She writes, "....and then work was scarce out towards Burton, where we lived, and Father said I maun try and get a place. And George wrote as how wages were far higher in Manchester than Milnthorpe or Lancaster...."

The owner of the Old Pier Bookshop in Morecambe told me that Mrs Gaskell used to stay at Silverdale Tower, so I assume she might have visited Burton. Does anyone know?

#### **George's Treasure Trove**

#### A FASCINATING FIND.

Back in 2004 a detecting friend of mine Peter Adams who lived in Burton at the time managed to aquire permission to metal detect on a farm near Carlisle and invited me to join him on a visit to search the land. The usual sort of rubbish was being unearthed and apart from a few early coins and an early aged casket key it seemed that not much of note had turned up.

On the way back home peter went into his pocket and produced an item that neither of us could identify, it was of course metallic and had the shape of half an Easter egg. Researching the item revealed that the item was a brooch worn by the Viking women at shoulder height and always worn in pairs , Between these brooches was a chain from which smaller items of value were attached.

Following this research we were keen to return to the site, inform the farmer

what we had discovered and carry out a more detailed search in the area of the brooch discovery asking permission to remove a four foot square of turf, Permission was granted ! We started work scraping away the layers of earth a white item was uncovered, IT WAS A FOREHEAD !!

Finding a skull like this means that we must be careful about how to proceed and although the urge to carry on was immense we marked the spot, made



good the area and notified the Portable Antiquities Scheme who in turn notified the proper authorities who would be involved with a professional archeological dig. The police would have been the first to hear of our find to ascertain whether we had found a missing person.

Oxford Archeology was the professional body to excavate the site and eventually our grave was uncovered and the goods within indicated that it was indeed a female burial.

As work progressed and a larger area was uncovered it was evident that in addition to our grave, there were another five graves in a horseshoe pattern surrounding the female and these graves were also holding goods that would have been owned by males. What became an important fact for me was that buried at the feet of the female was the remains of a casket which when investigated by X-Ray held weaving equipment and jewellery.

#### **Fitness Is Fun!**



Some people believe they can't exercise because of their age or decreased mobility. Not so!! There are lots of exercises designed to increase / maintain strength, flexibility and cardio health all done from the safety of a chair. So let's get started seated, focusing on arms and shoulders today!



Make sure you're sitting safely on a chair, keep within your capability and range of movement and if anything hurts at all its time to stop. Repeat the following exercises several times.

1.Reach arms forward at shoulder height then out to the side and back to the front.



2.Reach one arm up and slightly over the top for a lovely side stretch. Repeat on the other side.[Fig.9]

3.Make small forward circles with the arm outstretched to the side, fingers pointing to the ceiling; repeat making backward circles.

4.Arms by your side, stretch both arms to the top, hold for a few seconds before returning arms to your side.[Fig 4]

5.Hold both arms out at shoulder height then take them backwards slightly to squeeze the shoulder blades together.

Now the shoulders:

- 1. Roll the shoulders forward several times then backwards.
- 2. Shrug the shoulders up then down.[Fig.5]

3. Put finger tips on shoulders and circle the elbows forwards then backwards.

Anything that keeps us mobile and active has got to be good. Right? Make seated exercise a habit by latching it onto something you already do. Perhaps waiting for your cuppa to cool. Top tip....move to your favourite music.

#### **Spring Skies over Burton**

It has been a dire Jan/Feb for astronomy which has been a real shame as we have had a new visitor to our skies, Comet C2022-E3(ZTF). The rare green comet named C/2022 E3 passed closest to the Earth on 1st February 2023 after 50,033 years in deep space. For this issue I thought I would give you some idea about how astrophotography images were collected and then processed after being taken.

Important in all photo images is a factor called the signal to noise (S/N) ratio. In our everyday, well illuminated lives taking a photo this mostly is not a problem. Photons or light waves, emitted or reflected, by an object or area of space are the 'signal' we want to collect but there are also lots of other sources of random signal 'noise' we want to keep to a minimum. For us more 'mature' folk it's a bit like when we used to listen Radio Luxemburg on an "AM" radio or follow TMS cricket on longwave – remember all that hiss, crackles & interference, well that was noise in the radio waves area of the electromagnetic spectrum. Later, along came FM then DAB and the quality & quantity of the signal compared to the background noise was drastically improved. This is what we attempt to achieve as astro-photographers.

When we look deep into space, we are looking at objects which are either very faint, a very long way away, and very often, both. This means that the photons, even though relatively constant, are few in number and it takes a long time to collect and gather them into anything we can start to perceive as an image. The longer we spend collecting them the stronger and stronger that signal becomes relative to the other interference (noise), which is either random in nature or can be corrected for in processing. When we process this signal we effectively amplify (just as a music player or radio does), that photon signal as much as we can. However, this also amplifies the noise this is why the more signal we gather the more it proportionally swamps out the noise giving more detailed and smoother images. Of course, this isn't the whole story and the quality of the optical system and camera sensor to give clear focused images on to this sensor is also important but with reasonable systems good images can be created so long as enough signal is collected.

This leads us to, how do we collect so much signal? There are problems on several fronts. We are moving, and quite quickly really. The earth spinning on its polar axis causes the stars move across the sky at around 15degrees every hour, you may have had seen photos of star trails. They can be quite spectacular. This can be compensated for in mounting your camera or telescope on a motorised rotator on a tripod or mount which then needs carefully aligning to the pole star, Polaris. The more accurately this is done the better are your results. This will allow you to take a photo with a very long exposure. We can set up a second much smaller telescope which is used to lock on to stars and track them. This then allows us to send tiny correction signals to the main telescope to create a very accurate 'guided' system. This allows us to take images which can be 600 or 1000 seconds long if need be and taken over several nights.

Next, we use some whizz software which combines them all together (e.g. search online for "Deep Sky Stacker" or "APP"). It uses the brighter stars to ensure all images are aligned exactly on top of each other; analyses the signal from every pixel on the camera's sensor of every image taken; through statistical maths, generates an average value for every pixel of the 62million pixels finally producing a single combined (stacked) image from the, perhaps 50 images initially taken.

Often objects like nebulae are irregular in their amounts of photons produced. This can cause some parts of the image to be horribly over exposed while other areas still very dark. This can be solved by taking maybe 2 or 3 sets of images of different exposure times and combining them in programmes like Photoshop and Lightroom. This just takes time and practice to develop your judgement as to what will finally be your good image.

So why is the comet difficult? Firstly, it is very faint and needs a lot of exposure time and this need you to track that region of space for some time, BUT the comet is passing through space at thousands of miles per hour and so is moving relative to the stars. Do you track the comet or the stars? Either way you end up with all the stars or the comet as a streak across the image.

There are several ways of solving this generally involving either removing all the stars or the comet from every image taken then aligning what you have

left and stacking them separately. Finally, you recombine your, hopefully, sharp comet image back into a sharp star field. It takes ages!!

Finally, what to look out for: On 1st March let's hope for a clear evening and look out for Venus and Jupiter passing each other in the sunset afterglow and on 25th March crescent moon close to Pleiades may be worth trying for a photo.

#### HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE by Roger Bingham

#### HISTORICAL POST SCRIPT

#### Part Two: March 2023.

BURTON IN KENDAL 1984 TO 2023. As promised, this article will sketch the changes I have seen in Burton over nearly 40 years representing the vilage on the County and Parish councils. This is my final Burton News Historical Footnote. I have represented Burton for 39 years from 1984, when I was first elected to South Lakeland District Council, to my retirement on March 31st 2023, prior to the vesting date of the Westmorland and Furness Unitary Council on 1st April. Since 1997, I also represented Burton on the County Council as the member for the Lower Kentdale Division which also included Holme, Preston Richard, Preston Patrick, Lupton, Mansergh, Stainton, Sedgwick and Hutton Roof; so, I got around a lot!

During this time, most people might think that the biggest change is the expansion of the village. However, this is not supported by the Census population data which are respectively:

1981 1117, 1991 1,322,

- 2001 1411.
- 2001 1411, 2011 1.497
- 2021 1,342.

The increase after 1991 was probably caused by the inclusion of Dalton during the 1990s. When I first started, Dalton was a separate township which did not have a parish council but had an annual Parish Meeting instead. When Dalton joined Burton-in-Kendal, the Parish council was increased from seven members to nine.

On the old parish boundaries Burton's population rose from 548 in 1801 to a

peak of 796 in 1841 and then decline again to 460 in 1921. Post World War development, particularly with the council houses on Boon Town and Drovers Way, saw the population rise to 646 in 1951. The population then doubled between 1951 and 1981 due to the building of The Park, Vicarage Drive ,Hutton Close and the first stage of Morewood Drive in the 1960s and expansion on Tanpits Lane, Vicarage Lane, Neddy Hill and Station Road.

When I was first elected, St James' Drive was only half built and my first contentious planning applications concerned the start of development of the first stages of Church Bank Gardens and Glebe Close. There was much opposition to the building of Hollowrayne because it obscured the view of the church, which previously had been detached from the main village. The name was also controversial because, allegedly, it was taken from an obscure patch on Burton Fell.

The so called Local Planning Survey in c. 2008 caused the biggest rows in SLDC's history because expansion of all local villages was envisaged. Memories of compulsory purchases imposed in the 1940s to provide sites for council houses led to fears that gardens belonging to private house would be taken over. In the event the outlined development was much reduced. But, afterwards, many expansion plans met with much opposition particularly the extension 'over the sky-line' of Morewood Drive and the density and design of Church Stile houses. So far much approved development has yet to be built at Green Dragon while the Church Bank Gardens area remains contentious.

In contrast to the enlargement of the village's built-up area, its facilities, sadly, have dwindled. In 1984 Burton had two grocers, a separate post office, an art shop, a flourishing butcher's, two garage filling stations and three banks. When the banks were first threatened with closure I appeared on National Television to champion their retention which, I think delayed the plan - but for only briefly.

Nevertheless, though Burton's population is currently stagnant, or reducing, I am sure that the community is alive and well. We still have our Primary School, a constantly used Memorial Hall, the MUGA with numerous sporting activities, the History Society, Burton Amateur Dramatic Society, an Arts and Crafts Society and an active church with a resident 'vicar'. Burton remains a happy and busy place which I have enjoyed representing..... almost all the time!

Finally, I wish my successor all the best. Therefore, thank you, Burtonians, for enabling me to share so much of my life with you from when I was a youngster with shoulder length black hair to a white haired senior citizen with a walking stick but who still wears his hat on his head.



There is no report from South Lakeland District Council or Cumbria County Council this month. Both these local authorities cease to exist on 31st March 2023.

#### **Community First Responders - New Volunteers Needed Urgently**

Burton urgently needs new Community First Responders. 


"When someone calls an ambulance they are unwell, possibly frightened or unsure of what is happening and vulnerable. Even when dealing with a patient who is not seriously ill, you have the opportunity to calm and reassure them. Talking to them and supporting them while they wait for an ambulance is a part of the responder role that is often forgotten or overlooked but it can often be the most rewarding part of being a community first responder.

As a responder you step into someone's life for a short period of time, during which you can really make a difference. We will train you to respond to emergencies but you can still go about your normal routine. If we need your help, we will alert you!"

### Parish Council Notes

Parish Council Meeting Summary This is a summary of the PC meeting held in February to give you an idea of the responsibilities of the Council for local issues. Many thanks to Anita for her previous reporting of Parish business. We had full attendance of existing members at this meeting and one member of the public. All residents are very welcome to attend any of our meetings if there is an issue they would like to raise.

The Chairman (Alan Wren) read out the email received from Cumbria Police regarding recent burglaries in the area. This information has also been published on the Burton Facebook page. The Open Forum followed with the one attending member of the public informing the Parish Council of her concern about the Change of Use application for Chester House – the former Butchers shop and the disappointment that the village has lost another asset.

The Parish Council is a statutory consultee for local planning applications. They do not approve or reject applications but have a duty to pass on local concerns. Two applications were discussed.

a) SL/2023/0071 Glaneils, Station Lane – removal of workers lodge and replace with workers residence – the Clerk has received no comments or objections from members of the public and the Parish Council had no objections to add.

b) SL/2023/0042 Chester House, Main St – change of use of butcher's shop to residential – again the Clerk has received only the above objection from members of the public, although Councillors agreed it was a disappointment to see another village asset disappear.

The next item was to decide how to commemorate the Coronation. A few suggestions were put forward, including benches, a new vintage street lamp, trees etc. The Parish Council would welcome any further suggestions from members of the public. Please send these to the Parish Clerk at the address below.

Mr Wilson, Head of Burton Morewood School has put together a committee of interested parties to produce a "Welcome Pack" containing useful information for new residents. The Parish Council has agreed to provide information and contact details along with a plea for new members. There was a short update on outstanding tasks for the PC including the repair of picnic benches, parking and traffic in the village, the community asset register and the current vacancies on the committee. The lack of committee members is a serious issue and if anyone is interested in becoming involved in the Parish Council activities, please do get in touch, we would really like to hear from you.

Each councillor then gets the chance to report on issues they have noticed, or which have been brought to their notice such as instances of fly tipping, required road repairs, reporting of vandalism etc. Correspondence received by the PC regarding a footpath between the Boon Town development and Post-Office Lane was discussed.

The next meeting will be held on Thursday 16th March and follows the Annual Parish Meeting. We welcome members of the public to all our meetings.

# Vicar's Letter...

#### Abundant Life

Dear Friends

When the state pension was first paid out in 1909 (to those aged 70 or over) life expectancy in England was just 52 years! By the time I was born in 1963 it had reached 71 years, driven steadily upward by improving healthcare and prosperity. By 2019 life expectancy was up to 82 years although increases had slowed. Since 2019, of course, it has gone back down, to about 81 years. On average, a whole year has been taken off our lives.

Those are just averages - there are many individuals who seem to have lost much more than one year of their life, who were taken from us 'far too soon'. Expectations of a long life have risen and we can feel that someone who doesn't reach at least 80 has been cheated.

The Bible turns this on its head: life is not a right that is cruelly taken from us but the gift of a loving God. Every single day is a fresh gift from our Creator to be lived for him and not something we have earned and which is owed to us. We can no more complain about this undeserved gift coming to an end than we could complain that the box of chocolates freely given to us by a friend should have been bigger.

In the Old Testament, long life is God's great blessing and gift to those who trust in him. In the New Testament, God upgrades his gift, from long life to eternal life, with most of that gift lying on the other side of death. In words that are read at the start of the Christian funeral service Jesus declared, "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies; and whoever lives and believes in me will never die." (John 11:25-26)

That's why, when the apostle Paul knew that he was going to be martyred for his faith, he was not in despair. He knew that as he departed this life he would receive the better gift of an abundant life with Jesus forever. Paul's life until then had only been chapter one of the whole book.

Christians down to the present day have shared that same confidence: "to live is Christ and to die is gain" (Philippians 1:21)
