The inscription reads:

"To Mrs Hornby of Dalton Hall. We the undersigned parishioners of Burton, Westmorland, feel that the re-opening of our ancient Parish Church ought not to pass by without some expression of our thanks for the substantial aid vou have rendered us in its admirable restoration. We therefore desire now to record our grateful appreciation of this one of many acts of kindness shown by you to our Parish, since you came to reside amongst us, and we pray that Almighty God may long spare you to worship in this venerable House of Prayer, which has thus been rendered more worthy of His honour. Burton, December 1872, William Chantel de Boinville, Vicar, Isaac Nutter, Henry Cock, Church Wardens."

There then follows the signatures of over 300 Burton people. The most common surnames include; Wilkinson, Titterington, Bainbridge and O'Dwyer. Others were Mayor, Carden, Fearnside, Garnett, Thompson, Stodart, Backhouse, Eglin, Gee, Mattinson, Jackson, Walling, Sewell, Corless, Sandham, and Crayston. Surprisingly the last name only occurs four times, although for the next 100 years and more they abounded in the parish.

Interestingly, thirty people could not sign their name and could only make their mark with a cross. They included five members of the Armer family, Margaret and John Docker, Joseph and Nancy Wilkinson, Ann Ellison, Mary Wilson, John and Grace Coulthwaite, and Jeminah Walch. Their unabashed illiteracy shows how much the Act of 1870 making elementary education available for all had been needed.
