POLICE REPORT

9/8/25 – A high value Burglary was reported to us on Church Bank Gardens. Extensive house to house and CCTV enquiries were done. Goods were reported being found in the Church grounds. If anyone has any information regarding this then please ring 101.

Residents of Burton have reported speeding through the village and have concerns around School times. Community Speedwatch is an initiative where proactive members of the local communities join with the support and supervision of their local police to record details of speeding vehicles using approved detection devices. Registered keepers of vehicles exceeding the speed limit are contacted by us – initially with a letter explaining the potential risks and consequences of their dangerous behaviour. Repeat offenders will receive a visit from the local police, irrespective of where they live. Speeding is widespread and felt everywhere, we receive numerous reports of vehicles speeding.

People die needlessly in avoidable crashes caused by inattentive or anti-social drivers. Complaints from residents say they feel unsafe using their local roads and they state their quality of life is diminished. Speedwatch activity is not about interfering with neighbour's behaviour, it is a proactive solution by your own neighbours to improve the safety and quality of life for everyone in the village. BURTON BOWLING CLUB

Unbelievably another season of competitive bowling is approaching it's climax. This has been an exceptional summer for bowling weatherwise, with very few fixtures adversely affected by rain or other unpleasant conditions, although the lack of rain for a long spell in the early season has presented something of a challenge to greenkeepers.

On the playing side, the destination of the Kendal League 1st Division Championship, which Burton A won last year, is still undecided at the time of writing, with the A team still having a chance of winning the title again if results go their way. The B team who also grace Division 1 have almost certainly retained their place in the top tier for another year, a very creditable effort in a high quality field.

In the Morecambe League the A team have almost certainly secured promotion from Division 2, probably as Champions. Our B team in Division 3 have struggled to attain wins and it is possible it could be relegated. However on the bright side some new players have been blooded with encouraging signs of better things to come from them next year.

The Veterans Team (over 60's) in the Lancaster and District Veterans' League have gone from strength to strength as the season progressed and will finish the season well placed in the top Division. Overall a satisfactory season.

One cloud on the horizon is that in the last week or two it has become apparent that the previously well-grassed green is suffering from a disease which is common on bowling greens and golf courses, caused by a combination of factors which include consistent temperatures of over 20C, of which we have had plenty this summer. Advice has been taken on the steps needed to overcome the problem and to restore the grass cover, which are substantial. This work is to commence as soon as the last league matches are over during the first week in September, and unfortunately means the green will be closed from then until next spring. This has meant that our participation in the Floodlit League, which rounds off outdoor bowling in the autumn, has had to be cancelled for this year.

Night...ish Skies over Burton September2025


Hello again after a break from my astronomical waffle over the summer months. The evenings have started to draw in and there is, by the time you are reading this, starting to be some usable Astronomical darkness for deep-sky astrophotography. However, two of the three items I have for you in this winter's first article are very much non-night-time occurrences to look out for.

The first of these is a **total eclipse of the moon on 7th September** and will be just as the moon is rising over the East-Southeastern horizon. Unfortunately for us sat in Burton our horizon has two many lovely fells and woodlands to block the view to the east so you might try a wander up onto Clawthorpe to Farleton Knott ridge, Burton




Fell or even down to Silverdale beach which might offer a better view. For those more adventurous, the top of a Lakeland fell may be advantageous or if you're lucky enough to be heading away to the east coast at this time, then a view out over the North Sea from somewhere like Whitby could be stunning, given a clear sky of course. The moon actually rises fully eclipsed and the progressively becomes clear of the Earth's shadow as it continues to rise.

The second event, that may be visible, happens on 19th September over lunch time. Please be VERY careful with this as it will be relatively close to the same area of sky as the sun. Ideally use a high wall to keep the sun blocked from accidental viewing with or without any binoculars or small telescopes. Looking directly at the sun can seriously & permanently damage your eyes.



Finally, for a proper late-night look into the heavens, **Saturn reaches "opposition"** on 21st September and will be as close to the Earth as it will get for another year. This means that the Earth and Saturn are both on the same side of the Sun forming a straight line.



Saturn will rise in the southeast late evening but will be best visible in the southern sky around midnight. Unfortunately, at this time Saturn's rings are very much edge on so less easy to see but with a good pair of binoculars or telescope you may be able to see some evidence of the rings as well as several of Saturn's 274 moons. As we move towards late December and next January, Jupiter will present a similar opportunity and is an easier target.



Hopefully, by the time we get to the next instalment I should have some images collected from the back garden's night skies to share. If any of you have any suggestions for future articles on back-garden astronomy or any questions, please feel free to drop me a message. Clear skies, Steve


When can I retire?

Dear Friends

When I arrived in Holme and Burton 12 years ago and began to get to know the villages and the congregations I discovered that a man called Medwin Sherriff, already in his 80s, was doing a lot of things in Holme. Nobody seemed to know how long he had had these roles but the time was measured in decades rather than years.

That applied to him serving on the Parish Council, and as Chairman of the Parish Council, but also to his editing of the Holme Parish Newsletter, a mix of church news and other village news – the rough equivalent for Holme of 'Burton News'. Medwin told me that he'd been asked to edit the newsletter by a vicar who was so far back in the history of the church that (as a newcomer) I'd never heard of him. Medwin had edited the newsletter, year after year, ever since.





We've got very used to the idea of retirement – both from paid jobs but also from unpaid roles. Sometimes we have to stop, but we can also just reach a point where we say, "I've done my part, someone else can do this hard work now!"

The Bible certainly teaches us that work has been frustratingly difficult right from the fall of man onwards, but Jesus also tells us that work is fundamentally good because he knows that God, his Father, is always at his work (Jn 5:17).

Medwin seems to have understood that very well, as he continued labouring to the best of his ability, in the service of others, and encouraged and supported by his wife, Molly, until he really couldn't work anymore.

Medwin Sherriff died at home on 17th July, aged 94. His funeral was held at Holy Trinity Holme on Friday 15th August. I thank God for Medwin, for his steady energy and hard work, and for the great encouragement and help that he was to me, and to so many others.

WESTMORLAND AND FURNESS COUNCIL - ARMED FORCES SUPPORT

Additional emotional and practical support will be offered to Armed Forces families in need through the launch of a new partnership initiative commissioned by Westmorland and Furness Council.

The partnership will see specialised welfare support provided for Armed Forces families, with the aim of tackling non-clinical issues that contribute to poor physical and mental wellbeing, stress and anxiety and reduce delays in discharge from hospital and unnecessary readmission to hospital.

The initiative has been set up between Westmorland and Furness Council, University Hospitals of Morecambe Bay NHS Foundation Trust (UHMBT) and the Defence Medical Welfare Services (DMWS) charity.

An officer from DMWS, working alongside a hospital discharge team and in partnership with the council's adult care team, will identify Armed Forces families and veterans on admission to hospital or in the council's customer service centres. This should improve access for those who require specialist support for physical injuries and related medical problems attributed to their time in the Armed Forces.

DMWS will support the individual and their family members/carers by assessing their needs and identify access to solutions to support:

Better experiences of healthcare, aiding quicker recovery.

Reducing stress and anxiety.

Accessing financial support and safe housing.

Tackling feelings of isolation.

Strategies to reduce alcohol and drug misuse.

Accessing treatment for mental health illnesses such as PTSD.

Finding meaningful employment or volunteering opportunities after service.

The 12-month project, starting in September, will be monitored and assessed to ensure it makes a difference to Armed Forces families.

PARISH COUNCIL SKETCH

It was a busy meeting this month for the Parish Council with a number of residents turning out to raise concerns about traffic in the village, and a presentation by the Canal and Rivers Trust amongst much other business.

First of all the main topic of conversation was the traffic, as covered in last month's Burton News. Several residents raised their concerns, and the councillors gave an update on the current situation and the steps they are taking to address these concerns. The first resident to speak in the Open Forum raised the question of whether 30mph is a suitable speed for the village. She spoke in particular about her concerns that cars travelling within the current speed limit cause a danger to pedestrians. She mentioned that many places along Main Street have very narrow paths or no paths at all with a number of blind spots making it treacherous to walk along in parts. She raised the concerns of walking with elderly, disabled or very young companions, and how difficult it can be to navigate the paths with cars passing very close to them. Another resident spoke about the increase in size of the average vehicle now, which means they have to drive very close to the pavements to be able to pass each other safely, and some vehicles have been observed mounting the pavements rather than waiting for a safe point to proceed.

Later on in the meeting, the councillors began to outline action that has been taken so far, and their future plans. First of all, as you enter the village from both north and south, there are Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs). These flash up your speed as you approach them. However, they also record your speed which can be used for analysis later. A summary of this data was presented by the council which showed that the average speed recorded between June and August by the SID at the Clawthorpe end of the village showed vehicles passing at an average of 27.15mph. Of those cars recorded speeding at this location, the average speed was 33.8mph. During the same period, the SID near Green Dragon Farm recorded an average speed of 27.39mph, and the cars breaking the speed limit at this point recorded an average of 33.8mph. Although this does not sound like a great deal over the limit, it must be noted that these figures are averages, and many drivers reduce their speed at these points, only to accelarate again afterwards.

The reaction of the councillors to this analysis was to conclude that the evidence showed that therefore we do not have a speeding problem in the village. In fact, the chairperson, Mr Francis Mason-Hornby said 'there is a bigger issue of perceived speeding in the village than actual speeding'. This elicited an angry response from one resident who said that surely it is our perception that matters, and that the Council needed to respond to residents feelings. However, as this part of the meeting was not within the Open Forum, the chairman stopped any further comments from the public. The Council decided to use a Freedom of Information Request to ask Cumbria Police how many people have been prosecuted for speeding in the village. However residents will surely question whether this demonstrates a lack of a problem of speeding in the village or a lack of enforcement of the law by Police.

Other issues of traffic were discussed such as the use of the A6070 as an alternative when traffic is heavy on the M6. It is very difficult to stop this, as modern Sat Navs will direct their users this way to avoid the M6, and indeed many HGV's are unable to use the A6 as an alternative diversion due to a low bridge at Skew Bridge.

It was also discussed whether or not the A6070 can be reclassified as a B road. Councillor Vicky Hughes has made enquiries to the highways department at Westmorland and Furness Council to see if this is a possibility. If it can be done, it may mean that we can apply for a 20mph speed limit, however, it may also mean some negative consequences, such as less money for maintance, and a lower priority for gritting in the winter. Councillor Hughes will return with an update once she has received a reply from the highways department. It was noted that Westmorland and Furness Council have also undertaken a traffic survey in the village recently, although it's purpose and outcome was unknown.

Another noteworthy event at the meeting was a presention by The Lancashire Canal and Rivers Partnership which included representatives from Westmorland and Furness Council and the Canal and Rivers Trust. You may have noticed that a stretch of the canal has been improved north of Holme towards Stainton. This group is now proposing to extend these improvements from their current point south, finishing at the aqueduct on Station Lane, Burton. The aim is to make the towpath accessible to all users, including pushchairs, wheelchairs, and bicycles. They are currently seeking funding (estimated at £700,000) to improve this leg of the canal which is approximately 3.5km. More information on this will appearr in future editions of Burton News.

The Parish Council are also working on improving the footpath to link Meadow Close to Boon Town Lane. They are exploring different ways forward to ensure this happens, linking this area to the main amenities in the village.

The Parish Council are also upgrading their website and moving to a new provider which should be more cost effective. This was approved at the meeting.

The Parish Council still have one vacancy for a new member. Please get in touch with them if you want to be part of shaping the future of the village, and ensure democracy in the village is effective.

Disappointingly, there was no further discussion as to the wording or size of the plaque on the coronation bench (or should that be Coronation Bench?)

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Thursday 18th September at 7.30pm. Remember that every meeting has an Open Forum towards the beginning of the meeting, in which residents can raise any concerns or respond to comments made in previous meetings. Just turn up and have your say. You do not have to sit through the rest of the meeting, although you are welcome to.
