



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Outdoors

Spring is here - it must be. Celandines are shining yellow in the grass beside the path and one violet with a short stem is showing its purple petals. So the good time of the year has come. But which year? I'm climbing the path above the granite boulders of Lamorna Cove a few miles west of Penzance. On my left the space in front of a quarrymen's row is littered with chunks of broken stone and the householder is working with pick and spade to craft an intricate garden - little ledges bright with daffodils, a metal table in front of a granite seat made from a single stone, clumps of sea asters dripping

over low palisades. Behind a steel-mesh fence a model herring gull perches on a post, next to three model dogs with their muzzles held up to the wind. As Klipper our lurcher comes near them, they burst into life and dash to and fro, barking in a frenzy - not models at all - three Dalmatians, one black-spotted, one brown, one pale. Klipper is terrified and outnumbered and

has to be persuaded past them on the leash. An ornamental notice on the fence says, 'A Life Without Friends Is Like A Garden Without Flowers'.

Down on the seaward slope a crag now rears powerfully out of the tangled bracken, blackthorn, ivy, and wind-twisted ash: a vertical face split from above by a black wedge-shaped cleft, lying back into a smooth slab with lichenous cracks. I'm climbing it, or trying to, with the utmost difficulty. I teeter up, toeing tiny ledges, and stay balanced just long enough to fix an alloy protection nut in the cleft and thread my rope through its karabiner. Then balance deserts me, I'm forced to jump back down onto

the plinth - only ten feet or so, enough to frighten me and leave the balls of my feet half numb, half tingling. Surely this little route is climbable? I breathe a bit, then start upwards again. Feet on the wee ledges, reach the foot of the cleft - how to gain height? Smear footsoles on the rockface, trusting the big coarse granite crystals to give good friction - they do, they do - I can reach the sharp side lip of the cleft, pull sideways on it, will myself over the eave and now my centre of gravity is up-and-over and I'm creeping up the slab like a well-adjusted snail. Struggle and fear are done with, behind and below me, and contentment can brim like water in a wellspring.

Only, this is not happening now, not in 2010. It happened

thirty-two years ago, on our second visit to West Penwith. It's all coming back to me, kind-of. We approached this beautiful crag not through the thickets above it, which would be impossible, but by boulder-hopping along the massive barnacled stones of the foreshore, drawn by the handsome pale-gold countenance of the crag. And I called the route up it (just for our own amusement -

you can't seriously claim or record so short a climb) Flying Enterprise, after the famous wreck of the American freighter some miles out to sea at Christmas 1950. Its skipper, Captain Carlsen, became a front-page hero because he stayed on his foundering ship as it was towed towards Falmouth. A lifebelt from the 'Flying Enterprise' hangs in a frame on the wall of the pub, the Lamorna Wink, two hundred yards away. Which is where we are now having our lunch of pasties and a glass or two, sitting immediately below the stained and tattered lifebelt.



Roger Reports...

Councils in the last month have been obsessed with setting budgets in the face of Whitehall's demands to economise. As in recent years, local authorities are constrained by a reduction in the Revenue Support Grant from the Treasury, which at one time covered two thirds of local council expenditure, but which now only pays for about half. Similarly, the police authority which also sets its own 'rates' has to raise a greater proportion from the council tax. Thus in 2000 the local council tax payer contributed 20.3% to the police revenue - but for 2010-11 the local proportion will be 33.1%.

For a band 'B' tax payer the police cost has risen in the last ten years from £1.26 per week to £2.90, and overall the increase in the police rate has gone up 3% pa. Excluding the parish precept, which varies from place to place, the district and county increases have been the lowest on record. South Lakeland's share of the council tax has gone up by 2.9%, despite a proposal (which got little general publicity) from the opposition group (to which I belong) for no increase (0%) at all! As a result, a band B council tax payer will now pay £136.81 for the district council services like waste collection.

Less onerous was Cumbria County Council's 1.9% increase in their share of the tax. For a band B property

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Cumbria's tax will now be £903.39 pa. Though band B is invariably the point of reference, it is unhelpful for Burton which has hardly any homes in that category. For the record the bands and council tax payable in the coming year are Band A (up to £40,000) £774.33; B (up to £52,000) £903.39; C (up to £68,000) £1,032.44; D (up to £1,161.50); E (up to £120,000) £1,419.61; F (up to £160,000) £1,677.72; G (up to £320,000) £1,935.83; H (over £320,001) £2,323.00. Because of high property values I would like a higher band for properties worth over £500,000, as to me it seems odd that a detached village house or even one on an estate (valued at £320,000) pays the same as a stately home with an estate! But, please, what do you think?

On general finance South Lakeland received a disturbing 'Annual Audit Letter' from government scrutineers, which judged SLDC's 'managing finances' and governing the business' at Level 2 - 'performs adequately' while 'managing resources' was Level 1 - 'performs poorly.'

On the county council a significant issue is the costs of last November's floods. Under the government's 'Bellwin' scheme the county has to meet the first £1.2m of costs. In addition there are the costs of 'significant damage to highways infrastructure' caused by the floods estimated at £9m and those following the most severe winter since 1963 - only part of which will be met from reserves. Even so, road schemes planned for Burton include the resurfacing of Main Street (£150,000+) and surfacing dressing of Vicarage Lane as far as 19 Trees and also of Tarn Lane as far as the county boundary. It is hoped that the Main Street work will take place in August when the school is closed - but I'll try and let you know precise dates.

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Apart from finance, other matters have kept us busy. The debate about the possible extensions of the both the Yorkshire Dales and Lake District National Parks continues. Many people want a referendum to gauge public opinion in both the possible joining areas, and also in adjoining parishes like Burton, which might be affected by increased development pressure if neighbouring areas achieve extra protection because of national park status.

A plan to share services with South Lakeland and Eden was approved after a long debate at SLDC only after it was stressed that it would not lead to merging the two councils. But fear of merger contributed to Eden Council rejecting the scheme.


One of South Lakeland's perennial problems has resurfaced - the Grange swimming pool. After about 20 years of campaigning the Berners Close pool was built in the 1990s to replace the 1930s outdoor pool. But the new facility was un-economical and soon closed. Now a scheme to turn the complex into a retirement hotel has been abandoned and replaced by plans for housing for older people.

I have recently been informed of an apparent anomaly on waste collection, which is that the assisted collection scheme only applies to wheelie bins and not to recycling boxes. I will try and find out why. In the meantime if you would like assisted collection for the bins please ring SLDC on 0845 050 4434.

Finally I must note an unfortunate sign of Spring, which is that a patch of gorgeous winter aconites on Clawthorpe Lane have been dug up and removed along with some snowdrops. This is illegal, though the police weren't sure







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
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how to proceed and wondered who the 'owner is', though I suggested the county council; nor could I say how long they had been there or if, in the officer's words, they were 'wild wild flowers'! But at least we can enjoy the daffodils.

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Going Green - Apr '10

How bad are bananas?


"Got any cheese? I want to make cheese on toast," says Carbonlite, rummaging through the fridge. "You can't have cheese any more, it's bad for the planet," I tell him. "Says who?" he asks. "A new book." "A new book says cheese causes climate change?" "I didn't say it was the single handed promoter of global warming. Just fairly bad." I shove some publicity under his nose. How bad are bananas? is the first book to work out the carbon footprint of (nearly) everything, from a cup of tea and a bottle of wine through to skiing holidays and volcano eruptions. It aims to put everything into perspective, with entries for the big things in life like bushfires and the Irag War, down to some of the smaller but vital purchases we make, like a simple pint of lager. "And I've news for you. Plastic bags have the smallest footprint of any item listed," I say. He doesn't seem all that surprised, as he pokes around in the fridge looking for cheese substitutes.

Apart from winding up Carbonlite, there's a reason I'm interested in this book – I helped inspire the book. A few years ago, when I first began writing this column, I asked carbon footprinter Mike Berners-Lee, who specialises in organisational responses to climate change, to take me around a supermarket and advise me on the carbon footprint of the contents of my trolley. Half an hour into the shopping trip and we gave up and went home. He simply didn't know the answer to my questions. There was no information on many of the products to say how they'd travelled to the supermarket and where they'd travelled from. He could take a guess, but couldn't give me any proper figures. But he vowed to change all that and went

away to get his head down, find out the information and do the sums, enlisting Booth's supermarket to help him do his research. His first chapter of the new book outlines our day out to the supermarket. The rest of the book is an easily readable account of the carbon footprint of everyday items, as well as a guide to managing our consumption.

Now I have new ammunition to fire back at carbonlite when he's being a nag about driving too much or putting on the heating too often. I can get him on the cheese. "Have we any peanut butter or is that bad too?" he asks. "You'll have to read the book," I say. "So how bad are bananas?" he asks. "I haven't got to that bit yet." I help myself to a bourbon biscuit, knowing I'll find its footprint sooner or later, probably somewhere between bananas and cheese.

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Comments on the goings-on at the Parish Council...

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING INVITATION ADDRESS ON THE NORTH-WEST AIR AMBULANCE

It's a matter for comment if anyone apart from PCllrs turns up to hear the guest speaker invited for these occasions (a bit similar to Burton News AGM, where it's impressive if more than one visitor puts in an appearance.) So A.O. can report that as usual there was only one member of the public at this valuable talk – and he was the husband of a PCllr, so I'm not sure that counts.

What a pity, as this talk, given by a volunteer fund-raiser for the North-West Air Ambulance was informative, and, it can be supposed, of possible importance to all of us. At times it was moving, too, as the speaker had herself lost her son in a horrendous accident, where sadly even the Air Ambulance was powerless to save him. A.O. kept notes, and hopefully may write up the talk in a later issue for B.N. readers.

The Chairman's Annual Report

This will be printed in full in the Parish Council's newsletter, which lets A.O. off the hook for reporting it here. Nevertheless here a few selected bits which involve Burtonians directly:

Newly-coopted PCIIr, M.Taylor, is at present masterminding improvements to Slape Lane.

A PCIIr is available before the monthly PC meetings to discuss issues with parishioners.

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Info re the PC is now regularly updated on the PC website.

Our Dist.Cllr Roger Bingham is now Chairman of CCC (this may or may not affect the village directly. Who knows?).

The PC has been involved in trying to solve parking problems at Morewood School and has also approved plans for an extension to the school building.

Two bus-shelters are now in place.

There's an emergency back-up plan for icy weather.

The PC has taken responsibility for the playground.

There's a change in the precept due to the PC reducing the reserve over the last two years. This results in a rise of 31% this year. (Not as bad as it seems. All explained in the Parish Newsletter.)

As usual this Chairman's report is clear and concise and this year the PC's achievements are somewhat impressive, though of course A.O. has to be a tad grudging about this.

Police Report

Rachel Thomas, our Community Officer, sent in her report: A window was broken in a house on Main Street, and a handbag stolen. A youth is on remand for earlier burglaries committed in Burton, and in other parts of Lancs, but so far no lead on the theft of the handbag. Lads reported selling small items on Morewood Drive had in fact a licence to sell.

Standing Orders

Appropriately it was agreed that members of the public addressing the PC should be required to stand. In future Public Forum time will be limited to 15 minutes. Maximum length of PC meetings should be 3 hours. All proposals were agreed by the PC.

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Surface Road Markings on Main Street.

PCIIrs will meet a Highways officer to cover the ground and decide where they consider road markings would be of benefit. (N.B. This only applies to marking on the road itself.)

Emergency Plan

"What emergencies were these?" was the discussion. Plans should be in place for:

A train, aircraft or helicopter crash.

Severe storm, or other severe weather causing road blockage or impairment to services (e.g. Electricity.) A serious RTI on the M6.

(It's A.O.'s experience that unexpected individuals rise to the fore on these occasions, and anyway those marked out for key roles will probably be dead or wounded. Just a few helpful comments on the worst scenario!)

Unfortunately for Burton PC, Holme PC got there first and have already formulated an emergency plan. It's a bit complicated too. By the time you've finished reading it the emergency will probably be over.

Other Matters

- 1.. It was decided to go ahead with providing a sign at the foot of Boon Town for the playground. (Some good jokes here. Pity you all missed them.)
- 2. The dangerously slippery surface of Dalton Lane was reported and Highways will be informed.

Reports from PC reps

The School. The rep told the PC that the school had received a good report from OFSTED.

Quarry Liaison

This rep reported that quarry management are trying to



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promote action on the flooding on the A6070.

Local Area Partnership

Somehow this dubious set-up is in a position to donate £2000 to Burton and Holme. Generally this seemed to be regarded as a sweetener, as all seemed to agree there was little purpose in this additional layer of local govt.

Burton Memorial Hall

The rep reported that the hall had been judged completely clear of asbestos after the recent scare, though there are still questions re how the problem was handled.

Closure of the Recycling Amenity at Carnforth

A PCIIr confirmed that the franchise is due to end next year. It remains unclear whether the facility will remain in operation after that. This is clearly a serious matter for both the PC and Burtonians in general and it's to be hoped a solution will be found. Can our parish council rise to the occasion? Time will tell.

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Historical Footnote by Roger Bingham

1960 - BURTON NEWS 50 YEARS AGO

JANUARY

The district was hit by the worst blizzards since 1947. 60 snowploughs and 300 workmen kept the main roads open but there were complaints that Burton had been neglected. Hire purchase 'was all the rage': Whiteside's of Kendal advertised T.V. rentals for 9/5 per week and electric washers for 5/- pw; 'wonderful, new transistor radios were 14 guineas or 5/3 pw'. Later in the year there was controversy when council house tenants could rent fridges for 2s pw. Burton Amateur Dramatics (BADS) held a whist drive to raise funds for their next production.

FEBRUARY

Public protest meetings and petitions followed proposals to route 'the Lune Valley Trunk Road' via Kirkby Lonsdale. Eventually, as the M6, the route was diverted to run between Burton and Holme. Church bells were rung to celebrate the birth of the Queen's second son Prince Andrew. Led by a famous pedestrian, Dr. Barbara Moore, scores of walkers crossed the district on a John O' Groats to Lands End trek lured by a prize of £5,000. On one day snow fell continuously for 18 hours.

MARCH

The cast of BADS production of *Mother of Men* produced by J. Worsley included H. Fawcett, J. Pritchard, Diane Crayston, Patricia Fawcett, Gladys Philipson, Ella Airey, Barbara Taylor, R. Tattler and E. Fawcett. The Memorial Hall was packed out for all five performances. Burton Youth Club was divided into two 'houses' named after the Squire Major Penrhyn-Hornby - 'Penrhyn' and 'Hornby'. In a five-a-side football match 'Penrhyn', captained by David Holland, beat 'Hornby' captained by Derek Holt. Members also enjoyed a beatle drive organised by Mrs Wolton. At the Mothering Sunday service all mothers were presented with cards.



APRIL

Miss Dorothy Kendall was attended by four 'small bridesmaids' at her wedding, at the parish church, to Mr William W. Lund. All wore dresses of figured nylon with blue shoes to match their velvet sashes. The bride wore a short dress of ivory brocade. £20 was raised at a Memorial Hall whist drive towards a relief fund for victims of an earthquake in North Africa. There was a big row when it was discovered that a local fire engine was too wide to get up narrow lanes.

MAY

On 6 May school children had a day's holiday for the wedding of Princess Margaret to Anthony Armstrong-Jones. The Mother's Union held a coffee morning in aid of *St. Monica's Home for Unmarried Mothers* in Kendal. Except for two contested seats in Windermere all the candidates were returned unopposed in the local elections.

JUNE

'Pipers added colour to Burton's Gay Scene' headlined a report of Burton's Whitsuntide Rose Queen ceremony in which over 50 children took part. The 'vivid tableau' was led by Alan and Tommy Fawcett holding aloft the Rose Queen banner for the new queen Joyce Mounsey who was attended by flower girls Ann Gellet, Ann Carling, Gwenda Robinson, Pamela Wilson, Clare Crayston and Dianne Neil. Queen Joyce welcomed in verse the visiting queen and her retinue from Yealand. The Mother's Union had 'perfect weather' for their summer outing to Barrow and Walney Island. There was a poll to approve the Sunday opening of cinemas which, despite opposition from the churches, was eventually permitted 'in Kendal only'.

JULY

Several hundred farmers and spectators attended a farm open day at Mr H. Bell's Holme Park Farm. They were shown a 16 acre field divided into 16 'paddocks' to accommodate in all 158 ewes and 274 lambs. There were 26 wet days in the month. Ahuge cloud burst caused severe flooding in Burton and Holme and the national television news reported hailstones 'falling as big as florins' at Milnthorpe. Mr Brian Butterfield, of Moss Farm, bought at auction 22 acres of land at Station Rd, Burton, for £3.600 from Mr. William Casson.

AUGUST

Westmorland County Council informed Burton Parish Council 'about access to Burton Fell'. It was 'now confirmed that there is an award of stinted pasture and two public quarries on Burton Fell, a public quarry at Curwen Woods Quarry and a pasture road from Hutton Roof just west of the parish boundary which is specifically awarded for taking material into or out of the quarries and stinted pastures.' Mrs Dorothy Trollope of Burton House died aged 69 years. She was the daughter of Mr Harry Birkett Boardman who had lived at Thornleigh, Burton and 'who was a keen sportsman and race horse owner.'

SEPTEMBER

A verdict of 'accidental death' was recorded on Mrs Ellen Jones, aged 59. She was a widow from Millom. She had broken her skull after falling downstairs in the middle of the night while staying with her son at Burton. A Preston lorry driver, Thomas Lathom, was fined £52 with 13 guineas costs and banned from driving for 12 months after causing, in the previous February, 'four accidents in Burton village within 235 yards.' He admitted 'carrying a bottle of rum on winter mornings.' Dr. N. Hargreaves said that, according to a urine test, Lathom had drunk the equivalent of 14 whiskies. His lorry had careered round Church Bank corner colliding with a laundry van, hitting and demolishing the porch of Church Bank House, before knocking into Church Bank Farm wall and finally mounting a low wall for a head on collision with a gate stoop. In mitigation Lathom said he drove 20,000 miles year and this was his first 'incident' in 23 years. Moreover, 'he was not a drinking man.'

OCTOBER

Many local roads were blocked by trees brought down in fierce gales. The M.P. William Vane warned local Conservatives of the dangers of the 'Credit Squeeze'. BADS received special permission from the playwright Joseph Colton to present the comedy *The Gay Dog* in which Wilfred Pickles had taken the leading role in the West End. A special anthem *Sing to the Lord of Harvests* was sung at the Harvest Festival conducted by the vicar the Rev. D. Herman and the Rev Swift, vicar of Yealand. Bela River Open Prison near Milnthorpe hit the headlines when several ex-prisoners broke in to join a drunken party with inmates!

NOVEMBER

The 28th birthday party of Burton Women's Institute was attended by over 60 members and friends. Mrs Webster from Beetham cut the cake but 'visitors from Holme and Milnthorpe were unable to be present owing to adverse weather conditions'. It was reported that rabbits were a problem as they had 'made a come back' following virtual elimination by myxomatosis in 1954. Burton Farmers' Discussion Group was shown a film demonstrating how the number of man hours needed to keep a cow could be reduced to 47 hours a year compared to the 1959 average of 117 hours from 336 farms surveyed.

DECEMBER

There were altogether 50 communicants at three celebrations of Holy Communion held in the parish church over Christmas and a service of nine lessons and carols was also well attended. The weather was exceptionally mild on Christmas Day.

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Butterflies in Springtime

at Holme Park Quarry Local Nature Reserve

One of the first butterflies on the reserve this year was a beautiful primrose yellow Brimstone, fluttering along the sunny south-facing slope of the bund between the quarry and the reserve. The sunshine had brought it out of hibernation on 4 March, even with a low daytime temperature of only 6 degrees C and frosty nights. It needed to be a hardy creature to survive this year.

Brimstones normally re-emerge from hibernation on the first warm days of Spring. They search for mates and Buckthorn bushes on which they lay their eggs. Purging Buckthorn is present on this reserve.

This butterfly was too early to be included in the annual count, which only begins when the temperature reaches 13 degrees C, in late March or early April. From then until the end of September a record is made weekly, weather permitting, following a set route known as a transect.

In Spring the total weekly count, which takes about an hour, may not exceed single figures. When visiting the reserve you need to look closely to spot them. A pair of close-focusing binoculars is a great help with identification. If you can take a good photo and zoom in with the camera or computer not only do you have confirmation of identity, but also a record for future reference. Looking at the undersides of the wings is often the best way of distinguishing similar species – if they stay still long enough!

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Less common are UK priority species, three of which have made appearances some years on the reserve during May. These are Dingy Skipper, Small Pearlbordered Fritillary and Wall Brown.

25 different butterfly species have been recorded in the last seven years. Last year was the second best with 21 species and a total count of 432.

The records are used for deciding management priorities for different parts of the reserve. At the end of the year the transect data is entered into the Butterfly Monitoring Scheme for the UK. Data from all over the country shows trends in abundance of each species.

Access to the reserve is from Clawthorpe Lane, just past the last house on the left.

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

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The Vicar Writes...

"It is finished!" The fulfilment of the cross

In his account of Jesus' crucifixion (John 19:16-37), John carefully records the following details: The soldiers divided his clothes between them and gambled for his undergarment (v23-24). Why did they do this? From the cross, Jesus said, "I am thirsty" (v28). Why? A winesoaked sponge was put to his lips (v29). Why? The soldiers did not break Jesus' legs (v33). Why not? One of the soldiers pierced Jesus' side with a spear (v34). Why?

On one level, there's a perfectly obvious answer to each of these questions. The soldiers divided the garments because that was their privilege at an execution. They cast lots for the undergarment because it was seamless and they didn't want to spoil it. It was the physical agony of crucifixion that caused Jesus to say, "I am thirsty" and to be given the wine-filled sponge. The soldiers didn't need to break Jesus' legs as he was already dead and so one of them impulsively speared him just to make sure.

But John says there's a much more important reason for these things having taken place. After recording each incident he writes, "This happened so that the Scripture might be fulfilled..." (v24,28,36) and he quotes a number of Old Testament prophecies (Psalm 22:18, Exodus 12:46; Numbers 9:12; Psalm 34:20; Zechariah 12:10).

The message is clear: the death of Jesus is not an accident. His death is the climax to which the whole of

God's revelation and activity in the Old Testament has been moving. That's why Jesus' final words on the cross are, "It is finished." (v30) God's plan has been accomplished. The work of rescue is complete. The penalty for human sin has been paid. The scriptures have been fulfilled. We can be forgiven.

In his life, Jesus fulfilled at least 332 distinct prophecies in the Old Testament. Apparently, the mathematical possibilities of all those prophecies being fulfilled in the life of one man, is 1 in 840 followed by 96 zeroes! I don't think there's even a name for that high a number. Amazing!

The division of garments, the casting of lots, the cry of thirst, the wine-filled sponge, the unbroken bones and the pierced side are a clear confirmation for all who care to look that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God who gives forgiveness and eternal life to all who trust in him.




