We have two categories of membership, Full Members having access to the green and clubhouse at any time and being eligible for selection for league matches, and Social Members who enjoy similar facilities but not match play. A Full Membership costs £ 40 and a Social Membership £25 payable in full at the start of the season.

Whilst membership numbers are sufficient to sustain the teams, we are very conscious that Burtonians are under-represented in the club, and we rely on the appeal that our green exerts by it's recognised quality, and the high level of bowling we can offer by having teams in the top divisions, to attract members from a wide geographic area.

### It's a date in Burton & Clawthorpe! History notes by Kath Hayhurst

1968. In the summer of that year we lived in Whittington, Lancashire which is 2 miles South of Kirkby Lonsdale, Westmorland. We heard there was going to be a sponsored walk through Burton-in-Kendal village, in aid of Burton Memorial Hall. As we were moving to Burton in September that year we decided to take part.

Myself and Colin our eldest son (then 7 years old) did the walk, the route being 16 miles. If my memory is correct Colin was the youngest to finish. Bill Newsham and Fred Row were 2 of the people I remember organising the event, for the Memorial Hall, and who welcomed us on arrival at the end.



According to the certificate, I raised £1 and 12 shillings! In 1969 we were living in Burton, and we did 16 miles again. This time my sponsorship was £1 and 16 shillings.

### Míke's Meanderíngs Around Burton

This is a longer walk than in the last edition but still along the lovely canal footpath. Version 1 is 9.5 km and version 2 11.8km. There is some road walking on both and a few gates and stiles.

1. From the village – access the towpath at B by going down Neddy Hill, over the motorway and under the viaduct – climb the steps on your left and head South down the canal. Leave the canal briefly to cross over the motorway at C and rejoin on the far side. Enjoy the 7 locks and then go under the A6070 at Tewitfield. Continue along the tow path (or stop for a quick pint at Longlands) past the Marina to the picnic area. A stile on the left will take you over the bridge D. Follow the lane that runs from the chapel to its end, then turn right on to White Beck Lane into Priest Hutton. By the Old School turn left up Upphall Lane, past the green, follow the road until it turns right, and look for a sign-posted lane on the left E. At the end of the lane there are steps over a wall. Two footpaths will take you either side of Coat Green Farm – the map shows the right-hand branch which goes anticlockwise round the farm. From the farm road there is a bridge over the steam to a gate giving access to a lane. Follow this lane to the end through the gate into Dalton Park (sheep in field), the path follows a ledge on the left of a wood, past two boulders and a stand-alone tree, head left toward another small wood and though a gate (path indistinct). After the gate look for a stile in the fence to your right. Over the stile go straight up the hill keeping to the right of the trees ahead. A small gate at the top of the field leads to a short track onto Dalton Lane. Turn left back into the village.



2. From the lane off Upphall road E – there is an alternative footpath that goes off to the right and takes you through Dalton Old Farm then back onto Dalton Road where it meets with Vicarage Lane F. From there you can go on down Vicarage Lane and back into the North End of the village. This route adds just over 2km and would probably take about 4 hours at average walking speed.

### **Burton Sky at Night**

Greetings from the astro nerd! This time I thought I would offer some ways for you to be able to take astrophotos of our night sky objects.

Astrophotography generally requires a very specific set of equipment and techniques to accomplish it, and it can be overwhelming for a beginner – possibly until now! If you are a beginner, I've got good news. With a camera and a tripod, starry landscapes like the one below are within your reach.

The photo here did not use a telescope to capture the scene. Instead, camera & lens were used to capture the colourful twilight and stars in the evening sky.

There are many different types of astrophotography, from wide-angle Milky Way and landscape photography, to deep-sky photography through an astronomical telescope as well as solar and lunar imaging. The basic

elements of this hobby include the understanding of long-exposure imaging, focusing, tracking the stars and image processing. This, until recently, has involved an array of more and more specialized equipment including a mount, telescope (or lens), camera, focusers, filters, PC power and software... the list goes on, as does the variety of different combinations for different targets. One can still manage to attain some pleasing wide field photos with an ordinary camera and a little help in the processing in light room, as in the photo above, but for faint and deep sky objects more sophisticated equipment is needed and, be warned, this can be a very expensive 'rabbit hole' to dive down!

However, over the last 2-3 years an array of "Smart telescopes" have come on the market which make all this so much "easier". Two of these were released in 2023 which opened up the market even further as they were vastly cheaper than any of the existing competition. All of these smart-scopes are controlled from an Android or iOS tablet or smartphone using their proprietary apps and further image editing can be done from the tablet photo editing software found on them. They come in a variety of shapes and sizes, but what they all do is make everything simple and straight forward in producing some remarkable images of structures in space millions of miles away. I took advantage of an introductory offer on the Seestar S50 model last year with a view to being able to use it when travelling or visiting family living away. On the next page are a set of images of some of the different models on the market and, as you can see, there is quite a range of prices!

So, what do these smart telescopes do? Well pretty much everything except the final processing. Here I am speaking from my experience in using the Seestar, I believe all the others work similarly, but those with the considerably higher price, one hopes better. I know from a fellow astrophotographer that the Vaonis system has a very impressive way of producing wider fields of view by forming mini panoramas of areas of sky, the Seestar doesn't do this ...yet.

The Seestar can switch modes, using the app; Deep space mode(Nebula and Galaxies); Solar mode enabling safe views of solar activity(don't forget to fit the supplied Solar filter!!); Lunar mode for stunning images of the moon and finally to an ordinary daytime mode for telephoto views of landscapes or perhaps wildlife. Once the skies are clear I pop the Seestar out in the garden, switch on, ensure the unit is level and its compass calibrated (important, but easily managed with instructions from the app). I choose what I want to photograph. The Seestar finds the targets automatically from its inbuilt skyatlas and will continue to track that target once found. It has its own inbuilt autofocus and, when ready, will build up an image through stacking hundreds of 10-30 second images automatically and you can watch this image build in real time. It has its own inbuilt filters for reducing light pollution and improving nebula images and has a built-in heater to stop the lens getting covered in dew/frost. The images can be further edited on the phone or the tablet or downloaded to your computer should you want to use more sophisticated software.

Would I swap my telescopes and astro cameras? No way! But as a way of finding your way into astronomy and astrophotography these little bundles are an amazing piece of equipment offering incredible value for money. They offer access to the night sky without the massive learning curve involved in doing it the more conventional way. For my purposes of travel, it has worked well. For any family with an interest in science, the natural world and a bit of photography they offer a wealth of opportunities both educationally and as something that parent and child can enjoy in equal measures.

### Vicar's Letter... The Scapegoat

Dear Friends,

Perfect justice is appealing: those who've betrayed us, or trampled on us, will get all they deserve, either at the hands of men or by the hand of God (see my February letter: https://vicarburtonholme.blogspot.com). Perfect justice is appealing – until we remember that we must answer for our mistreatment of others and, even worse, we remember that we have lived our lives trying to keep the God who made us out of the picture. I did it my way,' is the confession of rebels who must expect to be overthrown by the One who rightfully belongs on the throne of our lives.

Many know what Jesus said about this – that he had not come, initially, to execute judgment but to offer forgiveness. 'Son, your sins are forgiven' (Mark 2:5) were Jesus' startling words to the paralysed man lying on his mat. But how is forgiveness possible? Not by God sweeping our rebellion under the carpet, ignoring the things that we have said and done to others; rather by Jesus taking our place. On that first Good Friday, Jesus' body was horribly broken on the cross by the penalty that should have been mine and yours.

But how is it just for Jesus to be punished for something he didn't do, and for me not to be punished for the things that I have done? No-one made a scapegoat of Jesus against his will. Jesus said that no-one would take his life from him, "but I lay it down of my own accord" (John 10:18). If Jesus and those he is rescuing were legally separate persons then it would still be immoral to punish 'the wrong person'. But the Bible says that those who trust in Christ are more closely joined

to him than even the 'two-become-one' bond of marriage. Jesus takes on himself the unpayable debt that we owe God and he gives to his people all that he is, and shares with us all that he has. Despite the objections of some, the cross of Jesus is actually the place where God demonstrates his perfect justice (Romans 3:25).

So, that leaves one question: Do we want to continue to bear full responsibility for our actions, or are we willing to accept Jesus' invitation and let him shoulder the burden and blame for us? (Galatians 2:16) Happy Easter!


