us a renewed sense of responsibility!

A comment was made that there could be more of interest to young children and families. The first weekend in June will see the Queen's Jubilee celebrations. There will be a flower festival in the church and Burton Singers will hold a concert. Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

EDITORS NOTE: There is no District or County Council News from Roger Bingham this month - in view of the elections being held on 5th May. However, we include instead the Annual Report from the Parish Council.

Burton-in-Kendal Parish Council Chairman's Annual Report 2021/22

During my research for this year's report, I looked back over the last year's minutes and agendas and noted that the meetings seem to be getting shorter and shorter. I have no idea whether we are getting more efficient or there are less items to deliberate over. I believe it is probably the latter. One thing to celebrate this year was that we have not had any zoom meetings. Something, which I'm sure, everyone is grateful for.

This year the Council has had a change in personnel. Last May the Parish Council elections took place a year late due to the pandemic. At the time there was one vacancy on the council and Councillor Hopwood decided not to stand for re-election. therefore the Council was returned unopposed; followed by the co-option of Danny Wilson. I am sure Danny will be a great asset to the team. Unfortunately, we have now received the resignation of Councillor Paul Rogers who has been a very active member of the Council for 20 years. This now leaves us again with two Casual Vacancies. If anyone is interested in becoming a Councillor please contact the Clerk or speak to a current councillor for further information.

During the last year we have also said good bye to our long suffering Burton News correspondent John Mackness and co correspondent Kathryn Smith. We will miss their balanced and good humoured approach. Our new press correspondent is Anita Shelton and we wish her well in this role.

Planning permission numbers were up on last year and it would seem the housing market within the village is buoyant with houses selling quickly. The affordable housing scheme is well underway at the top of Boon Town. This, unfortunately, has caused some upset to the existing residents due to the construction traffic. It is hoped that the inconvenience will be short lived. Finally, this year there seems to be a light at the end of a very long tunnel for the residents of Church Bank. With the Council having assurances that most of the planning issues on this site are to be met.

Several topics are never far away and are visited time and again. Parking is the one that is visited repeatedly. I am sure that with Burton evolving around the horse and cart rather than being designed for a motor car, this will be spoken about for many years to come. On the back of this, in August last year a 'Car Parking Working Group' was created to see what could be achieved. It was felt that if the Council did not attempt to come up with alternative provisions for parking residents would park in highly inappropriate and dangerous places. The Working Group identified two areas to focus on. The first being to identify a potential village car park, and is there need for such a provision? Two potential sites were identified, and landowners approached. One landowner declined and the other was tentatively interested. An advertisement was placed in two

editions of the Burton News and the Parish Council website to assess interest and need. With only 3 residents expressing any interest, this project has been put on hold. The second area of focus was to investigate where cars could park on the roads. This will also help with another perpetual village issue, speeding. A meeting was set up with Highways engineers and in February, the group walked the village with her and explained our issues. A plan is to be drawn up for parking boxes to be placed around the village in desired parking places. Once these plans are approved, then funding for the project will be sought. During the meeting, the village car park at the top of Boon Town was looked at, as we believe that with a redesign the space could accommodate more vehicles. This car park is thought to be owned by Norfolk Property Services (NPS) and they have been approached previously regarding two pieces of grass owned by them on Boon Town but have declined any negotiations regarding changing those areas to car parking.

On the subject of speeding, it has been decided that another speed survey be done using the Parish's SID, so that we could pinpoint specific problematic times and areas. This information will be then passed to the Police so that a targeted approach could be used. The Highways engineer also informed us that the slow markings at the entrance to the village are to be upgraded and refreshed. This is thanks to the dogged determination of Councillor Bingham, pressurising Highways on the Parish Council's behalf.

This year, 2022, marks Her Majesty The Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The Parish Council have purchased fruit trees which have been donated to Burton Morewood school children. This is following the Queen's wishes to produce a lasting memorial in the form of 'A Green Canopy' in celebration of her 70 year reign.

The PSiCA scheme is still ongoing with a long snagging list still awaiting attention. Some of the work is to be carried out by a local builder so it is hoped that this will be carried out quite quickly. The work on the carriageway however may take some time.

I, finally, need to thank my fellow Councillors, who give their valuable time to represent the Parish's interests on many other organisations' committees – this includes Burton Educational Foundation, Burton Recreation Trust, Memorial Hall Management Committee, Quarry Liaison Committee, Burton Morewood School Governors, Fireworks Working Party, Lengthsman Coordinator, Plain Quarry Working Group, Playground Maintenance, PSiCA and the newly formed Parking Working Group.

I would also like to thank our local press representative who sits through our mercifully short meetings trying to find content for her own reports, our Lengthsman, David Holmes for his tireless work keeping the Parish in good order, District Councillors Cooper and Harvey and District and County Councillor Bingham for their regular attendances and taking our views forward at a higher level. Last, but not least, our Parish Clerk who works tirelessly chasing up various County and District departments by phone and email as well as looking after the admin and finances, making these meetings run as smoothly as they do.

Notes from the Parish Council Meeting held on Thursday 21st April 2022

I was delighted that the number of members of the Burton community (two plus myself) almost equalled the number of Councillors (three plus the Clerk) albeit due to the low number of councillors present!

One of those present had chosen to attend due to Item 8 on the agenda – concerned that the Parish Council may be drawn into party politics. Essentially, a claim has been made in the election literature sent to residents that certain improvements are down to that party, when in fact the Parish Council was instrumental in achieving these. The Chair assured the resident that party politics is not of interest to the Parish Council – but accuracy and truthfulness is. It was agreed by the Council that (in accordance with advice from CALC) a letter will be drafted and sent to SLDC Monitoring Officer to seek advice.

The bin in the Square has been repositioned; the doggy bag dispenser will be sited nearby. Benches will be installed in due course, following consideration of the best positions for them. Parking and Speeding issues continue; the Speed Indicator Device will be moved and data collected from a range of positions to identify times and places most affected, and the maximum and average speeds at which vehicles are travelling.

NATURE NOTES by Bryan Yorke

The long Easter Weekend - A lovely spring morning and I was desperate to get out and explore some of our local countryside, woodlands and areas close to home near Slape Lane. Huffing and puffing despite Ventolin, I was getting out and nothing was going to stop me! I had been having visions of tracking down the rare hybrid called the False Oxlip (Primula x polyantha). I found it last year and it's now one of my favourite species.

I was again enjoying the woodland and all it had to offer with the calls from my first Willow Warblers of the year, and a local Chiffchaff, also the bonus of Marsh Tits and Nuthatches and Goldcrest. The flowers were springing through with the obvious Dogs Mercury taking the lead followed by Wood Anemone, Primrose, Bluebells, and, here and there, Ground Ivy, Moschatel, Yellow Pimpernel, Greater Stitchwort and just breaking through Water Avens. It won't be long before the buds are showing on the fantastic Bush Vetch which just must be my number two favourite of the Spring. It's all there for the next week or two.

On Good Friday, in one of the ancient woodlands, I found a really large Moschatel population which must have spread over 12ft diameter on the woodland floor in close company with Ground Ivy. I love this little plant and you can see why they also call it the "Town Hall" Clock because it shows four side by side clock faces. Ground Ivy seemed to be everywhere, I have never seen so much and interspersed with it yellow Primrose and Wood Anemone. I love to find Wood Anemone which are beautiful white starlets, some of them covering 2", but as the month progresses I usually can find odd specimens which start to show a little mixed colour ranging from pinks to purples, this colour seems to frequent with Moschatel, or 'Town Hall Clock' age. I did find one showing in the carpet which had just started to get some of the pink

This is where I hunted for, and found, the False Oxlip, a hybrid between the Primrose and the Cowslip. This one today was even more special, having six (instead of five) lovely mid yellow-coloured petals. Possibly not at its best yet - give it another fortnight, but I am so pleased it's made an appearance this year.

(blushing).

I roughly surveyed the full area of Slape Lane and found a good split population of fabulous Goldilocks buttercups with most concentrations in the first third of the bridleway.

These are easily missed amongst the deepened backdrop of Lesser Celandine providing even more greens and yellows gems all along the Lane. I have taken photos galore to make up a new page for my online "Flora of Hutton Roof." https://floraofhuttonroof.blogspot.com/

Also, in the bridleway banks were lots of fresh growing Greater Stitchwort and early leaves and their tendrils of Bush Vetch soon to be budding up. Perhaps too early for Red Campion, Cleavers and lots and lots of Cows Parsley, Hogweed, on their way. Just a little further along the bridleway and soon you notice some drop walls looking like horse jumps leading into some private woodland which is a bluebell wood in the making. Not far from here is a stronghold for the beautiful "Water Avens" (Geum rivale). Look carefully in another 2 to 3 weeks and you may even be lucky enough to see the rare hybrid which has a lovely yellow (instead of red) drooping flower.

It was not long before I was entering Lancelot Clarke Storth (part of the nature reserve) and here looking over the wall I could see small Herb Paris on their way and further up, my first-of-the-year Spring Sandwort and Sweet Woodruff.

Lancelot is not just a good area for Spring Sandwort, but over the next month or two will be a stronghold for the Common Rock Rose and the Northern Brown Argus Butterfly, also Spring Cinquefoil, Field Madder, Angular Solomons Seal, Lily of the Valley, Scarlet Pimpernell, Common Cow Wheat and the rare grasses of Birds Foot Sedge and lots and lots of Blue Moor Grass.

My eye was immediately taken on this little posey of Rue Leaved Saxifrage, they are always something very special if you can actually manage to photograph them without the wind getting in the way.

The Chiffchaffs were first heard during the late days of March and were followed by our first Swallows, reported over Main Street on 13th April. Several Willow Warblers were seen and heard up Slape Lane around the 15th April. Blackcap has been seen up by Pickles Wood and Garden Warblers and Cuckoos are expected any day now. Enjoy your Spring sunshine!

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE by Roger Bingham

BURTON SCHOOL - HEADMASTER TRIBULATIONS

I have been delving into Inspectors' reports on Burton National School, in the 1860s when Richard Newton was in Charge. The school was at Church Bank and had about 60 pupils aged between 6 and 11. The Curriculum, based on the 'Four R's' -Reading, Writing, Arithmetic and Religion', was tested fortnightly. At the end of each term examinations were attended by parents and villagers. Thus, in 1867 Mr. Newton noted, "The Rev. Wm. De Chastel de Boinville questioned the children on the first 12 Chapters of St. Matthew's Gospel. John Rowlandson & John Skirrow truanted the whole of the day. Punished them before all the rest of the children as a warning for others." "Punishment" was also recorded for such crimes as: eating nuts in class; inattention; making seven mistakes in arithmetic and walking on the desks.

Attendance could be lackadaisical. On 8th February 1867 there were "19 absent for Callap Monday" ('callaps' were rissoles eaten the day before Pancake Tuesday). In March "attendance very poor, the cause Burton Fair", 9th June "very wet day 17 absent" and 17th June "several children absent on account of the Hav Harvest." Holidays were at different times from today but always included Ash Wednesday –after a compulsory Church Service, 'Whit Wednesday' and a long Summer Holiday from the end of June to beginning of August. Several special occasions and holidays are recorded: 20 February 1865 "a delegation of 12 children presented Miss Hornby with a silver pencil case on the occasion of her marriage"; 22nd February "holiday in honour of Miss Hornby's marriage"; 27th June "half

day holiday in honour of the Rev. Canon Morewood's birthday". Momentously, on 27 May 1867, Mr Newton noted "The Sunday Scholars assembled at School in the afternoon to march to the site of the new Infants School (where the present school stands) to witness Mrs Morewood lay the foundations". 21st August "an excellent coffee feast was given to the Sunday School by their worthy (new) Vicar the Rev. de Boinville. 150 children attended the feast".

Poor Mr Newton also had to teach the Sunday School and a night school. The latter was not successful for the inspectors said there were only 9 students and as they had met only 49 times in the year "My Lords are not disposed to grant 2s/6d per scholar as the required minimum of 60 meetings has not been met". Her Majesty's Inspectors could be as harsh as modern day OFSTED!

In 1866 only "fair success" was noted and the "discipline is still not quite strict enough; the children are allowed to talk to one another and prompt one another." "It is hoped that Instruction in Sewing will be enforced on all Girls who can be safely entrusted with a needle. At least six hours during the week should be set apart for sewing". In 1868 the Inspectors were pleased with religious knowledge but still, "care must be taken to keep up the discipline which is certainly not too strict now." They were not, however, pleased with the school building: "As many children do not wear wooden soled boots (clogs), a boarded floor is desirable." Evidently, the complaint about footwear set a trend for in 1993 the OFSTED Inspectors at a Lancaster Comprehensive regretted that so many pupils were wearing trainers and not 'proper' shoes! RKB.

Fitness Is Fun! Core!!







Report of Burton News AGM - 2022

We held our Annual Public Meeting on the 19th April and were very grateful to the one member of the public who came along!

Your co-editors gave a brief report on their editing of Burton News since taking over in November last year. With 5 editions under our belts we feel we are getting to grips with the challenge and are enjoying it! In our first couple of issues we stuck very much to the previous layout, as we learnt the technical side of things (Scribus publishing software). We are grateful to Sarah for her training. This year we have begun to try out more new ideas, and are glad of the few pieces of feedback we've received - both verbally and via our recent survey (see Editorial for details).

Clive, our Treasurer, gave a summary of BN finances. The financial year runs from January to December. Annual running costs of printing, hire of the Hall for meetings, and the annual party for our volunteer distributors was circa £3,000 (of which around £2,800 is for printing). Income in 2021 came, as usual, from a mix of advertising revenue, subscriptions, and donations from our readers. Our advertising prices have been increased slightly for the first time in a number of years, but such revenue only covers about half our costs. Public donations & subscriptions were lower in 2021 at around £1,200 (circa £1,800 in 2020).

We finished 2021 with an excess of income over expenses of only £62.49. Reserves are held in our bank account, in the same way as is done for a charity. These are sufficient to cover the costs we would incur should Burton News have to close down, such as repaying advertiser fees and settling final bills of the printer etc. There is a risk that in 2022 we will see expenses exceed income, and that will put the continued production of Burton News under threat. Our next fundraising appeal will be later in the year and we hope that we may see increased subscriptions and donations to help; although we recognise that cost of living increases are affecting everybody.

In addition to the survey feedback our loyal reader in attendance said they would like to see articles giving an insight into the lives of those who live in the village. As you will see, we have taken that on board in our 'Writers Corner' request, opposite. There were no questions raised and so the 2022 AGM was closed. However, we are still open to feedback so please tell us what you think, and what you would like to see in Burton News in future!

Anita's Recipes

Buddha Bowl

Buddha Bowl is named after the shape of the bowls in which it is traditionally served. It is a one-dish meal containing a mixture of protein, grains and vegetables; often a dressing and toppings of nuts, seeds or herbs will be added. The following is a basic recipe that I follow to make up a dish to provide 4-6 servings.



Method

Measure 100-150g Couscous into a large casserole dish or serving bowl and add 125-175ml of boiling water. Mix well and leave for a few minutes until the water is all absorbed. Drain a tin of Chickpeas or Lentils and add to the couscous. Stirring between each addition, chop and add ham, cheese, cucumber, tomatoes, satsumas, apples, and any other ingredients that you enjoy.

Season with salt and pepper, mixed herbs and add the dressing of your choice. If liked, top with chopped mixed nuts and pumpkin seeds.

Vicar's Letter...

Mothballed?

Dear Friends,

I am just old enough to remember the deployment of 'Green Goddesses', fire engines from the 1950s brought out of retirement and driven by soldiers in 1977 while regular fire brigades were on strike.

Some people think of Jesus in a similar way. 40 days after his resurrection he was withdrawn from active service on this planet and returned to base. There he waits, still, for the day when our world is in such need that he will be brought out of retirement and will return to sort things out.

But 'retired' (and bored or restless?) is not at all how the Bible speaks of Jesus' life now. Yes, he sits at the Father's right hand because his great battle on the cross is over and his triumph is complete. But his seat is not a deckchair or a recliner; it's a throne from which he directs the course of world history.

When Jesus ascended it was to the place of all power and authority over heaven and earth (Philippians 2:9). Jesus sustains everything in this universe by his powerful word (Hebrews 1:3). He has sent out his heralds to 'make disciples of all nations' (Matthew 28:19) by announcing that he is graciously willing to offer peace and forgiveness now (Acts 2:38) before he returns 'to judge the living and the dead'.

I think some Christians prefer the idea of Jesus in passive retirement because they can then avoid difficult questions about the terrible suffering in the world on his watch. Jesus is, they think, a loving and sympathetic grandfather figure who can only wish that the world was a happier place.

But what if the Bible is right and Jesus is God and Lord? Then we will have to re-think our ideas about everything: what our lives are for, where the world is heading, and what is the good, loving and just way to rule the world, because the Lord Jesus clearly thinks very differently from us about how to do the job.
