



George's Treasure Trove

In times gone by it was necessary to weave fabric to manufacture items of clothing and wool was used to enable this.

Prior to the invention of the spinning wheel a more labour-intensive method of producing a yarn was implemented.



By using a spindle with a weighted base the wool could be attached to the upper end of the spindle and hand spun. When a yard or so of yarn was produced it was wound onto said spindle. The woollen thread would then be ready to be fed to the loom.

To weight these spindles a stone spindle whorl was manufactured and later lead spindle whorls were used achieve this. The practice of early kinds of spinning was carried out by the women of the household and quite often these women joined their menfolk working in the fields and the whorls were often lost there and are now quite common finds.

Burton Morewood School Report Autumn Term

As always, we have been busy bees here at Burton Morewood. Our learning has spanned many time periods, countries, continents and scientific theories! The last couple of months has seen us take part in a service of Remembrance at church, have exciting visitors and visits, and support Children in Need with a mufti day.

In Nursery we have been exploring the 'Once upon a time' project. The children have created an amazing castle which they enjoy role playing in. We have dressed up as different characters and created our own imaginative stories. The children are very busy learning the songs and preparing for the 'Carols around the tree' performance with the Reception children. We can't wait!

Reception are enjoying their project this half term - Marvellous Machines. We have used snap circuits to make lights and motors work, compared different ways of whisking up pancake mixture - by hand and using an electric whisk and then, of course, ate the pancakes we made! We have recently welcomed 4 fish to our classroom after being gifted a fish tank. The children have named them and are thoroughly enjoying feeding them.

Year 1 have been 'mixing it up' this half term, exploring primary and secondary colours and hues in art. We have explored autumnal treasures as part of our Forest Schools learning and have created clay sculptures. In PE, we have been learning and perfecting our gymnastics movements, thinking about how to travel, turn, jump and balance in a variety of ways.

Year 2 have started their new class novel 'Traction Man'. They have described characters and created their very own superheroes to write about. The next task is to create a persuasive poster encouraging people to buy a Traction Man for Christmas. It was very exciting being able to use our new whole-school cooking trolley for the first time. Year 2 designed, planned, made and evaluated their healthy meal based on the 5 food groups. The broccoli and cauliflower cheesy pasta bake went down a treat and everyone had a try. In history we have learnt about famous explorers and activists that have impacted our world. This learning will help Year 2 to write speeches that will be read aloud to explain which Mover and Shaker is most significant to them and why.

In Year 3, we have continued our project of Through the Ages. We were really lucky to have an amazing visitor in school showing us what prehistoric life would have been like. We even got to make our own axes! We have found learning about the Earth's layers and tectonic plates fascinating. We have thoroughly enjoyed using clay to make Bell Beaker style pots. We are really looking forward to our next DT project where we will get to design, make and taste our own healthy tacos.

Year 4 have been busy this term learning about Invasions. We had an Anglo Saxon and Viking day in school. We trained like Viking warriors, did some weaving and made a quill and some ink - then created runes (Viking writing). In English, we are writing a Norse Myth and looking forward to finishing them. We are also enjoying our weekly swimming lessons and have been to the Kendal Mountain Festival this term.



Year 5 have been getting their teeth stuck into dark, dark tales and Remembrance Day poetry. We have been working hard on using the inverse to calculate addition and subtraction. In geography, biomes have been our focus as well as vegetation belts and climate zones and in history we've discovered how the ancient Chinese best equipped themselves for warfare. We are looking forward to a local, mystery visitor who is going to wow us with their fantastic knowledge about space, the planets and the stars.

Year 6 have continued their learning about the transatlantic slave trade as part of their project Maafa. This was really brought to life by a recent visit to Liverpool's International Slavery Museum. We were able to view artefacts and real-life stories to support and further our learning. In science, as part of our topic about the human circulatory system, we made models of our blood! We used everyday items to represent different elements of our blood such as mini marshmallows being white blood cells! Year 6 have also recently written poetry inspired by famous World War I poets such as Wilfred Owen and John McCray.

On behalf of all of the children, staff and governors, I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a peaceful and relaxing Christmas and very best wishes for 2023.

Winter skies over Burton

Oh for a few frosty days AND CLEAR NIGHTS! It does seem to have been an interminably wet and cloudy autumn with so few nights for all night astrophotography.

I have a couple of items for this season's entry. Firstly, one question I am frequently asked is, "How do you know where to look?" Well, it's a good question. It may be that one just knows after a lifetime of interest; there is of course - ask Google or there are several excellent apps and programmes available which can be incredibly useful. Phone and tablet apps such as 'Star Walk' and 'Solar Walk', amongst others, are visually impressive and some basic features are free but with 'in app purchases' available. You can move on to 'Sky Safari' but this is quite expensive. For sheer value and functionality, however, the best is a free (PC/Mac) programme called 'Stellarium', downloadable from https://stellarium.org. I think there may be a small charge for this as an app for phones/tablets. This programme has so much information its biggest problem can be having too much, and you have to turn features down or off. If required it will actually guide a telescope to point at the target you are aiming for and it will also allow you to load a photo panorama of your back garden to see where the stars will appear over your flower beds and at what time. This needs a good deal of other preparation, but it is possible. For ordinary, everyday use though, all you need to do is tell it where you are and what time it is and it will then tell you what is overhead astronomically at that time. You can then bring up the time control and move backwards and forwards though time at will. Indeed, when demonstrating this in school we set the date for 25th Dec 0000 (and several Christmas' around that year) location Bethlehem and went looking for a certain star. Alas, we never found it, but I don't think its programming covers miracles!

Ideas to Observe and/or photograph

My second item for this edition is to draw your attention to one of our most prominent winter sky features, the constellation of Orion. If you have already been excited by this article and downloaded Stellarium then you may have spotted that Orion is now rising in our eastern skies around 8pm although Burton Fell may prevent sight of this until nearer 9pm. With each passing Winter month this becomes an hour or so earlier in the evening.

The Orion region is a rich and wonderful area to observe whether as an ardent astronomer or as a casual observer. Its observable presence in the sky is one of the most identifiable and aptronymic in respect of its name and shape of all the constellations above us. However, as one looks deeper the whole region, within and around, it is filled with areas of nebulae, gas clouds and interstellar dust where the birth of new stars and planets abound. Two such examples are shown below, indeed M42, the Great Orion Nebula, is one of the very few nebula visible to the naked eye (although not in the detail seen here!). Given a little patience, a good clear night and a moderate telephoto lens it's guite possible to get some very acceptable images of this on an ordinary DSLR. It is not only the nebulae which are fascinating, but the stars which form this asterism are some of the brightest and most colourful in the night sky. Betelgeuse, made more widely famous by Douglas Adams for very different reasons holds an intense fascination for astronomers and physicists due to the imminent expectation of it being about to explode as a supernova. This may be in our or our children's lifetimes or over the following thousands of years, a drop in the ocean of astronomical time, but when it goes it promises to be spectacular.

So if the clouds clear at some point, do drag yourself from the armchair, find a dark corner of the village and take a look up to the southern and south-eastern night skies to admire the beauty of this winter night's wonder.

Other things to look out for this Winter:

Planets: Jupiter continues to be very bright rising in the SE sky at dusk moving through southern skies as the night progresses. This is closely followed by Mars later in the evening, seen as a very bright reddish star in the eastern sky. It will be at its brightest the first two weeks in December. The full moon passes right in front of Mars at 4:57am (until 6am) on 8th Dec. By late December Venus will be seen in the after-glow of sunset in the SW, as will Mercury if you look very carefully and have a very clear evening.

Full moons will be on: 8th Dec, 6th Jan, 5th Feb and 7th March. And with that, I wish you all a very happy Christmas and peaceful New year and at least a few clear skies. Steve T burtonastro@gmail.com

Wild About Winter

Welcome to my second seasonal top tips on connecting with nature this winter. If you missed my autumn article, my name is Annabel and I will be bringing you a quarterly nature update in Burton News, with top species to spot and a top nature-based activity to take part in each season.

Top spot in Winter

As I walked through the centre of the village in October, I heard a familiar sound that I hadn't heard since last Winter – a sound that Bryan Yorke loved to hear as part of his visible migration recording – the unmistakeable call of redwings. "Welcome back" I couldn't help but say to them as a flock of 12 flew over the King's Arms. These beautiful members of the thrush family arrive here every autumn, when they migrate from Scandinavia to spend the milder winters here. Their name refers to the striking ruby-coloured patch under their wings. They also have streaky chests and a distinctive custard-coloured stripe above their eyes. They feast on berries of trees and bushes such as rowan and hawthorn, so are often spotted in supermarket car parks, alongside lanes, and in gardens where these shrubs grow. Keep an eye out for these cheeky characters adding a splash of colour to the trees through winter.

Go wild at home

Sadly many of our much-loved garden birds are declining in numbers. One of the simplest and most fun ways you can help them out this season is by taking part in the RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch. The world's largest garden wildlife survey returns in January, with hundreds of thousands of people watching and counting the UK's garden birds.

Around three quarters of a million people took part in 2022, counting 17 million birds – making it one of the biggest Birdwatches ever! Next year's event takes place on 27-29 January 2023. Taking part involves spending just one hour watching and recording the birds in your garden, yard, balcony, or local green space, then sending your results to the RSPB.

Over the last four decades, the number of people taking part has made the RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch the largest citizen science project in the world! Now in its 45th year, over 150 million birds have been counted giving the RSPB an astonishing amount of insight into how our wildlife is faring – which species are doing well, and which need a helping hand. Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

Council News for November 2022

The more things change, the more they repeat themselves. Nearly 40 years ago, when I first became a member of South Lakeland District Council, we debated the condition of what we called Grange Baths, which is now designated as The Lido. Back in 1984, it had developed a great crack and was leaking into the Bay. Emergency repairs kept it open for another decade before it was closed and dwindled into dereliction. Subsequently, a new pool was built, controversially because a Compulsory Purchase Order had to be used for the site at Berner's Close. But the new pool only lasted five years before it too was declared unsafe and quickly closed and pulled down. It was then decided to restore the old pool complex, now listed as an important Art Deco building. With advice and practical help from dedicated volunteers, it has now been tidied up. At the November Council we were informed that funds for a further £5,006,200 were required even after "a change in methodology had been adopted" -meaning cuts - and that a new Structural Engineer has been appointed. Once renovated, the building will be opened to the public

but the actual pool will not be filled for bathing – although there have been plans to transform it into a garden. A children's playground and the promenade will also be repaired.

The other historic issue dealt with was the restoration of the Canal. Here, I have a direct interest as I represent either as a District or a County Councillor all except one parish (Beetham) along its length from Kendal to the County Boundary. My other affected parishes are: Sedgwick, Hincaster, Stainton, Preston Richard, Preston Patrick, Holme and Burton. Currently, a £600,000 government grant is available to restore the tow paths for walking and cycling. This, I thought, should be popular with local residents although I recalled that the original plans to re-reopen all the waterway had been opposed by many local people who feared an intrusion of noisy visitors. Despite excellent work by volunteers in clearing large stretches and repairing bridges it is unlikely that M6 breaches will ever be removed or evaded.

Child poverty was a worrying problem raised at both the SLDC Cabinet and at the County Council. Cumbria has already created a £4m Cost of Living Crisis Fund. The cost of school diners, now £2.41, is likely to reach to £3 although food inflation recently has dropped from a peak in July. Inevitably, the need for free schools meals has increased. Many schools now have breakfast clubs and food vouchers or meals are provided for the School Holidays.

Meanwhile as we await the dissolution of SLDC and Cumbria County Councils some officers seem too busy or, perhaps, may be distracted by Local Government Reorganisation to attend

to enquiries promptly. I have received complaints about delays by the District Planning Department and failures by County Highways to provide early notification about planned road closures.

Meanwhile, with so many members retiring and other members busy planning for LGR, attendance at council meetings has dropped. I counted 51 members present at the November County Council. The full membership is 81. Personally, I'm still pressing on at councils and the Crime and Police authority and have kept up my attendance at Parish Councils where I am permitted to take part. Meantime, I'm checking on flood relief measures as it is now just a year since Storm Arwen flooded us out.

The council then considered an early draft of their budget submission for 2023/24. More news on this in the next issue.

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE by Roger Bingham

WILLIAM COCKIN - A BURTON POLYMATH

A supplement for Cumbria is now being compiled in the Dictionary of National Biography whose section on Cumberland and Westmorland is now 100 years old. As well as 20th Century subjects some biographies of significant people omitted from the previous Dictionary are now to be included.

One local entry is to William Cockin (1736-1801) whom I have called 'A Burton Polymath' as he was adept in both science and arts. The Cumbrian DB Supplement categorised him as a "Versatile author and English Schoolmaster". He was certainly one of the most important persons to have hailed from Burton having probably been born at Cockin Yard, perhaps at Hanging Farmhouse, the son of Marmaduke Cockin (1712-1754). He was likely to have been educated at Burton Grammar School. Although he did not attend either University, he taught for 18 years at Lancaster Grammar School and then for a few more years at a Nottingham Academy.

In his day he was called a 'elocutionist' and he dedicated a book on elocution to the great actor David Garrick. His serious academic works include "A Rational and Practical Treatise of Arithmetic", "The Theory of the Syphon", "The Fall of Scepticism" and "The Theory of Human Action Explained". More generally he alerted the public to the beauties of Lakeland in "Odes to the Genius of the Lakes", the first ever handbook for visitors.

Eventually, he retired to Kendal where he lived in the house of George Romney, the great portrait painter – although no portrait, if there were any, of Cockin seems to have survived.

He died aged 65 in Kendal but was buried at Burton. His memorial states that he was a "Man of Strong Powers of Mind, of singular modesty and general benevolence of heart, a dutiful a son, a kind brother, and a sincere friend ...he built his hopes of final and effectual justification, through the meritorious sufferings of Jesus Christ. Go, Reader, and do thou likewise."



Vicar's Letter...

Unbelievable!

Dear Friends

It's almost the perfect story for little children: nothing more scary than a dazzling angel (if you leave out Herod's rage) and nothing more upsetting than finding, after a long journey while heavily pregnant, that the inn has no record of the booking (leaving aside the barbarism of Herod's soldiers). Then there's cute animals, a cute baby and majestic kings riding exotic camels carrying expensive gifts.

But when little children grow up they start thinking like us adults and that means they have problems with the story, especially with angel messengers, a pregnant virgin, and a star that can stop over a house without incinerating our whole planet. These things are problems for them because we teach our children that we live in a closed universe full of wonders but with nothing outside it, and so we close their minds to anything beyond; there can't be any answers that don't begin and end here.

But the Bible writers began with a different assumption – that there is a creation and a Creator. Their minds were open to the possibility that this Creator could do things differently from usual. Creatures who are not part of our material world could appear here if he wanted them to, human life could begin without a human father, and a dazzling object in Earth's atmosphere could function as star-nav. The Creator is not limited by our closed minds. If there might be both a creation and a Creator then perhaps Xmas is more believable than you thought?

And if this world's exquisite beauty and intricacy tells us something about the wisdom and purposefulness of our Creator then perhaps the bizarre events of the first Century were actually part of a carefully planned rescue mission, the answer to our deepest needs. Perhaps Christmas is a whole lot better than you thought?




