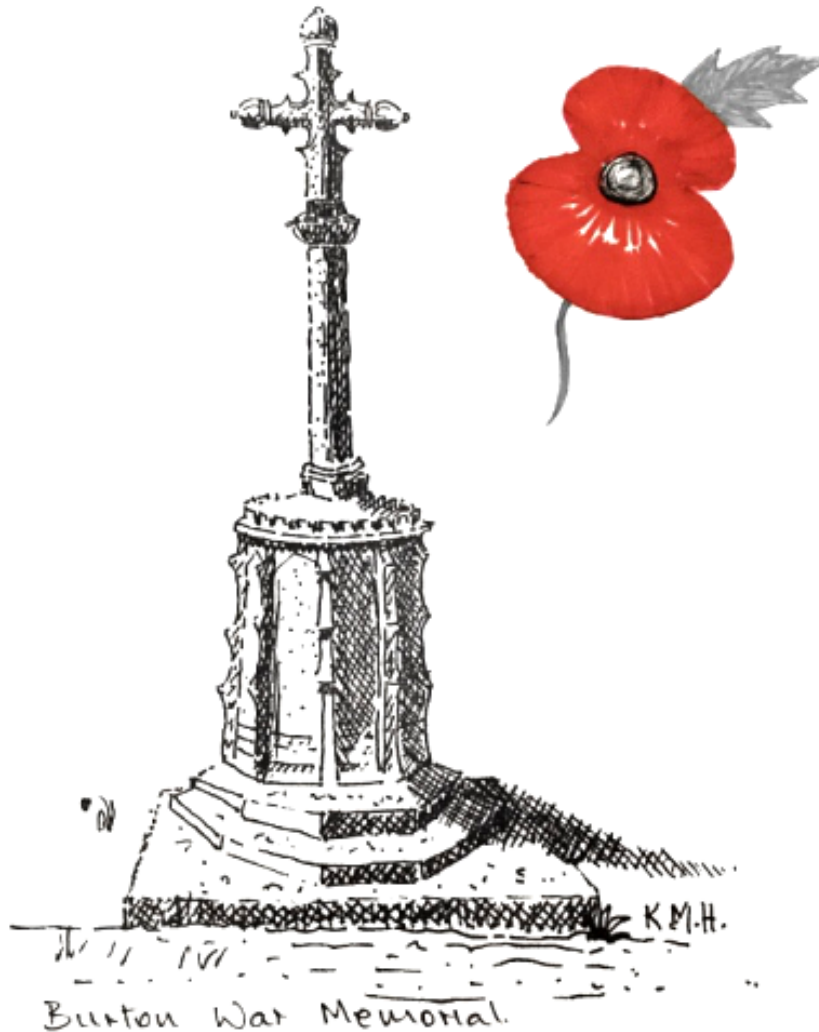

Burton Fell Walkers Walk reports Crooklands [Wednesday 6th October]

On Sunday 6th October eight members of BFS enjoyed an easy 5 mile walk. After meeting at Burton Memorial Hall we arranged car sharing and drove to Crooklands. Leaving the cars we walked past the Westmorland County showground and admired the various styles of dry stone walling.

We got onto the canal banks at bridge 167 and turned left. As we strolled along one of our party relayed several interesting facts about the history of the canal, in particular the milestones. We made a brief stop at Stainton Aqueduct, where we were informed of the extensive repairs that were made after Storm Desmond did his worst. This aqueduct is a real feat of engineering, as are many other aspects of the waterway.

We carried on along the towpath and soon got to the drained section, (part of the ongoing renovations). We left the canal where it is obstructed by the A590 and walked the road to join the Hincaster Trailway.

The trailway follows part of the disused single track line that ran from Arnside to Hincaster. On leaving the Trailway we walked along quiet lanes via Deepthwaite and back to the vehicles. We enjoyed fair weather apart from a short light shower.

It's A Date In Burton: by Kath Hayhurst

The Royal Hotel, Part 4.

The Waterhouse Family (see Part 3 of the Royal's history in September's Burton News) moved from the Royal, to The Houghton Arms Hotel, Southport. A descendant of the family, who lives near our son Jeffrey, in Australia, is researching them.

In 1849 the Victualler at the Royal Oak, was Edward Cragg. He was still there when the 1851 census was taken, with 7 daughters and 1 son. By 1861 the Victualler was James Wilson Holmes, with his wife, step daughter, daughter, and sister-in-law, a house servant and 2 boarders.

In 1869 William Titterington was at the Royal Oak. He was still there in 1871 with his wife Christina, 2 daughters and 1 son, his brother and 2 servants. He was recorded there in 1873, and again on the 1881 census. Now described as a Hotel keeper and farmer of 35 acres. He was 45 years old and his second wife Eliza was 25. With them were his daughters aged 18 & 16 and a son of 11, plus another daughter aged 11 months, and 1 servant.



In 1891 William Titterington his wife, 5 daughters, 1 son, 1 servant, and an Agricultural Labourer lived at the Inn. On May 4th 1891 a large wedding reception was held at the Hotel for Anthony Dixon of Dalton Old Hall and his bride Hannah Wilson.

A photograph of the wedding breakfast, and receipts, from the event, are in the book "*Burton-in-Kendal, Clawthorpe and Dalton, Photographic Memories.*"

The County of Cumbria's 50th Anniversary

On Friday 4th October His Majesty's Lord-Lieutenant of Cumbria, Mr. Alexander Scott, with grateful thanks to the Dean of Carlisle, hosted a Service of Celebration at Carlisle cathedral to mark 50 years since the creation of Cumbria. The service brought together local residents, community leaders, and dignitaries. It was a tribute not only to Cumbria's stunning landscapes but also to the people who make it a special place to live, work, and visit.

The celebration also reflected on Cumbria's industrial and agricultural history, where natural resources have fueled industries like farming, iron and steel, shipbuilding, and mining for centuries. Despite its isolation, Cumbria became a hub of innovation, home to the UK's first nuclear power site and diverse industries that today produce everything from submarines to cheese.

Burton-in-Kendal was represented at the service by Kath Hayhurst, who says:

"The Burton Parish Council kindly nominated me to attend this service. I was accompanied by our daughter, Joanne Leeman.

The ancient Cathedral was packed with people from all over the county, some in uniform. We were seated near the high altar.

The service began with an introduction by Mr Alexander Scott, H.M. Lord Lieutenant of Cumbria.

The first reading was by Louise Green, Vice President of the Lakeland Dialect Society. The hymns included 'Hills of the North Rejoice', and 'John Peel'; the latter was performed by a local Primary School. The sermon was given by the Rt. Rev. James Bell, Hon. Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Carlisle."

A Note from the Post Office about Christmas Posting 2024

A leaflet with useful information will soon be available in the Post Office but the latest recommended posting dates are summarised below:

Surface Mail (International Economy)

Remember that parcels sent outside the U.K. need to have a customs form attached, these are available at the Post Office Counter. Regulations have changed and we are now required to enter customs information at the counter. This is time consuming, please be patient with us.

It would be helpful to call in and collect a label so you can fill it in before you bring your parcel to post. Also remember to put your name and address on the top left hand corner of the front of your package; this will enable Royal Mail to return your item should overseas customs authorities refuse it entry into their country.

The usual reminder about size and weight for parcels sent abroad using Royal Mail.

The maximum total of (length + width + height) is 90 cm (approx 3ft) with the maximum single dimension of 60cm (approx 2 ft). Also, the maximum weight is 2 kg.

It is really easy to exceed these and then the parcel would cost a great deal more to send via Parcel Force. It is sometimes cheaper to split a heavy parcel and send two packets.

Dangerous Goods

To comply with national and international regulations governing the carriage of mail, and to ensure that mail in transport does not present a danger to the general public, Royal Mail must restrict or prohibit certain items from their network.

So this year we will once again have to ask you what are the contents of your parcels; not just because we are being nosy or looking for gift ideas ourselves, but because there are restrictions on items containing, for example, batteries, nail varnish, perfume, aerosols etc.

Lithium batteries (the type commonly found in mobile phones and laptops), cannot be sent alone, and for international mail they must be packaged in the equipment. Beware, some countries do not permit the import of lithium batteries at all.

As always, come & ask us at the Post Office Counter for further advice.

Logs of note for the area of Burton are:

1/10 – A burglary was reported at a local farm, whereby a number of items were taken, a pallet of milk, a post knocker, log splitter, calf feeders. If anyone saw a larger vehicle in the early hours that could fit all these items in then please ring Cumbria Constabulary on 101 quoting log no CP-20241001-0045

9/10 – A report of a group of youths causing ASB in the area. Officers attended and were unable to locate the youths.

27/9 – A hate incident was reported in the area. A hate incident is any incident that is directed towards anyone because of their race, religion, sexual orientation, disability or because they are transgender.

Home Security

With winter quickly approaching we are urging people to take several measures to protect themselves and their properties during the darker nights.

- Keep front and back doors locked as well as outbuildings and sheds.
- Light up the front door with dusk to dawn lighting.
- Make sure your house door is visible from the street, cut down hedges, if people can see you then they can also see a burglar breaking in.
- Try not to leave your house in silent darkness, just leave a radio on this could make a potential burglar think twice.
- Never leave a spare key outside, burglars know all the hiding spots!
- Keep bins away from porches/windows, so they cannot be used as a potential climbing aid.
- Consider joining or setting up a Neighbourhood Home Watch scheme.

Anyone who wishes to receive some Selecta DNA then please do get in touch with either myself Amanda.coleman@cumbria.police.uk or Adam adam.roberts@cumbria.police.uk Selecta DNA is a product that you can mark your valuable property with, within each sample there is unique marking that you can register to your home address. This does not stop the item being stolen but if we come across a stolen item when apprehending a burglar, we can then return the item to you.

Operation Lantern

Operation Lantern is Cumbria Constabulary's operation to target rural incidents and reduce rural crime. A dedicated Rural Crime team was established in September 2023. Rural crime is defined as “ any acquisitive crime or related offences which occur in rural areas”.

While this team specialises in combating rural crime, they are supported by the wider constabulary day to day. A number of departments including the Neighbourhood Policing teams, Road Policing and other policing departments have received rural crime training and will be supported with all investigations by the specialist team.

Cumbria Constabulary's Rural Crime Strategy seeks to:

- * Provide an outstanding policing service to the Rural Communities of Cumbria
- * Ensure our Rural Communities feel safe.
- * Make Cumbria a hostile environment for travelling acquisitive criminals.
- * Build effective partnerships to respond to the needs of Rural Communities
- * Increase the confidence of Rural Communities in Cumbria Constabulary

For 2023 – 2025 Cumbria's Rural Crime Priorities are:

- * Burglary of rural business and farm premises
- * Theft of farm machinery, agricultural vehicles and plant equipment
- * Fuel Theft
- * Environmental offences including waste and scrap metal offences
- * Wildlife offences
- * Equine and livestock offences

Dear Friends,

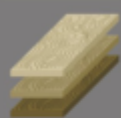
