
Could you be the new 200 Club Organiser?

It's a date in Burton!

History notes by Kath Hayhurst

This is the first of a series of notes which refer to dates in Burton Parish.

The earliest reference to a church building in Burton is 1120. Prior to this, the local inhabitants would simply gather round a preaching cross. Within the present church are the remains of four crosses which are recognised as dating from the 10th to 11th century. In 2015 the local history society, helped by some grant funding, created a heritage corner in the church. Here you will find the cross pieces with explanation boards.

In 2018 Dr Dirk Steinforth, a medieval specialist archeologist, came to see the ancient relics and in 2022, he returned, bringing his book Thorvald's Cross which includes a photograph of one of the Burton stones including a speculative lion at the base of the Jesus figure. My illustration, below, produced for the heritage display, does not include the lion.



From Burton Church Heritage Corner information board:

THORVALD'S CROSS

No 1 Cross Shaft (which once had a ring head)

Date 10th to 11th Century

All four faces are bordered by a roll moulding.

Front A

Three panels – the top one has two naked figures on either side of an empty cross. They are thought to be the Virgin Mary and St John. The right hand figure grasping the stem of the cross. The left hand figure raising one arm. They are set on the curved frame of the panel below.

The centre panel is set within an arched frame and is typical of North Western sculpture in the Viking period. A naked figure – Christ rising from the tomb – with glory round his head carrying a cross over his shoulder and a palm branch on the other. He is trampling a serpent whose head is below his left arm.

The bottom panel contains worn traces of thick twisting shapes.

George's Treasure Trove

Medieval history.

The Poesy Ring. Circa. 15th-16th. Century.

The term posy, based on the French "Poesy" describes the amatory verse or rhyming motto with which the rings are engraved, here the inscription reads:

" My love no less, then I possess."

The practice of giving gold hoops with mottoes at betrothals or weddings was common in England from the 14th. Century onwards and continued until the late 18th. Century. Posy rings could however be given on many other occasions as tokens of friendship or loyalty, and "posies" are often found on religious or memorial rings.

The inscriptions are found on the inside of the ring and are hidden to everyone except the wearer. Most of the sentimental mottoes were taken from the popular literature of the time such as "Chapbooks" (Pamphlets) or from collections of the language of courtship. A few customers would supply their own compositions for the goldsmith to engrave.

Fitness Is Fun!

This month, let's target the abs, seated!



This important muscle group can help provide strength and stability, which can improve posture and balance. We're not so much looking for a 6 pack, rather a strong set of muscles that will act as a natural girdle supporting the spine and internal organs. Repeat the following exercises several times.

An easy peasy start....simply suck in your stomach and hold, activating your deep core muscles. You don't need to hold your breath!! Now, a modified sit up. Sit up safely toward the front of your chair, feet flat on the floor and keeping your back straight lean towards the back of the chair. Make sure you engage the abs and only lean as far back as you can whilst maintaining a straight back.

Next, put your hands by your ears, pull in the belly and lift one bent leg at a time. Keep it controlled. For a variation, add a little twist, keeping the back straight lift the left leg and twist to the left. Repeat on the right side. Finally, for the sides, with hands still by the ears and back straight, dip your elbow towards your hip, alternating each side.

As always, make sure you're sitting safely on the chair, keep within your capability and range of movement and if anything hurts at all it's time to stop. It's much more important to build up the number of repetitions gradually rather than overdo it and risk injury.

Pop on your favourite music and enjoy getting stronger!

Congratulations to Duckett Building Firm on their 75th Anniversary. BN has been provided with a short history of this successful local firm.

75th Anniversary of Duckett Ltd

Now in its third generation, Duckett Limited continues to build on the values of its founders. Even if brothers Ernest and Edward wouldn't quite recognise the modern business they would certainly know the principles by which it stands. The family firm prides itself on traditional values, together with a reputation for quality and integrity, a personal service, and a commitment to "delighting our customers". As the current Managing Director puts it "There are three things that underpin how we run our business; local knowledge, a personal and flexible approach to projects, and upholding the highest standards of workmanship and quality through our 30 strong workforce team."

The original business was founded in 1946 by Ernest & Edward Duckett after they were de-mobbed from the armed forces after the Second World War. They acquired a joiners and undertakers in Holme; still based there to this day, giving unbroken service and compassion to the surrounding area. In 1963 son Brian decided to follow in his father's footsteps and he became an apprentice joiner. They began work on a large residential development in Holme, and later in Staveley. Edward Duckett & Son was launched in 1976 when Ernest retired.

Following that, in 1999, the third chapter began when Brian established the current incarnation, Duckett Ltd. Brian's vision has provided high standards of construction, workmanship, and customer service. At the same time he wanted to retain a family and local workforce at the core of the business. It's an approach that has set the Company in good stead over the years with an outstanding workforce, many of whom started as apprentices. Some members of the team have between 20 and 40 years service.

The Company has continued to innovate, buying the Clawthorpe Hotel in 2004 and turning it into a modern Business Centre, which also serves as the Head Office of the firm. Wild About Spring

Welcome to my third seasonal top tips on connecting with nature this Spring. If you missed my other articles, my name is Annabel and I will be bringing you a quarterly nature update in Burton News, with top species to spot and a top nature-based activity to take part in each season.

Top spot in Spring

To me, there's nothing that says Spring quite like the sound of frogs emerging from their winter hideouts and descending onto ponds, pools and sometimes even puddles, to lay their frog spawn. I spent my teenage years on my parents' small holding in Rossendale, East Lancashire, not far from where Brian Yorke grew up in Haslingden. We would look forward to 'Frog Day' – a sure sign of Spring when the pond in our garden would become alive with a croaking chorus of hundreds of frogs mating and spawning. We have a much smaller pond in our garden here in Burton, but we get frogs none-the-less, and that sound when it strikes up, means that lighter days and better weather are just around the corner. Listen and look out for a frog concert near you!

Go wild at home

Frogs, like many of our beloved wildlife in the UK, have suffered from a loss of habitat. Ponds have been filled in, wetlands have been drained and this means that sometimes finding a place to have their tadpoles is tricky. The good news is, no matter how large or small an outdoor space you have, you can still give frogs a helping hand by creating a mini pond. You'd be surprised at what will occupy a washing up bowl! Rainwater is better than using tap water, as it's more natural, and then add a few native water plants such as water forget-me-not or marsh marigold and hey presto, you've got a pond fit for the Frog King! This result is a testament to the dedication and hard work of our staff, families, volunteers and community, but also to that of the children. During the inspection our children were truly amazing. They acted as positive role models and ambassadors for our school. Each and every one of them can be proud of our achievement and their contribution towards it.

As well as the report, which I hope you will take a moment to read (short weblink here - rb.gy/kpwlbs, or use the QR code above), the Inspectors also fed back verbally to Senior Leaders and Governors about many positive aspects of life in school. These included the following comments:

- The children were delightful and thought carefully about the questions.
- Behaviour is positive between children and adults. This is consistent across the school.
- There is appropriate modelling (teaching) by adults.
- Adults have high expectations for all pupils.
- Our children know how to study (learn).
- The school Curriculum is ambitious, well sequenced and shows clear progression.
- Christian Values work well, with rewards that children like.
- Leadership of SEND is strong, proactive and early interventions made.
- In Early Years, 'Floor books' show a wealth of exciting experiences and Parents welcome 'Tapestry' as they feel a part of their child's learning.
- Teacher subject knowledge addresses misconceptions well.
- Classrooms are well stocked with relevant libraries.
- There was a high percentage of parental responses on 'Parent View'. A school of our size may normally receive 12-16 replies in the 'free text' space. We received 50, of which 44 were positive and 2 were neutral. Of the 4 negative comments there was no 'common thread' joining these comments. This shows the strength of support for the school.

In addition to the grades above, we were delighted that the children's Personal Development was described as a "very, very, strong good" and the inspectors verbally identified only one small area for the school to adapt to make this 'Outstanding'. All of our extra-curricular clubs/offers were enthusiastically welcomed.

Well done everyone, and thank you for your support.

Parish Council Notes

Notes from the Annual Parish Meeting and the March Parish Council meeting.

The Annual Parish Meeting was attended by our retiring County and District Councillor Roger Bingham, District Councillor Brian Cooper and shadow Authority Councillor Vicky Hughes. Unfortunately there were no attending members of the public.

The Chairman gave his review of the year, which although too long for the Burton News, can be found on the website and will be published on the Burton Westmorland Facebook page. Following the review, long servicing County and District Councillor Roger Bingham, who is retiring at the end of this month, was the guest speaker. He gave an amusing short talk about his early days as a Councillor in and around Burton.

It was then back to Parish Council business with the March meeting following straight after the Annual Parish Meeting. All Parish Councillors were in attendance. The usual first items of business were ticked off quickly and, as there were no members of the public, the Public Forum was opened and closed.

There were 3 planning applications this month, all of which were non-controversial and no comments or objections were received.

Speeding, parking and general traffic issues are a continuing problem in the village and the next subject for discussion was possible crossing and road markings. It was decided that this would be added to the list of points to talk to the Highways department about when a meeting is organised with our

new District Councillor, Highways and Parish Council.

The next two items were funding requests, one being social activities that take place in the Memorial Hall. As the PC has worked hard to keep their proportion of residents' council tax constant, this has to lead to some hard choices and we were, therefore, unable to help with this request.

The next funding request was to continue supporting the Book Drop for the next year. The Parish Council agreed to request a bit more information on how their funds were used and this will be put on the next Parish Council agenda when more information is received.

With regard to the Coronation Commemoration – there had been some correspondence from a resident asking if the Parish Council would be organising a social gathering to celebrate this event. Unfortunately, the Parish Council is not able to organise social events. However, the Parish Council would like to commemorate this historic event with a lasting memorial. This can include tree planting, memorial bench etc. Currently the School are looking at a Coronation Garden project with the Parish Council and more details will be available soon. In the meantime if any members of the public would like to put any suggestions to the Parish Council please contact the Clerk.

Finally, the Lengthsman logs and Councillor reports were given and tasks to be carried out over the next few weeks noted.

The next meeting will take place on Thursday 20th April at 7.30pm in the Memorial Hall and as usual everyone is welcome to attend.

Vicar's Letter...

Dear Friends,

The George Cross is presented for "acts of the greatest heroism and bravery in circumstances of extreme danger". It is named after its creator, King George VI, but another George, St George, is pictured on the solid silver medal. He is riding a horse and, with his lance, attacking the dragon that (according to legend) was about to feast itself on a local princess. The willingness of the warrior George to risk his life to save her is celebrated around the world.

The George Cross is cast in a shape known everywhere as the symbol of another act of self-sacrificial bravery – a cross. St George rides a horse and carries a spear. Jesus' biographers say that he entered Jerusalem riding a donkey and knowing that he himself would be pierced and speared, not in defeat but to win a far greater victory, not the rescue of a princess and her village, but the rescue of many princesses, villagers and countless others around the world who learn to trust him. On the cross Jesus crushed a fiery dragon far more terrible than any in the storybooks (see Revelation 12:9).



In 1929 WW1 hero Brigadier William Dobbie was stationed in Palestine and given an office

overlooking the hill where Jesus was said to have been crucified. When copies of the New Testament were delivered for distribution to his troops he had this note inserted into each book: "You are stationed at the place where the central event in human history occurred – namely the crucifixion of the Son of God. You may see the place where this happened and you may read the details in this book. As you do this, you cannot help being interested, but your interest will change into something far deeper when you realise the events concern you personally."

What did he mean? That, if they would read their New Testaments, under God's guidance, they would see that Jesus died on the cross to rescue each of them from a fate worse than that faced by St George's princess. Many others have come to the same life-changing conclusion by reading the same book. Why not seek out a Gospel to read this Easter?




