

PC Observations...

J.M. Reporting from the
Parish Council meeting

The public forum seats were filled at the 20 June meeting with residents concerned about three issues. The first was a planning application (SL2018/0416) for a house and driveway on land off Tanpits Lane applied for by Mr. and Mrs. Whittaker of Newbiggin Farm, Hutton Roof. Neighbours are concerned on several grounds including the legitimacy of a change of use of this amenity area, which 'should only be developed under extraordinary circumstances'. Other concerns were loss of privacy, the difficulty of vehicular access onto Tanpits Lane and the building not being keeping with historical buildings around the site. Councillors were minded to object to the application but wanted to see a detailed plan before doing so.

The second issue raised by Moira Rowley, Jim Crayston and Richard Stephens from the Burton Recreation Trust was a request for financial support for a key fob security system to safeguard the legitimate use of the multi-use games area (MUGA). The Recreation Trust have already raised £44,000 for resurfacing the games area but are now short of funds. £1,000 is required to pay for the fob system and

a motion for Council to support this request was passed unanimously. A second request for support to buy a CCTV surveillance system for the MUGA was deferred to the next meeting pending further information on the possibility of funds being available from a county council Community Fund and other sources as well as further clarity about the regulations on CCTV use.

A third issue was raised by Peter Cummings who had found an arrow on his land apparently fired from the Boon Town area. The arrow was clearly capable of inflicting injury on livestock and people. The police have been informed.

Kath Hayhurst also reported that she had attended a meeting about developing the tow path along the canal north of Burton for walkers and cyclists to travel from Lancaster to Kendal. She had also asked for action to fix dangerous potholes underneath the New Mills aqueduct and amazingly, this was done within a week!

Jane Hopwood reported on progress to mark the centenary of the ending of the Great War. 118 men served from the Burton area, with 19 fatalities. Jane has consulted with the school and the Vicar and the plan is from 29 October to pin

118 large poppies to visible places around the village with each poppy marked with a name. There will also be an exhibition in the Church with information about the 118 men. The stone tablet in the Church has four names missing and a brass plaque of these names will be mounted underneath the stone tablet. Councillors agreed to make £300 available to support this commemoration.

- The absence of any county council action to clear out gullies along Main Street.
- Overgrown walking paths around the village.
- Dog poo.
- B4RN progress hitting problems with wayleave permission to lay cables.
- A successful litter pick in collaboration with very enthusiastic Year 5 and 6 school children organised by Sarah Colyer – many thanks to the school.
- An early meeting with South Lakeland Housing Association who want to build 29 mixed and affordable houses on SLDC-owned land above Boon Town.

Next meeting at 7.30pm on Thursday 19 July in the Memorial Hall.

B4RN Hyperfast Broadband for Burton

We are working hard behind the scenes to bring the B4RN hyperfast broadband service to everyone in Burton & Clawthorpe. This is a passive phase of the project where a large amount of preparatory work has and continues to be done to ensure wayleave agreements are signed so the fibres can legally cross people's land. The core routes are starting to form especially to the school. Some land is proving difficult to gain wayleave agreement through land ownership issues but we are stepping through this in a methodical way to resolve issues as they arise. Getting this phase right makes the installation much easier.

A key part of the passive phase of B4RN installation is to receive investment to fund the active phase of the project (the dig). Investment is being received from investors in Burton and this money is ring fenced for our parish to allow us to buy the ducting, fibre, cabinet etc. to complete the project.

Burton Morewood School

The whole school has enjoyed the summer weather and we have had all our playtimes on the field. We all enjoyed a visit from the Library Van – so much choice and so little time.

Reception have been enjoying 'Little Humpty'. In Numeracy they have been using dominoes for doubling, halving and adding. Year 1's Science experiment used the potatoes that they received from the Potato Council. They had two types: Rocket and Athlete. The Rocket grew better and was heavier than the Athlete, both grown in the same conditions. In Literacy they have been enjoying the book 'Lonely Beast' by Chris Judge. This is the tale of a Beast whose determination to overcome his loneliness leads him to undertake a daring and dangerous quest to find others like him.

Year 2 have been enjoying the film 'Up' in Literacy. They have written their own short story about becoming an explorer, just like the main character in the film. They will then go on to think about writing a job advert for the perfect explorer. Their focus in Numeracy has been number lines and temperatures. They have also been studying Andy Goldsworthy in their Art lessons.

For their Numeracy Year 3 have been concentrating on time and Roman Numerals. Their topic continues to be Ancient Greece and they have combined this in their Art lessons to produce Medusa heads, using the sponging technique then adding their snakes for hair. They have used PowerPoint to make presentations to their class for their play scripts. For their show assembly Year 4 decided to display their work and talk it through individually with the mums, dads, grandparents etc.

Year 4 have been studying habitats. They then wrote a story about a dragon and the type of habitat he may live in. Still staying with the Royal Wedding, Year 4 set themselves a challenge to make wedding dresses from bin bags along with looking at British values. Another challenge but this time in Literacy, was to write a ten word story. Pictograms were the focus for Numeracy and in the spirit of the World Cup they enjoyed finding the various countries of the teams involved.

We joined up with Year 5 and worked together on the Big Plastic Pick-up, with some members from our community joining us. We filled two large bin bags with items such as sweet wrappers, lots of cigarette butts (especially at the bus stops), clothing

Roger Reports...

From the County & District Councils

Following the District Council, election on the 3 May (reported last month) little change resulted from South Lakeland's AGM on the 22 May. Though their numbers are down the Liberal Democrats retain a majority over the Conservative opposition of 19 Members (the highest number of Tories for ten years) and three Labour members, so they hold all the committee chairs as well as having a single party cabinet. Their strength also meant that proposal from my side that I should be become Chairman of the Council (a position I held in 2001-2003) - came to nothing.

I am, however, the father of the Council as being in my 35th year as a Councillor I have served longer than anyone else. I also continue to share alternatively with a Lib Dem Colleague saying prayers before the council. Although attendance is of course voluntary most members come for the five minutes slot. Another link between my church and civic life is my membership of the County Councils Standing Advisory Committee on Religious Education (SACRE) which is mainly concerned with the multi-faith RE curriculum in our schools. Our most recent meeting was held at the Whitehaven Mosque.

Inevitably we touch on other issues which recently have included alleged religious discrimination in political parties, abortion and forced marriage.

At SLDC the main discussion was about the Council Plan for 2014-2019. SLDC's priorities are: Economy, Housing, Environment and Culture and wellbeing. The main objects are, however, are to create 1,000 jobs and 1,000 affordable home. So far 319 homes have been built. Even so I wonder if all the arguments raised during the six years long Local Development Framework debates might have been exaggerated. If there was such a pent up demand surely developers would have snapped the sites once planning permission became permissible. But so far little or no work has started on sites in Burton, Holme, Milnthorpe or Endmoor. With us the Green Dragon development is not yet planned out. Many of the Church Bank houses seem almost ready for occupation. Even so pedestrian and vehicle access issues still have to be

sorted out and I have not forgotten that the numbering and street signs need to be clarified.

On employment 302 jobs have been created. But it was pointed out that with the highest national employment rate in 40 years our area is not markedly better than elsewhere. Moreover my colleague Brian Cooper reminded us that South Lakeland has always been good for jobs and that when he was young workers were bussed in from Lancaster and from even farther afield. Now, of course, commuters come by car. This got us on to parking - New Road car park of course - and traffic congestion which that very evening had caused several members to be late for the council. One acute cause of congestion was the county's habit of closing off long stretches of road when verges are being cut - even at peak times. Also I am still going in about increasing problems caused for on the A6070 when the M6 is closed and the motorway traffic has to come through Burton.

On jobs I was pleased to hear at the county council's Children's Scrutiny Board that the number of sponsored apprenticeships, as with 210 placements, is getting towards the target of 250 fresh jobs. Unlike the traditional craft based trades for

younger workers, a wide variety of skills based employment are on offer. Surprisingly they are available for all age groups. We were told that one apprentice is over 60 years old. Don't times change?

HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

HISTORIC PANES


The high quality of Burton's 'built heritage' is reflected by the variety of its windows. Often they reveal the age of a building. Newer houses on the north part of St James' Drive, for instance, clearly have more modern windows than the earlier homes at the south end. A similar contrast occurs between the first 1960's houses and those of the 1990's on Morewood Drive. Even so windows, along with front doors, are invariably the first house features to be modernised.

None of the post-war council houses retain the original metal (and very draughty) casement windows said to have been composed of steel recycled from redundant tanks. Sometimes windows with styles earlier than the original structure are inserted. The 'Georgian type' sash windows recently installed in the Old Vicarage are of an 18th century pattern although the building itself is mid-19th century. Burton has however very few 'Mock-Tudor' leaded lights, popular in the 1930's. Hordley House has some square leaded panes although the

house seems to have lost some wooden 17th century windows noted in 1936. Nineteenth century West View has pretty leaded lights in its added-on Edwardian square bay windows.

Apart from a handful of houses like the Boon Walk semis and detached Green Meadows, Burton has few inter war houses typically with bay windows, indicating the village's decline in the 1920's and 1930's when there was little new building. Burton's most anachronistic intrusion is a former shop in the northern wing of the Royal Hotel. It dates from c.1900 but that part of the building's structure contains possible medieval cruck beams making it the village's oldest structure after the church. Further along the same wall there is a range of long paned sashes of c.1860. But round the corner on the south facade are five three-light Georgian Venetian (or Palladian) windows which have a higher central light with a curved top. Together they constitute Burton's most handsome fenestration.

Similar windows grace the Old Bakery (with Gothick upper lights), in the Manor House. Also appreciated by architectural historians are the 'main doorway of the Venetian type, and pedimented sashes of the quite splendid Burton House' of c.1795,





which also has tall arched windows in the sunhouse or orangery and big sashes in the school house. Burton has possibly retained about half the sash windows in the Main Street. Those to the front the three-storey houses of c.1810 in The Square are conspicuous, unlike the long Westmorland staircase windows at the back. Also, the King's Arms has a complete set of sashes while Devenant House retains a fine square fanlight window over the front door. A rare survival is a multi-paned window, in which only one pane opens for ventilation at The Green Dragon.

Unlike many Lunesdale villages Burton has relatively few stone-framed windows. Some survive at Clawthorpe Hall and Coat Green but the mullions (listed by The 1936 Royal Commission survey of Westmorland Buildings) in Ivy Cottage are no longer there. There are also renewed mullions at Old Hall. Traces of blocked up sandstone frames can be glimpsed in upper storeys and in one or two cellars. More easily seen is a restored tiny stone window at the Old Grammar School opposite the church. Dating from 1689 it is probably Burton's oldest domestic window.

We seem to have had the hottest prolonged weather during May and part June and this I guess will have helped a lot of our birds and butterflies this year.

Our rare local butterflies seem to all be enjoying this weather and we have had some really good early first flight days with the rare Holly Blue on the 17 May from Burton Fell and the Dingy Skipper on the 21 May from Plain Quarry and also a similar butterfly a day or two later from Clawthorpe Fell. Small Pearl Bordered Fritillary was seen on 28 May along with a deluge (over 100 – obvious hatch day) of Small Heaths on Burton Fell and since throughout Hutton Roof, My first Meadow Brown appeared on 11 June at the top of Burton Fell, on 12 June had several of the long awaited rare Northern Brown Argus at two sites over near to Park Wood (Hutton Roof side). Also a single Dark Green Fritillary being recorded from Holme Stinted Pastures on 15 June, the lovely Painted Ladies have been seen from several parts of the complex during May and June. The 19 June produced my first Ringlet which was very flitty, and now we have had the first I guess there should be hundreds over the coming

days. Just today (21 June) I have been fortunate to have had my first Grayling whilst on Burton Fell. Also of particular interest I have noticed numbers of both the migratory “Silver Y” moth and also the lovely little black Chimney Sweeper Moths have been on the wing in more recent days.

For me it has been a little worrying this year in particular and although this weather has been great in many ways, it will also have some downsides! I have been around the Hutton Roof complex checking the larger populations of the Common Rock Rose plant which is also the food plant of the Northern Brown Argus butterfly, and a large banking below the Park Wood which looks out towards the east and which measures something in the region of half an acre, has already been severely parched to perhaps a 50% loss of habitat with much of the Rock Rose having already dried up before it's had chance to flower and in some cases not been able to come through at all, although small populations of the plant are surviving and the observed butterflies seem to be enjoying what is still available. Most of the other populations of Rock Rose seem to be in more sheltered areas and as such are doing OK.

Our Fly Orchids have fared well this year and I have now recorded over 130

individual plants throughout the 10 different populations that we have already recorded from various colonies on Hutton Roof. One site in particular, which was only found in May of this year produced a phenomenal 82 plants.

It's rapidly coming up to the main Orchid time of the year for me, and I am out daily checking our local Dark Red and Broad Leaved Helleborines. I have erected a few wire cages here and there around the more prolific specimens to try and stop the deer and hares taking them down before they have had chance to flower, and to a degree it seems to be working with much reduced casualties (so far!) At first the orchid growth came through with much vigour and put things perhaps one week earlier than most years with good strong advanced growth, but this has changed and I think it again is down to the long period of warm dry weather which we have had, but I have noticed that the plants in some cases are now even falling behind their regular flowering period. Some of the hybrids are already coming through with "burnt tips" to the edges of their flower plumes, and some seem to have a far stunted growth compared to most years. I don't think this applies to all our orchids, but seems to be affecting the bold/larger

plants. So although it is far too early to assess things properly I am getting some early warning signs that this year may not be as prolific as past years.

Well it's about the time when the parent Cuckoo will be returning back to Africa (mid-June), leaving their chicks in the capable hands of their foster parents! It seems to have been a really quiet year for the Cuckoo calling with just a handful of reports coming in. I have had them in Dalton Crags and again over in a delph near to the wood yard. Also several reports from Newbiggin and Kelker and The Rakes areas. I have been lucky to record Yellowhammers in recent days over on Holme Park Fell and also breeding Wheatears on that side as well. A Redstart has been calling very regular from the bottom of Burton Fell not far away from the plinth, but this last couple of days he seems to have gone quiet. With regards to the Swifts we have so far been able to establish at least 15 sites being used again this year and hopefully we will get more before long. As usual the main sites have been the old Royal Cottage building, The Manor House, Cocking Yard and the cottages on the Post Office Row.
