The Word From BURTON MEMORIAL HALL

Thank you to those who came along and supported our Summer Family Bingo in July, although not as busy as the Christmas and Easter ones we still made funds to help the hall keep going. Thank you also to everyone who helped organise, set up, help at, and clear away afterwards, and to our volunteer cake and sandwich makers who as always provided scrumptious refreshments on the night.

The big news for August is that the hall will be closed from 1st to the 6th August whilst our fluorescent lights in all spaces (except in the main hall), many of which are recessed into the ceiling, are changed to surface mounted LED lights, paid for thanks to a grant from the Baywind Energy Community Trust (BWECT). In communal areas light switches will be replaced by sensors, so the lights will come on automatically when someone enters that area, and go off after a set time. This, it has been calculated, will save us around 66% on the energy costs for lighting in the hall, so is well-worth doing.

We will be hosting another Coffee and Cake Morning on Saturday 19th August, 10am-11.30am, in the Reception Room, so why not pop the date on your calendar and come along for a chat and some yummy cakes, and of course our Warm Welcome Wednesdays will continue each week except for 2nd Aug when the electricians are in.

And finally, just a reminder that the Library Book Drop dates for August will be Monday 7th (with Library Coffee Morning 10am-11am) and Wednesday 16th (with Warm Welcome Wednesdays 2pm-3pm).

A Special Award for Bryan Yorke (3rd January 1948 - 28th May 2022).

We know that many of our readers will have enduring fond memories of Burton resident Bryan Yorke, who died suddenly just over a year ago. He was a long-standing monthly contributor to BN with his hugely popular articles on local wildlife.

Recently Bryan's wife Sandra let us know that the Botanical Society of Britain & Ireland (BSBI) has recognised Bryan's outstanding contribution to botany with an 'Outstanding Contribution' award. The BSBI citation reads as follows:



"Bryan is nominated as an inspirational naturalist who communicated his love of the flora of the English North-West. He made an insightful study of the Epipactis species and hybrids on Hutton Roof where he annually monitored each plant and protected them from grazing. He is particularly nominated for his pioneering online presence. Using the media of blogs, Twitter, and Facebook, Bryan put his daily diaries, illustrations, photography and even poetry online where others could see it and use it as a research resource. His blogs have had over 600,000 views."



It's a date in Burton! History notes by Kath Hayhurst


A more recent pair of dates this month, prompted by the new display in the Memorial Hall, from the Local History Society Archive. They show past events in the village.

The Date Stone for the Memorial Hall is on the wall facing the car park and is from July 1956. James Caunt lived at Underfell, a large house, previously called Thornlee, which was situated where Thornleigh Drive is now.



The second date is from May 1957 and is on the dedication plaque of the Memorial Hall. This plaque is inside the main entrance, and explains why it is called the Memorial Hall. C.W.F.Penryn-Hornby lived at Dalton Hall.

SUMMER HOLIDAY *Ideas for Family Days*

Pen-y-Ghent


We are very lucky to live on the border between the beautiful Lake District and the Yorkshire Peaks. If you are planning any walks with your family this Summer, you may find that the Yorkshire three peaks are just as satisfying as the Lakeland ones and maybe a little closer.



Pen-y-Ghent (meaning either "Hill on the Border" or "Heathen Hill") is the lowest of the Yorkshire three peaks at 694m. The round walk is 9.5km and should take 3-4 hours with a lunch stop. The height gained from the carpark in Horton-in-Ribblesdale is 540m. In the Summer there is an overflow carpark which is a little further away.

The path is pretty good all the way round. You can go clockwise or anticlockwise depending on whether you want to scramble up or down the steepest section (on the right of the summit in the picture). I personally prefer the anticlockwise direction, up the steep bit, which is more fun and gentler on the knees going down. You will meet lots of happy dogs although they will have to be on a lead through some sheep fields at the start and you may need to take water as there are not many streams on the way. You may also be sidetracked by some interesting potholes en route.

In the village there are several good pubs and cafes to refresh yourself after the walk and an interesting little shop called "Sew Hands On" that sells lovely ice cream and embroidered "I've climbed Pen-y-Ghent" badges to reward the kids. They may even want to collect the other two!



RAVENGLASS AND ESKDALE RAILWAY

The Ravenglass and Eskdale Railway is one of the oldest and longest narrow gauge railways in England. It is affectionately and locally known as 'La'al Ratty', which means 'little railway' in old Cumbrian dialect. The line was originally built in 1873.



The journey to the terminus at Dalesgarth takes 40 minutes. While the trip in itself is great fun for kids and adults, there are also lots of things to do along the way to fill a whole day - several days if you are able! There is an interesting railway museum at the Ravenglass Station. The train ride could be combined with a visit to Muncaster Castle (at additional cost) with its spectacular gardens, adventure playgrounds, enchanted trail and Hawk and Owl centre. Walkers can get off at Irton Station and walk back over Muncaster fell, only 230m but with a satisfying peak feeling and impressive views over the Scafell range (2-3 hours). Stanley Ghyll force at the Dalegarth terminus is definitely worth the short and well signposted walk.

Getting there: Approx 90 minutes by road.

Ingleborough Cave, Nature Trail, and Cafe.

Situated in the valley and hills above Clapham the Ingleton Cave & Nature Trail complex is a great family day out. Ingleborough Cave was first discovered in 1837 and is now a well lit, accessible, cave for all the family to visit.



You can explore the Cave via a self-guided route, walking 500 metres below Ingleborugh itself by means of concrete paths, with no steps. Dogs are welcome as long as they are on a lead. Normally open from 10am each day during the Summer but worth checking the website (see below). At the time of writing entry cost £13.50 for Adults, £11.50 for Senior Citizens & Students and £6.50 for Children aged 3 to 15. A family ticket (2 adults & 2 children) is £37. This price includes entry to the Estate Nature Trail that leads to the Cave.

The Estate Nature Trail has a 1.25 mile path leading to the Cave that winds through scenic woodland. There are also a number of other trails of varying length and difficulty that can be found on the website or by a leaflet at the entrance. Entry can be made to the Trail separately from the Cave for £2.50 for Adults and £1 for Children. It is open 24/7. Refreshments can be found at the Old Saw Mill Cafe.

Getting there: Approx 40 minutes by road.

Vicar's Letter...

A Mountain of Evidence

Dear Friends

When I wrote to you in July I encouraged you to drag out a garden chair (not knowing how much rain we were going to get!) and read an eyewitness account of the man of truth, Jesus. But what evidence is there that these short biographies (aka Gospels) are indeed eyewitness accounts and not bad history with little connection to real events?

Firstly, we can have confidence that the Gospels available to us are reliable copies and translations of the originals. Compared to other ancient writings (that are widely accepted as genuine) we have in existence today far more — thousands more — ancient copies of the New Testament books. This mountain of copies of whole Bible books and fragments are far closer in time to the originals than for any other ancient text. The oldest surviving New Testament fragment is on display at the John Rylands Library in Manchester and is believed to date from the 2nd Century.

Secondly, we have copies of many letters, sermons and other writings of early church leaders from the first few centuries AD. Between them they tell us that

- The Gospels of Matthew and John were written by those two members of the original 12 disciples
- Mark (who was not one of the 12) accompanied Peter on his extensive travels and recorded what Peter was teaching from his personal knowledge of Jesus.
- Luke, the doctor, used eyewitnesses as his sources (See Luke 1:1-4)

So, their claim is that the four Gospels are all, in one way or another, eye-witness accounts of the things that Jesus said and did. It is these eyewitnesses who claimed that Jesus had no deceit in him at all, and who heard Jesus say that those who hold to his teaching "will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."

I still have some free Gospels left so I'll repeat my offer – just send me a text or email and I'll be delighted to deliver one to you. I'm sure that summer is not over yet and that there will be some sunny days for you to sit and read and allow the authentic Jesus to appear before your mind's eye. Sincerely


