

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

April Council News

To recap on Local Government Reorganisation; Cumbria County Council and the six District Councils will be dissolved from the 1st April 2023. They will be replaced by two Unitary Authorities: Westmorland with Furness and Cumberland. In opposition to this the leader of Cumbria County Council went ahead with a Judicial Review as his preference was for Cumbria to be a single Unitary Authority. The single county option and the Judicial Review were both rejected in a free Council vote in August and, since then, two appeals have also been rejected so the matter is finally closed. I supported a motion that the cost of the appeals, about £45,000, should be published.

The main financial news is that increased Central Government funding has enabled there to be no increase in the County's Share of the Council Tax for 2022-23. However, the 2% premium for Social Services will be levied –so our 'rates' will still go up by 2%.

On highways the county will benefit from government funding for repairing potholes from a share of £450m granted in 2021 of which Cumbria got £12m. As I believe that South Lakeland alone could spend all that amount in the district, I supported a motion to take back the £10m put in reserves last year so that it could be added to the road repairs fund.

Personally, I have resumed my pothole surveys round the Lower Kentdale Division so please let me know of the latest potholes and other highways blemishes.

At the council I also supported a motion to freeze member's pay rather than accept a recommendation to support a rise in line with staff pay increases. The police and Crime Commission rate is rising by a maximum of 9.99% to help pay for 143 additional officers who have joined since 2018.

Meanwhile, the Covid figures are coming down but with disproportionate rates in different age groups. For example, cases are down for children and up in the 40-59 age group. In the last week of February there were 315 cases in Cumbria. Nevertheless, all Cumbria's free vaccination centres will close by 31st March.

Finally, on one of my local concerns; charging points for electric vehicles. Although the number of charging points per EV is reasonably high in Cumbria, t I am still pressing for charging points to be installed, soon, in the villages.

We will also have our popular pop-up cafe by Jan's Pantry in the Reception Room, and the previously mentioned used book shop in the Club Room. Admission is £1 for adults and accompanied children under 12 go free.

NATURE NOTES by Bryan Yorke

I hope you will all be as excited as I am to see the very first Chiffchaff of the year! Well, they are here, there and everywhere with recorded sightings turning up daily, maybe a few days earlier than the norm. The Burton News editor, Matthew, even noted one calling a few days ago (15th March) from the footpaths by the side of the Royal Hotel, which I think must be the earliest record for Burton. Usually, the first heard is "Thorn" (from Thornleigh) who turns up around the 25th.

Coming through before the 25th can be very dangerous for Chiffchaffs if frost appears in their initial arrival days. They are insectivores and frost can make the little birds go down to the floor in desperate search of food. About 8 years ago, we had an entry number in Burton village of about 33 pairs of birds but within a fortnight this number had drastically depleted to about 16 pairs. Because they came through so early and frost had taken over by the time they arrived here and there just was not any available food for them.

Although I was very worried at the time, I contacted Peter Lack at the BTO, and was reassured that this happens approximately 1 year in 10, but that they should make a speedy recovery. Sure enough, within about three years their numbers were back to normal.

We have some Chiffchaffs with strange and rather different calls. In Lancelot Clark Storth (see map), you may hear one I named "Miss A Note" who missed notes out every now and again and, again in Lancelot, there was another which sang really fast "chiff- chaff, chiff-chaff" without coming up for air! I called him "Speedy Gonzales!"

The pre-breeding repetitive "Chiff- Chaff, Chiff- Chaff" is replaced from about mid June by a very gentle "hou- whit" hou- whit", in contrast to its cousin the Willow Warbler which does have a similar call. In Burton today we have around 40 (revised) breeding pairs of Chiffchaffs and if you look at the map you will see just where they are located. So why not have a walk and see if you can find them?

Again, for walkers, it will be great to have Dalton Crags again filled with the sounds of Blackcaps, Garden Warblers, and Redstarts. The prolific and successful Garden Warblers which can usually be seen in close proximity to the Plain Quarry Car Park.

It's fantastic to see the early buds and flowers like Lesser Celandine carpeting Slape Lane. On a warm day it's just like the sun is staring up at you. For me, Celandine marks the start of milder, warmer weather leading up to a fabulous time of the year. The Blue Moor Grass on Hutton Roof it will be coming out now.

Another favourite of the early flowers just has to be the primrose and cowslips. But even more special maybe the rare False Oxlip which we do have just a couple of plants in Burton. They are the hybrid between both the primrose and the cowslip. I have managed to capture the extent of this fabulous plant (see online https://floraofhuttonroof.blogspot.com/2021/05/primula-hybrid-x-polyantha-hybrid.html



Fitness Is Fun!


Previous articles have covered: making exercise a habit; cardio and strength, so the next component in the quest to become fitter is stretching. Very often neglected, apart from a quick couple of minutes after a workout, stretching has loads of benefits and can easily be done at home as a session on its own.

With age, muscles shrink and tighten, and we become less flexible, which may make us more susceptible to aches, pains and perhaps injury. That doesn't sound great....but stretching increases blood flow to the muscles, can help increase the range of motion of joints and lead to a better posture. Sounding better?

As always, ensure you're performing the stretch correctly. I'm not mentioning specific stretches as there's no space for the comprehensive description / illustrations necessary but aim to stretch all the major muscle groups. **Be gentle with yourself**. A stretch is exactly that and should never cause pain, so don't force it, but allow your body to dictate how far you can go.


Flexibility will improve over time; straining may well end in injury!

Whilst doing a stretch routine, focus on your breathing, counting 4 for the inhalation and 4 for the exhalation and straight away you're into a meditation and relaxation. Hold each stretch for a minimum of 3 complete breaths building up this number as flexibility improves. As you exhale, you may be able to go a little deeper into the stretch.



Anything that improves the quality of life has got to be worth it. Right? Enjoy a jolly good stretch.

Vicar's Letter...

Divided and torn apart Dear Friends,

The Archbishop of Canterbury has recently said that "war and violence is never an answer". But, while I agree that unprovoked aggression is entirely wrong, I am not sure what justification he has for rejecting the understanding that has been shared by Christians for centuries that defence of one's country can be justified.

Of course war is always truly terrible and the immense suffering of people on both sides of the current conflict is heart-rending. But if an invader begins to wreck your country and inflict horrible suffering on your people, and if he won't leave when asked politely or pressured in other ways, I wonder what would the Archbishop thinks you should do?

From at least the 4th Century onwards Christians have overwhelmingly agreed that defending the nation is a responsibility that God has laid on each ruler or government, and that going to war will sometimes be right. The wideranging tests of a 'Just War' have included:

- 1. Will our action be defensive, rather than aggressive?
- 2. Is war the last resort in this situation?
- 3. Will the means we use be in proportion to the threat we face?
- 4. Will we avoid targeting civilians?

I'll leave you to discuss whether those questions have been asked in recent conflicts, including those that our nation has been involved in.

Jesus is the Prince of Peace and every war involves at least one side (and often both) refusing to submit to his loving rule. Jesus is the Prince of Peace but he has warned us that his kingdom will grow <u>slowly</u> as people, families and nations - one by one - stop fighting against Him and accept his authority in their lives.

For a world that gives up its resistance to Jesus, the end is clear: "He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away." (Revelation 21:4)

But, while evil continues in the world, being prepared to fight remains a tragic necessity.

"Almighty Father, whose will is to restore all things in your beloved Son, the King of all: govern the hearts and minds of those in authority, and bring the families of the nations, divided and torn apart by the ravages of sin, to be subject to his just and gentle rule" (Prayer for Remembrance Sunday)

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE by Roger Bingham

HARD TIMES IN BURTON AND HOLME 170 YEARS AGO.

The mid-nineteenth century was the high peak of the Industrial Revolution which saw the mechanisation of production in big factories operating on coal powered steam engines. As a result, some villages in Lancashire and Yorkshire expanded into huge towns approaching city status. The opposite happened in South Westmorland where industry and workers drifted away to towns based on the coal fields. As a result, weaving and spinning by hand along with mills dependant on water wheels were already declining by the 1840s. In particular, wool working and other textile manufacture like cotton cloth woven at Milnthorpe, and flax fashioned into linen at Holme Mills declined. Despite its name, Holme Mills was (and is) mainly in Burton as the parish boundary cuts across the settlement.

In 1849, Mannex's guide stated, "Here is a large mill with coarse linen and sacking manufactory at which upwards of 500 hands are employed." The work was not easy, as John Somervell recorded in 1930 "Mr Jas. Wadeson tells me that he worked there in William Waithman's time (about 1850) as a boy of 9. The working hours were 6 to 6 Monday to Friday and 6 to 4 on Saturday. His wage was 1s/6d per week." This is perhaps £6 in 21st century values. Jas's older sisters were "wet spinners" which meant that their clothes were wet from waist downwards all day but their wage at 4s/6d was higher. Happily, these difficult conditions did not last much longer for in 1854 the Lancaster Gazette reported "We regret to announce the failure of a house

extensively engaged in the flax trade. The long established and highly respected firm of Messrs Waithman and Co., of Holme Mills, near Burton, suspended payment on Saturday last. We are informed they were stopped at the instance of the Kendal Bank, to whom they are supposed to be heavily indebted. ... We fear this event will occasion much distress."

Inevitably, harder times hit immediately for, on 4th October, the vicar of Holme, Rev Samuel Moon, appealed for help to alleviate "the present condition of the manufacturing poor...... The Kendal Board of Guardians (workhouse authorities) have kindly administered relief, as far as the law permits; but I am anxious to augment it with providing a few additional comforts, particulary among those who have families of young children, as well as the widows and fatherless. He also suggested himself as almoner "without the slightest reference to religious opinions." The ecumenical note, possibly, was significant as many workers were Roman Catholics while Mr Waithman was a Quaker and might favoured his fellow 'Friends' at Holme Mills. So, relieving the distress was an early organised form of non-sectarian Christian Aid.

Later the mills were re-opened by Edward Shepherd 'who had some insight into cocoa matting trade as a governor of Wakefield prison which produced various types of coco goods.'

The prison reference might underlie a myth relayed by Burton and Milnthorpe people that their neighbours at Holme were once convicts though, despite cyclical hard times, they never reached that depth. RKB.

Anita's Recipes

This month I thought I'd make a few suggestions for Easter treats – I've based them on shop-bought items but you can, of course, make yours from 'scratch'! A rainy day activity for those with children on school holidays

1 - A traditional Easter cake is the Simnel Cake. This is usually a cake topped with a layer of marzipan and decorated with marzipan balls – 11 to represent Jesus' disciples apart from Judas Iscariot. Why not use a shop-bought cake, or if you prefer home-baked use your favourite recipe, and decorate it.



2 - Easter is also a time when we think of new birth — so why not buy or make some cupcakes and decorate them to look like spring lambs? You can top the cakes with buttercream then cover the butter cream with mini marshmallows and add faces and tails using fondant icing. Eyes can be formed with icing, or shop bought edible eyes or sugar balls can be used.



3 - Another Spring themed treat is meringue nests. Why not 'glue' some together to form a wreath using cream (or icing), fill them with melted chocolate and coconut, and top them with sugar or chocolate eggs. A chocolate duck could be placed on a few, too, as an extra treat!



4 - Hot Cross Buns, although available in shops all year round (or so it seems!), are also seasonal – traditionally eaten on Good Friday – and inexpensive enough that it really doesn't seem to be worth putting in the effort to bake them at home! For a twist on the traditional, why not make (or buy) cookies or biscuits and mark them with an icing or melted chocolate cross?



I hope these give you some ideas; it would be great to see pictures of your creations especially if you try out any of the above ideas.


