



# **Burton are the Champions!... at Table Tennis**



For the first time in it's 36 year existence, Burton Table Tennis Club A team has achieved the dizzy heights of becoming First Division Champions of the Kendal and District TT League and will start the new season this winter with high expectations. Captained by Peter Baxendale, and ably assisted by his brother Stephen (both sons of former Burton vicar Paul Baxendale) and longstanding member Chris Knowles, they were helped on occasion by substitutes playing up from one of our other 4 league squads.

The Club actually started as the 'Libby's Table Tennis Club' in 1986 with just one team in the Kendal league and in 1988 the club moved to the Memorial Hall, initially playing in the 'Club Room'. In 1989 the club changed its name to 'Burton Table Tennis' Club and started coaching juniors.

As a friendly club, we have averaged a membership of 30 per annum and have welcomed players from as far afield as Carlisle, Keswick and Garstang! We currently use championship grade tables and the Memorial Hall committee has upgraded the lighting on 2 occasions such that our Club is widely considered to have the best facilities for table tennis in the region.

We welcome all standards, all ages, all genders and would be delighted to have disabled or wheelchair players come along as well! Our junior coaching is organized in term times by Martin Wakelin and our practice sessions are usually on Thursday evenings; they will start again on September 1st. The Kendal League season runs from October to April.

# **Burton Morewood School: Shakespeare Rocked!**

It was to my great delight that I was recently invited along to Burton Morewood school both to view and to take photos of their production of "Shakespeare Rocks" by Steve Titford. It was presented in the school hall by the year 5 & 6 children as their end of school year show.



The light-hearted musical comedy presents a whistle stop tour of many aspects of the life of William Shakespeare as well as highly amusing references to many of his works and characters. The show program states it is 'educational and historically accurate – to a point, artistic licence takes over for the sake of comedy'. When considering that comedy can be some of the hardest acts to pull off on stage the children negotiated this with a good deal of skill, clarity, and timing.





Whilst the audience may not have been rolling in the aisles they were fully engaged and laughing their way through the constant onslaught of gags and very well acted scenes and expressions delivered by their loved ones.

Highlights for me were the three witches and other cast members negotiating the naming of "that Scottish play" without actually saying the word (I dare not mention here now!); a beautiful scene involving Romeo and Juliet and two children delivering their lovely solo singing; an appearance of Bottom with his pants on fire and the dry comedy of the builders enroute to repair the Globe Theatre.

These are but a few that now spring to mind, and all was very well held together by the young man who played William Shakespeare along side other family members.

The musical numbers did not disappoint with range of styles all building together towards an excellent finale and encore with the usual highly polished standards we have come to expect from BMS.



The show also teaches the odd life lesson too, including that being yourself and reaching for the stars is so very important. It was as billed - energetic, tongue in cheek, and above all, thoroughly enjoyable. It certainly was.

As someone who was so involved in the team of people producing many BMS school shows over the years it was so heart-warming to see after two years of covid restrictions the children once again on stage and enjoying the whole experience of performing arts for their parents and members of our local community. 

## Bryan Yorke 3rd January 1948 – 28th May 2022



Bryan was born in Kent, but moved to Haslingden, in Rossendale, as an infant. His love of nature developed as a child; bird-watching on the local moors. After leaving school Bryan worked in a Haslingden factory, quickly attaining the post of foreman aged only 17. He and his wife Sandra first met when she was interviewed by Bryan for a job at the factory.

As a side-line, Bryan also began to act as an agent booking musicians for gigs at local clubs. After Sandra and he got married he did this full-time and Bryan Yorke Enterprises became a thriving business, representing many acts. By the 1970's he was working closely with TV and Radio shows such as 'The Comedians' and 'New Faces'. Bryan's blog about this period of his life can be found at

At the age of 21 Bryan was asked to stand as a councillor candidate for the local Labour Party. He became the youngest local councillor in the Rossendale area – clearly well respected in his community. In later years Sandra and Bryan changed course again and set up a successful roofing business together.

Despite a busy working and family life Bryan maintained his fascination with nature, spending time on the moors such as Haslingden Grane. He began his life-long task of 'visible migration' logging (vismig); reporting the movement of species as they flew through the Haslingden area. He was particularly fond of the meadow pipits to be found locally.

Family holidays involved lots of visits to nature reserves, camping, and generally enjoying the outdoor life. Bryan expanded his interests to learn as much as he could about butterflies and fungi. He also loved to visit India, falling in love with the country, and its people. Curries were a great favourite meal too!

Bryan and Sandra retired and came to Burton in 2009 when their daughter and her family also moved here. They soon became valued members of the community, taking on the role of 'paper boy & girl' for the village shop for many years. Bryan soon began to explore the nature of his local area, especially Hutton Roof; expanding his knowledge of the special ferns and other fauna that grow there.

Bryan was, of course, a stalwart of the Nature Talks held at the Memorial Hall, and a key member of the village Swift Study Group – of which more elsewhere in this edition of BN. He began writing a column for 'Burton News', as well as maintaining his prodigious range of on-line blogs about so many different topics.

Self-taught, as ever, he acquired the same deep expertise about ferns and flowers as he had for bird migrations, butterflies, and fungi.

Bryan's enthusiasm, modesty, and great communication skills saw him contribute regularly to a wide range of local magazines and specialist publications, as well as to local radio. He appeared on BBC local news in 2013, following his discovery of a 'holly fern' on Hutton Roof – a species not identified there for over 50 years.

Bryan was also interviewed on BBC 'Autumn Watch Extra' about his visible migration work and the bird life of the local area. Autumn Watch also featured some of Bryan's poetry and art works – yet another area of expertise for a hugely talented, yet eternally modest and unassuming, man. It is a lasting tribute to Bryan and his commitment to the natural world that one of the varieties of Hart's Tongue Fern to be found on Hutton Roof is named after him, Asplenium scolopendrium 'Crispum Yorke'. Bryan will be greatly missed, and long remembered, by all who knew him.



Bryan steadfastly led our swift watch evenings, since we began in 2013. He also recorded our observations and increased awareness of the village swifts through his articles and talks. His presence is deeply missed.




Thanks to Bryan's persistence and Graham Wilson's co-operation, we have been delighted to observe swifts entering five of the ten new swift sites in Oak Court. Also swifts have been seen entering one of the holes at the rear of The Royal Cottage. Instead of filling in the holes, pointing was carried out around them. This is a fine example of how to preserve nest sites that have been used for many years. A big thanks to Graham for doing that!

Cocking Yard, North View in the Post Office block and The Coach House remain strongholds. Essential work on Manor House has unfortunately prevented entry to the eight sites there, but it is hoped that they will be able to return next year. Whilst swifts are very loyal to their nest sites, our observations this year suggest that they can adapt quite quickly to use new sites nearby. They prefer high sites, so that when they and their offspring leave the nests they can drop down at first before flying off.

We meet on Thursday evenings at 8.30pm. Anyone is welcome to join us and help to spot swifts as they enter and leave their nests.

#### Remembering Bryan Yorke:

When I stood on my doorstep to pay my respects to Bryan Yorke, as his funeral cortège came past, two swifts whizzed by. "How fitting" I thought. It made me smile and I knew it would him too. I first met Bryan many years ago at a community meeting for people interested in monitoring swifts. I didn't live in Burton at the time, but I remember thinking what a cracking place it must be to live, because of how Bryan described the swifts zipping up Main Street and watching them going in and out of the many old houses that give our village such character. In fact it's one of the contributing factors to why my partner and I chose to buy our first house here in 2016. Swifts were a big draw for us.

We bumped into Bryan many times since moving here, often of course on his beloved Hutton Roof. He always had time to stop and share his wisdom about the latest orchids that had emerged or the newest migrant birds to arrive. He was humble and kind, never boastful, just passionate about the natural world and keen to share his knowledge, which we more than appreciated.

Our conversations would also often turn to the sad facts about the state of the UK's wildlife and what can be done about it. The swifts that zoom across Burton's skies in summer are on the red list of conservation concern, meaning they have suffered the most severe declines. The house sparrows, whose cheeping is such a fundamental soundtrack to a walk through our village, are on that red list now too.

After watching Bryan's funeral procession, I headed to the post office to send off a parcel. I was struck by the amount of scaffolding present. It's summer, an ideal time for renovations of course. But perhaps many are still unaware that those small nooks and crannies in the stonework of our Burton homes are what makes our village such a great place for swifts and house sparrows. Nesting sites are sadly so scarce for these species now, it's a big contributing factor to why they've ended up on the red list. Across the country, new buildings are completely sealed up, and old buildings are done up in the same way - blocked gaps, fascia boards, new render.

That's not to say that renovations can't be carried out, but being mindful of purposefully leaving some gaps, or installing swift bricks or nest-boxes, can really give some of our most threatened birds the helping hand they so desperately need. House sparrows take to nest-boxes well. There's lots of options to make or buy them (we're lucky to have Leighton Moss shop nearby). Swifts though are known to be really site faithful, so if their nesting hole is blocked up, they won't simply move elsewhere, they will abandon their attempts to breed. Unlike other species, where a nest-box can often replace a lost nest hole, swifts won't take to such a replacement, which is why it is so important to conserve the ones we have for those already nesting. If you haven't already got them nesting however, then swift bricks and swift boxes are ideal to install. Playing swift calls to attract them is known to increase your chances of occupancy too. **Annabel Rushton**

# Vicar's Letter...

#### Rain and drains

**Dear Friends** 

Those who have visited the church and churchyard recently will have seen the work that has been taking place. Here is an update.

#### **Drainage System.**

This work began in June and is nearing completion as I write. Rainwater from the downpipes was not flowing away and when we investigated the gullies we found short lengths of pipe underground that were filled with soil and didn't connect to anything. It was likely that the rainwater being discharged into the ground around the building was undermining the structure and contributing to settlement and cracking of the walls.

Two new soakaways have been installed in the churchyard and new drainage pipes have been laid so that every downpipe gully connects to the system. This work has been carried out by Will Underwood Property Services and has been paid for by gifts from congregation members and by spending the majority of the church's general maintenance fund.

### Vestry.

As you know we have been raising funds to repair the vestry – a vital part of the church building where rainwater ingress has been causing the interior plaster to fail and fall. We are within a few thousand pounds of our original target of £55,700 so many thanks to all who contributed to this. The cost of materials and fuel has

risen sharply and an updated quote has now come in at £61,750. As we cannot afford this we have decided to split the project and to begin with the external work so that we can make the building weathertight.

This phase of the project should be underway by the time that you read this. We will continue to raise funds to enable us to move on to phase 2 – the internal replastering and other repair work.

We are sorry that a section of the car park has had to be used to store materials and that parking has been much more difficult than usual. We also know that the excavations have been unsightly for the many people who come to services or who visit the graves of family members. We hope to have the affected areas re-seeded very soon and we look forward to the grass growing and the peace of the churchyard returning. Thank you very much to Tony Jolley who has kept cutting the grass despite all the challenges of working around our contractors.



# Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

#### **August Council News**

Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) seems to have disrupted the activities of the existing councils -Cumbria County and SLDC - so that it is difficult to make headway on current matters like planning. Highways in particular have suffered perhaps because staff seem be temporary and/or working at a home out of the district. Hence when I reported a dangerously overgrown verge on a highway known as Marsh Lane near Heversham I was informed four days later that no action had been taken because it was not on a map. Eventually I explained that locally a single track highway is invariably called a 'lane'. When the penny dropped they asked 'would it be the same as 'March Road?'

Regarding verge cutting I was told that it will be undertaken in September when the wayside plants will have broadcast their seeds. Also, on roads I have decided to agree to my current Members Highways allowance of £6,000 to be added to the division's resurfacing fund for 2022 -2022. On footpaths I spoke at the County's Development Control Committee in favour of diverting a footpath through the yard of Moss Farm (Butterfields).

Please let me know of any highways and footpaths problems. Sadly, no 'officer', so far, has been available to go round with me for my annual survey of Highways in our Lower Kentdale Division.

Meanwhile SLDC's July Council was bombarded by statistics including graphic warnings particularly about prices of petrol which will impact on Council Services, while household energy costs have risen from under £1000 per annum to nearly £3000 pa. For families in need an extra government grant will help the County to provide free children's meals during the Summer Holidays. Also, County has reported that the proportion of overweight infants has risen from 9.9% in 2020 to 14.14% in 2022 and for year 6 pupils it has risen from 21% to 25%. Therefore, malnutrition rather than lack of basic food is becoming the main concern.


Fortunately, both County and District councils finances are 'healthy'. SLDC has benefitted, especially, because the envisaged drop in Car Parking revenue did not occur thanks to a boom in holidays at home caused, I imagine, partly by difficulties in travelling abroad. Meanwhile yet another strain of COVID is here. Only Copeland has above the national average number of cases-but with the peak of the tourist season approaching no doubt we will get more in South Lakeland.

# HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE by Roger Bingham

**DALTON - our 'lost village'?** 

The story of Dalton is shrouded in myth. For over a hundred years commentators have noted the various earthworks near Dalton Old Hall. around 19 Trees and opposite Russells' Farm and have deduced that these are the remains of 'lost' settlements. They vary in age from late Iron age huts dating before c.100 BCE, a 'Viking' commune of c.1000 CE. medieval farmsteads of c. 1300 CE to eighteenth century labourers' cottages. Excepting Dalton Old Hall most of the existing buildings in the current scattered hamlet date from around 1800.

The most repeated explanation for 'the village that disappeared' is that the inhabitants had been wiped out by bubonic plague. Bulmer's Directory of 1905 went a step further and recounted how 'Dalton used to be in the parish of Warton, Lancashire'. But, when that parish refused to bury the plague stricken dead, the authorities of Burton allowed burials in their parish on compassionate grounds. Their last resting place was said to be on a field belonging to the glebe near Burton called 'Parson's Breeches'. From then on Dalton became a township in the County of Westmorland.

Although this is a good story, the simple facts are different. Locally, the last plague was in 1665. Dalton only became part of Westmorland in 1888 and did not join Burton Parish for another 100 years. Moreover, there is an informative Dalton Estate map of 1694 which clearly shows about 20 dwellings, some with smoke coming out of the chimneys. Outlying 'Dearsleak' (Deerslet) and the (old) Hall are shown but the main

community, which had its own stocks, was around the junction near 19 trees and the entrance to the Old Hall drive. That the community did not disappear is shown by the early census returns. The population figures were: 73 in 1801, 151 in 1821, 131 in 1831, 155 in 1841, and 100 in 1851. The 1851 census is quite informative. At that time there were 18 dwellings, and one was being built. Only numbers 6, 7 and 18 were small cottages. In number 6 lived 34-year-old agricultural labourer Stephen Wilson, his wife Sarah and four children: Sarah 8, William 6, Mary 4, and Sarah 1 month and his brother-in-law Edward Walker. also a farm labourer. Dalton Hall was the largest establishment where the Squire Edmund Hornby and his unmarried daughter Mary Margaret, described as 'gentle woman', employed 10 servants to look after them. RKB

# **Anita's Recipe**

I hadn't expected to be able to put forward any more recipes .... But with the rhubarb being given to me by my neighbour (thank you Rachel) and my father-in-law (thank you Ray) I needed to find some recipes to use it. We made jam again this year – rhubarb and ginger – but have now discovered Rhubarb and Lemon Slices which are incredibly scrummy.

# Rhubarb & Lemon Slices Ingredients:

Base:		Toppii	ng:			
120g	Butter, softened	400g	Sugar			
100g	Sugar	35g	Flour			
225g	Plain Flour	½ tsp	Baking Powder			
Pinch o	f Salt	4	Eggs			
		2	Lemons (juice only) or			
			6tbsp Lemon Juice			
		Pinch of Salt				
		300g	Finely Chopped Rhubarb			

#### Method:

- 1. Preheat oven to 160C Fan (180C; Gas Mark 4) and grease square cake tin (approx. 9").
- 2. To make base: mix butter and sugar until creamy. Add flour and salt and stir until well combined and crumbly. Press into the cake tin.

Bake 8-10 minutes until just barely golden around the edges.

- 3. Prepare topping: Combine sugar, flour, baking powder, and salt. Add eggs and lemon juice, and stir until well blended and smooth.
- 4. Sprinkle the rhubarb over the base, and pour the lemon filling on top.
- 5. Bake for 30 minutes or until golden and set.

Cool completely before cutting.

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
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
