

Burton Morewood School Ecowarriors and Politicians

This month, our news update comes from our Eco Committee and Eco Club and Pupil Parliament members. Over the last few months, the members of the Eco-committee and club have been busy working on projects linked to their chosen topics: Waste, Marine, and School Grounds.



After preparing an action plan and identifying roles and responsibilities, they carried out an audit to see how the school could reduce waste. The children checked every area of the school for recycling, dripping taps, whether computers and lights are turned off when not needed and much more. Signs to remind us all about lights and taps have now been created and are in the process of being put up; recycling paper, batteries, plastics and the photocopier cartridges happens across the school; fruit waste can now go in an accessible compost bin – one of two that we have been given. They agreed that Year 1 were the best recyclers – especially as their outdoor learning area has been created by repurposing and recycling items! As part of the Waste topic the committee accompanied Mr Wilson and Mrs Derrick to learn how to read the meters and why it was necessary. The committee want to check-up on the amount of food waste next.

The Marine project has had various curriculum links across the school. Year 2 performed a dance linked to the River Thames as part of Strictly Come Burton, Year 4 have looked at 'Misty Mountains, Winding Rivers' and Year 6 have studied the polar oceans as part of their 'Frozen Kingdoms' project. The Ecocommittee is busy planning activities and competitions relating to our rivers and oceans. They are looking forward to working towards improving the pond. Our final project area is 'School Grounds'. Litter picking takes place, the picnic tables have been re-arranged, an outdoor reflection area has been created and will be further developed.

Thanks to friends of the school, the children have been busy planting a range of herbs, bulbs, climbers and shrubs within the grounds to increase biodiversity. We are hoping to create a new pathway next. The children involved with the Eco-committee have been very enthusiastic and committed, working hard to improve the school environment. Within the next few weeks we hope to be able to announce that we have attained our 'Green Flag'.

If you have any skills to offer (our fruit trees will need pruning in the autumn) or would like to contribute compost, bark, plants etc towards their projects – please contact the school office. Pupil Parliament has begun in earnest again this year. Our 4 representatives from Year 5 and Year 6 have taken part in events outside of school, working with Parliament members from other schools on a range of subjects. They have learnt about different topics such as how to vote in Parliament and how to improve their presentations skills. In addition, they have shared with pupils in school how to take one small step towards a better world by switching off the lights when they leave the classroom, a wonderful collaboration with our Eco-committee!

June was the Royal Jubilee Month and the Hall was pleased to be able to hold a Jubilee Coffee Morning on Sat 4th June, where the main hall buzzed with happy conversations between families and friends. Several children came along to make crowns, and we almost sold out of cake! Thank you to everyone who came and supported the event. The following weekend we were thrilled to host the Summer Concert by the Burton Singers, which culminated in their last night of proms feature. It was a very enjoyable evening, and we look forward to the Singers returning in December with their Christmas Concert. The Hall also took place in the Jubilee Trail and was festooned with bunting from every available point!

June also saw our Annual General Meeting, at which I was re-elected as Chair for the coming year (maybe no-one else wants the job?!) and I thank the committee for another year's work to keep the hall going. Helen Dawson remains our bookings manager, Raegan Preston our treasurer, and I am pleased that all other members of the committee stood for re-election. The committee members are delighted to welcome Vicky Hughes (our new Unitary Authority councillor) as a co-opted member and that the ever-helpful Chris Nolan is once again the parish council representative for the coming year.

You may recall that last month I mentioned the benches that we found under the main hall floor, and I asked if anyone could throw some light on them. Mike Taylor got in touch to say that he recalled them being at the old school in the village when he was a lad, so maybe that was where they came from. If anyone knows more, please do say.

The planned refurbishment of the Reception Room Kitchen has been agreed and we are just awaiting a start date for it, whilst the car park will have repairs and remedial work take place in September. The date will be widely published in advance as all vehicles will need to be removed whilst the work is done.

Finally, on behalf of the hall committee I would like to offer our deepest sympathy to Sandra Yorke and her family, after Bryan's death at the end of May. Bryan was a strong supporter of the Hall and was the co-instigator of the Nature Talks at the Hall which we held pre-Covid and which we intend to resume this autumn. Our deepest sympathy also goes to Neil France and his daughter Danni, on the death of Ann, formerly of the Kings Arms, who died in June in Blackpool. Ann was also an enthusiastic supporter of our activities here at the Hall.

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

July Council News

As in my last report the attention of many officers and members has been diverted from everyday business by preparations for Local Government Reorganisation. It seems more difficult to contact members of staff, especially in planning, than previously; where because of a drop in new building works during COVID, pressure had been reduced.

Locally, I understand that my District Colleagues Tom Harvey and Brian Cooper are continuing to keep track of the Church Bank Gardens and Green Dragon developments which continue to drag on.

Attendance by members who will not be on the replacement Westmorland and Furness authority has also diminished. Even so, in the second week in June I attended meetings on every day. Very few topics touched on Burton. The longest meeting, that of County's Development and Control Regulation Committee, was mainly concerned with rights of way in North Cumbria which will be an area not covered by successor councillors. I hope future councillors will keep an eye on public access rights particularly to Farleton Knott and the Fell.

While attending the Jubilee Beacon on Heversham Head I noticed that, unlike in previous royal events, there were no beacons for Burton and Holme on Farleton Knott, nor for Milnthorpe and Beetham on Haverbrack, where public access was formerly permitted.

At SLDC's cabinet which I attend as a Shadow member most items concerned Kendal. They included a discussion about the 'pedestrianisation' of Stramongate which will include the planting of trees at its entrance from Blackhall Road. There were comments that new planting would help to compensate for the loss of trees in the Market Place and along the river Kent where, controversially, trees had been felled as part of the flood abatement work. On this scheme the go ahead was given to install glass panels along Aynham Road so that travellers could still glimpse the river. Concerns were reported of a rise in carbon pollution in Kendal streets. following a drop during lock-down. The Council aims to be Carbon Neutral by 2037.

Finally, I came across another new 'Council Speak' term in a report on risk management that '65% of risks were above appetite'. What does that mean? All the best –Roger.

Vicar's Letter...

Firming up

Dear Friends

Confirmation. It's not in the Bible but it is a rite that has been practised by churches for centuries. During a special service of Confirmation the bishop prays for each candidate in turn, that the Lord would confirm them in their faith in Jesus Christ by the good gift of his Holy Spirit to them. And each candidate confirms that they have turned away from their sin, that they are trusting in the Lord Jesus for forgiveness and they are following him as one of his disciples. A certificate is issued and names are entered into the register in the church. Some were baptised/Christened as children, and this is the natural progression – they are confirmed and begin to play their part as young adults in the church. Other young people have not been pointed in that direction but might still like an opportunity to hear more about Jesus and to think for themselves whether they intend to follow him in life or not.

From September we plan to begin a group that meets in Burton after school at 4.15pm (probably on Thursdays) for anyone in school year 6 and above. Over the course of several weeks we will go over what Christians have historically believed and give lots of opportunities for questions and discussion. Then, those who might want to find out more, and those who are thinking they would like to be confirmed at some point, will have the opportunity of continuing to meet to prepare themselves.

No-one who comes to the group will have to be confirmed if they decide not to proceed. Anyone can join the group – those who have never been baptised/Christened can be baptised at their Confirmation service if they choose to go ahead.

If this might be of interest to you or your son/daughter then please send me a quick email or text and I will contact you nearer the time with more details.

And if Thursday at 4.15pm is no good, or if you are much older than Year 6 but you would still like to talk about confirmation or baptism — I would be delighted to hear from you too. Many adults have never been baptised or confirmed so I think it will be quite common now to see people of all ages who want to declare their faith in Jesus Christ in these ways.

Parish Council Notes - from Anita Shelton

This was a lively meeting at times, with two members of the public in attendance as well as the Press rep (me!). Decisions were made and business carried out with occasional levity yet still with professionalism.

A quotation and suggestions for parking bays and road markings was circulated; this will be an agenda item at the next meeting. A member of the public has offered to co-ordinate a team of 10-12 volunteers to maintain a footpath through Slape Lane. This was welcomed and accepted. A formal proposal for the purchase of stone to alleviate the worst of the surface issues was requested.

At your Cervix ... Day in the Life of ... An Obstetrician

Adam Kay may have done a lot to illuminate the life of an Obstetrician (BBC "This is going to hurt") but, as an insider, I feel he misses the point. I will try and explain why – here is a typical day on the labour ward.

Handover is at 0830. Present in the handover room are the midwife coordinator of the day, me as the oncoming consultant, a specialist registrar (like Adam but this one is Katy) and a GP trainee, Simon. The night staff (registrar and junior doctor) look bedraggled and tired – they are at the end of a 12-hour shift and want to go to bed. The anaesthetic consultant and registrar also attend. There are 12 beds on the labour ward and 6 of them are occupied (this is a good start – it could be a lot worse).

As usual, the midwifery team are understaffed due to Covid sickness. One Mum has had a normal birth and is waiting to go to the postnatal ward. Another, let's say Sarah, had an emergency caesarean section yesterday. She is being treated and monitored for high blood pressure. Samira has been transferred to our unit from a neighbouring trust because she is possibly in premature labour and, at 23 weeks gestation, her own hospital would not be able to care for the baby. The next two rooms have women whose labours are being induced, Elena because she is diabetic and the Hannah because the baby has not been growing well on the last few scans. Elena has made it to the second stage of labour – this means the neck of the womb has completely opened and she is actively trying to push her baby into the world. She is Romanian and does not speak much English. Hannah is in the earlier stages and just started on a drip to get her contractions going, she is under the care of the ESMT (Enhanced Support Midwifery Team) because she is on Methadone and had her last baby removed because of domestic violence. The last woman to be handed over, Joanne, is in her second pregnancy, she had a caesarean section last time and her waters broke 2 days ago. The contractions started yesterday, and the labour has been progressing, although slowly. She now has a high temperature and the night staff have commenced intravenous antibiotics. She really wants a normal birth this time. There are also 4 ladies on the ward all having their labours induced for various reasons and another 4 due to come in later today. There is a patient on the intensive care unit who had a heavy bleed at caesarean section yesterday and there is still a planned caesarean section to do which had to be cancelled vesterday because of that emergency.

The next task is a quick round of the labour ward rooms. Sarah tells us she is going to call her new son Lucifer, but other than that, seems fine. Elena has now been pushing for 2 hours and is exhausted. Hannah is just starting to get some contractions. Joanne looks unwell and the baby's heart rate is fast. Her next examination is due in an hour. Katy goes to help Elena using an on-line interpretation service and I, and Simon, go to the antenatal ward. Halfway through seeing those patients the emergency bleep goes off and we hurtle back upstairs to be greeted with – "it's OK – the shoulders got stuck but we got it out". This is Elena's baby. Pulses coming slowly back to normal we go back downstairs to continue the round. I wonder if the interpreter is OK.

10am and Joanne has made no progress, a long conversation later she realises that things are not going as she had hoped, and she will have to have another caesarean section. At 10:30 she goes into theatre. Halfway through the procedure, Katy comes into theatre to tell me that Hannah's baby is showing signs of distress and she wants to take a blood sample to check its oxygen level. Simon and I finish up quickly and warn theatre they may need a rapid turnaround. The blood sample is borderline – meaning that it will need to be repeated in 30 minutes - but Hannah's cervix is now 8cm dilated so she is nearly there. We spend an anxious 30 minutes watching the baby's heart trace while both writing up our notes and then Katy goes back to do the second sample – stepping back quickly when she sees a head descending at speed to allow the student midwife to catch the baby.

It is now 1pm, thinking that the theatre staff should have had time for lunch, and we have a lull in proceedings I ask if we can send for the elective caesarean from yesterday. As this blocks the emergency theatre, I have to be reasonably sure that emergencies are not going to happen, always a judgement call. We do a team brief and then I have a few spare minutes to go to ITU to see if yesterday's patient is fit for transfer back – she is, and is desperate to see her baby. The transfer is arranged with the coordinator who needs to find (Knit? Grow?) a midwife to care for her. Katy is in theatre with Simon. The emergency buzzer sounds, Samira's waters have broken. The neonatal team are "crash bleeped". I gently examine Samira to find the baby is low down and feet first. As the neonatal team run in, I get Samira to give me one big push and a very tiny baby makes her early entrance to the world, to be put in a plastic bag for warmth and handed over to the experts. She has a long journey ahead of her even if all remains well but she is moving and trying to breath. The neonatal consultant is not impressed that we have sent him 3 babies today – Hannah's with low blood sugars, Joanne's for possible infection and this one – they are now full and closed to further admissions.

Elena is on her way to the ward, proudly cuddling her baby boy. 2 hours after giving birth, Hannah wants to go outside for "some fresh air". None of the midwives have had a lunch break. The coordinator arranges breaks and I review Sarah whose blood results and monitoring are all improving meaning that she, also, can go to the ward. Things are looking up when I get a call to triage (like A&E for maternity) to see 3 women who have been waiting an hour. One has had a scan showing reduced growth, one has an abnormal blood test result needing action and the third is the call that makes your heart sink, a woman who is covid positive whose baby is not moving at 19 weeks and the midwife cannot detect a heartbeat. This time, thankfully – through a barrier of PPE, I am able to see on our portable scan machine that the baby was just hiding and its heart is beating normally. A very emotional few moments with misting visors all round! Once in triage, it is hard to get away. When I take a breath, it is 5:30 and my replacement has arrived on the labour ward. The hand-over board is almost empty, there are just two new arrivals from the ward, the ITU patient and Joanna, still on iv antibiotics. My colleague asks what I have been doing all day!

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE by Roger Bingham

SOCIAL CHANGES IN BURTON HALF A CENTURY AGO

In 1969 houses were much in the news as the younger generation of baby boomers were beginning to go over to buying their own homes, in contrast to the immediate post war phase of rented council houses. Moreover, the recent 'Maude Report' had laid down that our rural villages should double in population. Hence Burton was witnessing the creation of Vicarage Close, Morewood, Mowbray and Thornleigh Drives, Hutton Close, Burton Park and a start to St. James' Drive.

An incredible reticence was shown in advertising houses which were generally not photographed, nor even an address given. Thus, for several weeks there was advertised 'a three bed modern detached bungalow with CH, 2 recept. and Tidy Garden in a quiet cul-de-sac in Burton R V £86'. But which cul-de-sac the House Agent was not letting on unless you contacted his office. The asking price for this property was £5,140 which was quite high as a one year old semi in Station Road was for sale at £3,550 and a brand new Russell's built semibungalow on Heron Hill in Kendal could be bought for £2,950. At the top of the market offers were invited for Borwick Hall – advertised as being 'One of England's Stately Homes'.

In the news was an account of a 24 year old Kendal man being fined for smoking Cannabis, a 17 year old Burton 'man' was fined £5 for damaging a fluorescent traffic bollard when walking home from a party at Heversham. Mr V Gray, headmaster of Milnthorpe Secondary School

addressed the Burton Women's Institute on 'The Child of The Future'. The Mother's Union visited Conishead Priory and Holme 'Old Aged Pensioners Club' went on a motor coach outing – to Bentham. Sadly 43-year-old Mr Dennis Wilson of Church Bank Farm was found dead 'from natural causes' in one of his fields.

New roads were causing much anxiety. A protest campaign was being orchestrated against the proposal to route the Levens Link Road (from the M6 at Crooklands to the soon to be opened Kendal Bypass) across the historic avenue of oaks in Levens Park. There were also salacious rumours of goings on at the workers encampments near Clawthorpe while an open verdict was recorded on a labourer who was crushed to death by a bulldozer on the stretch of the M6 being built between Burton and Tebay. I wonder what historical changes will be highlighted in another 53 years time. RKB.

Burton's Sky at Night

Unable to resist the editorial requests from Burton News here is a new article which, given sufficient interest, may appear on a seasonal basis. There are a few of us in the village who have more than a passing interest in astronomy and the skies above us once the clouds part and the stars appear. The pages of BN, as wonderful as it is, are not greatly suited to astronomy images so please take time to take a look on the Burton local FB pages. There has been somewhat of a revolution in amateur astronomy over recent years primarily down to the advances in digital photography and in the ability to process the images on the average home PC. Astrophotography is a branch of photography with its own alien language, immense setbacks & frustrations, a bottomless well of new gadgets and, eventually, the rewards akin to a child awakening on Christmas morning.

Looking through a telescope at objects on a clear starlit night can be exciting & rewarding but it's once you attach a camera to that telescope (or indeed telephoto lens) that the wonders of the universe start to be revealed. The reason for this is that our eyes are just not sensitive enough to see such faint objects. Once the camera is set up and attached to a tripod or tracking device you can leave the shutter open for long periods of time to collect and store the tiny amounts of light on to one image. This is then repeated many times and then all the frames are added together (this is a simplified potted version for some fairly nifty computer programmes and mathematics!). Indeed, for some images you might well be looking at a total exposure time of 15-20 hours.

Obviously, the likes of NASA and ESA don't spend billions of \$/£/€ putting telescopes of various types high above the atmosphere for nothing. Down here on 'terra firma' we are never going to reproduce the quality images we often see from the Hubble telescope, but it is quite remarkable what can be achieved from ones back garden with a little bit of effort and learning. I hope you enjoy some of the images online and the image opposite. Next time there is a clear starlit night, take a look upwards and just think how we are a part of a universe of amazing beauty as well as incredible awe and wonder.

In our Skies to look for this summer:

Around 3rd July, 1st Aug, & 31st Aug a crescent new moon setting in the west just after sunset.

Full Moons can be seen 12-14 July (Buck Moon), 11-13th Aug (Sturgeon Moon), and 9 -11th Sept (Corn Moon).

Views of the Milky Way, diving towards the southern horizon, are at its best from around midnight onwards in July, from 11pm August, and from 10pm in September.

Finally, if you are a very early riser (4AM) Venus Jupiter and Mars are visible in the eastern skies just before sunrise over next 2-3 months.


